

#### THE QUETTON of PLANT FOOD

College Station, April-Since the problem of what commercial fertilizer to use on which vegetables often arises, J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, offer the following suggestions on the

Commercial fertilizers that are available from most seed stores are 4-12-5, 5-10-5, and 6-8-4. For leafy vegetables such as lettuce, mustard, kale and spinach, Mr. Rosborough advises 6-8-4 because the higher percentage of nitrogen will stimulate rapid growth of the foliage. For root crops such as beets, carrots, radishes, and turnips a 4-12-4 mixture is probably best. For tomatoes and peppers, as well as eggplant, a 4-10-5 mixture is nded. If only one fertilizer is to be used for all vegetables, a 4-10-5 would be the best choice

In applying fertilizer, the prope rate is five pounds per 100 feet of row space. The fertilizer should be thoroughly mixed with the soil be-fore the seed are planted.
