Rationing Helps Water Shortage

Bronte's water shortage has been somewhat alleviated the past week since the city council began a voluntary rationing program. However, the facilities for pumping are still having a hard time keeping up with the usage.

Royce Fancher, Bronte water commissioner, said Wednesday morning that he had talked with Mr. Cooper of the firm, Parkhill & Cooper in Lubbock, concerning the problem. This firm engineered the pipeline and filter plant which supplies water to Bronte.

Fancher said Cooper told him he would study the plans on the project and make recommendations by Friday on doing something about the situation.

Fancher said the council appreciates the cooperation received in the voluntary rationing program. He urged that everyone continue to cooperate in carrying out the program, thus assuring all users of an adequate water supply.

The plan calls for residents living east of the railroad to water

on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and for those living on the west side of the railroad to water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Nobody is supposed to water on Sundays, in order to give pumping equipment a chance to catch up and fill the standpipes.

Heavy water usage is expected to continue as long as the weather in this area remains hot and dry. Some weather predictions have called for rain during the weekend of July 4.

As usual, safety experts of the state and nation are predicting a large number of accident fatalities during the weekend. They are urging travelers to use extra caution while on the road. A word of caution has also been issued for participants in water sports, as a large number of accidents occur on lakes and streams.

B. B. EDMIASTON TO MUSIC SCHOOL IN OZARKS

B. B. Edmiaston left Thursday for the Ozark Hills of Arkansas, where he is to teach advanced subjects in the thirteenth annual session of a music school that specializes in Gospel Song work. The school will continue for three weeks, with class periods from 9 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. six days a week.

Mr. Edmiaston has had extended experience in such work. Before accepting the work of a Methodist pastor in 1920, he was head of a college of music in Waco, and traveled between sessions, teaching, singing in revivals, etc. During his pastorate he kept up certain parts of the musical work, serving for many years as a teacher and chaplain in an annual school held in Tyler Methodist Church in Dallas. The class drew students from many states and some from foreign countries.

While in Brockwell, Arkansas, near the place of his birth, Mr. Edmiaston will specialize in composition of Gospel songs, both music and words, hymnody, church

music etc. Five other teachers will serve in the school, where music reading and performance, rendition, voice and other subjects will be taught.

Mr. Edmiaston has edited and cooperated in editing hundreds of song books and other musical works. His work on versification and song word writing is used as a reference book by a number of American publishers. His publishers say that a conservative estimate of his poems, jingles and other works published would number about fifteen thousand.

While in Arkansas, Mr. Edmiaston will be in driving distance of the famous Lake Norfolk and other fishing grounds, including Bull Shoals.
