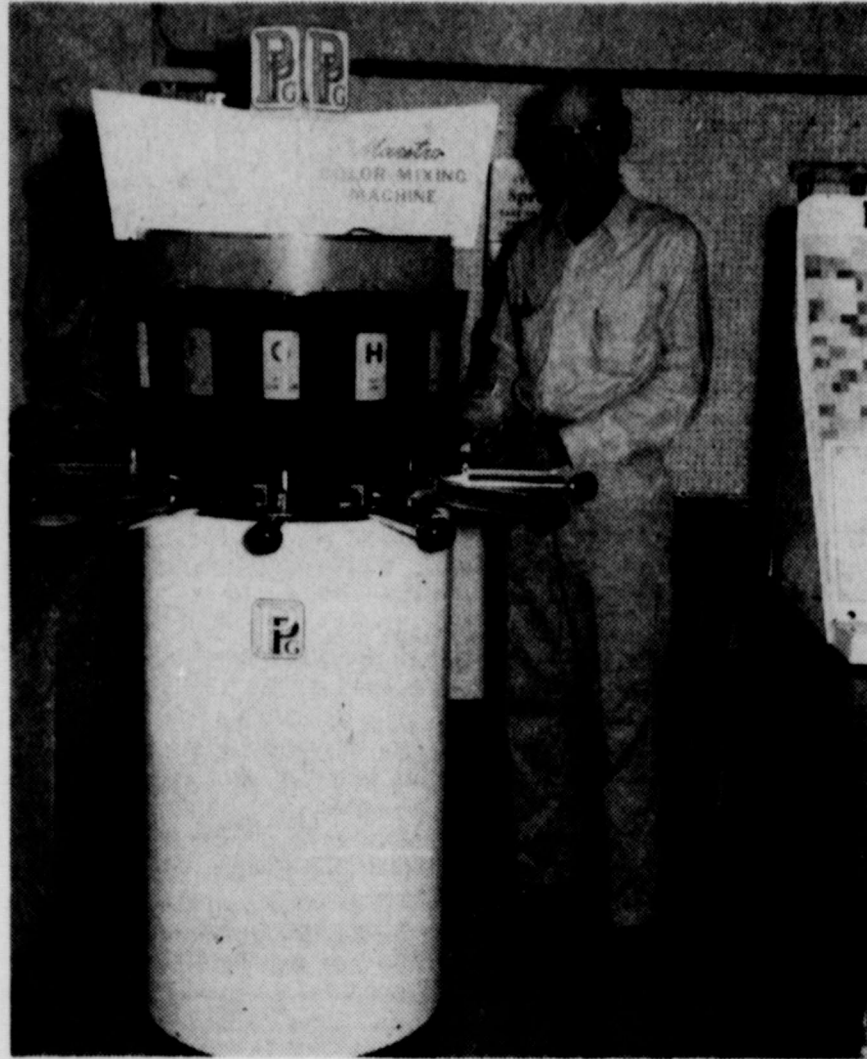

Citizens Asked to Pay Sewer Fee

The City Council is making an appeal again this week for persons who intend to use Bronte's new sewer system is put up their \$25 tie-on fee as soon as possible. Getting deposits in an escrow fund is part of the requirements of the Housing and Home Administration which is considering buying the \$85,000 revenue bonds voted to be used in constructing the sewer system.

A letter from the agency indicated that it will not consider buying the bonds until a sizeable number of these deposits are in. This policy of the agency will hold up the date for letting the contract to build the system and the

sooner the deposits are made, the sooner the sewer system will be built, city officials said.

Harsh Words Exchanged by Managers of Competing Teams

What started out to be a simple ball game to raise funds for the local Boy Scout troop has turned into bitter rivalry, with expectations of gang fights and some do-or-die softball playing, if the players of both teams are able to get on the field on the night which was scheduled.

Hurlin Lee, manager of the Old Men's softball team, Monday challenged Bob Wilson and Martin Lee, managers of the Old Women's softball team, to a game to be played Saturday night, August 6. Your reporter, not realizing the bitter, but hidden until now, feelings between these two teams, was surprised when he interviewed Hurlin Lee and Wilson. Martin Lee was not available for comment Monday.

One of the first things that the elder Lee said was that he had re-written his will, cutting out his woman-managing son without a cent. "This business of having a son who will help manage a bunch of females who think they can play ball, but can't even catch a basketball, is not for me," Lee said, "so I decided to disown him completely."

Lee also declared, "As for this

15 deposits had been made. This number is far short of the number expected to use the new system when it is installed.

City officials pointed out that the money would be placed in an escrow fund at the First National Bank until the sewer is completed, at which time it will go into an operating fund for the system. One city councilman said he would like for every local resident to know that the money cannot be spent until the system is in operation, and that all deposits will be refunded if anything should develop that the sewer is not built.

Deposits should be made to the city secretary at the city hall in Bronte.

Blackwell Rites For Tom Payne, Accident Victim

Funeral services for Tom Jefferson Payne, 67, foreman of Jack Frost's White Hat Ranch six miles west of Blackwell, were held at the Blackwell Methodist Church at 3 p. m. Monday. Rev. Jerrel Sharp, pastor, and Rev. Kenneth Jones, Blackwell Baptist pastor, officiated.

Mr. Payne was killed about 8:10 p. m. Saturday in a train-car collision at the crossing of the railroad and FM Road 1170 in downtown Blackwell. He had been to visit his wife, who was ill in the Bronte Hospital and was returning to his home west of Blackwell when the accident occurred.

Trainmen on the southbound Santa Fe freight train said that Payne was driving slowly, about 10 or 15 miles per hour and they presumed that he saw the train and intended to stop when he got near the track. However, they said, he did not stop and his car struck the engine of the train.

The car was pushed about 1050 feet down the track. Mr. Payne is believed to have fallen from the car about 100 feet down the track. The train passed over him.

Pallbearers were Wayne Estes, R. Q. Spence, Lewis Sweet, Bill Tucker, Fletcher Pinkard and Melvin Tubbs.

He was born in Coffeyville, Feb. 9, 1893. He was married to Miss Alice Newsom Oct. 19, 1915 at Coffeyville.

Survivors are his wife and three daughters, Mrs. Ester Lee Dawson and Mrs. Loreane Daniels of Abilene and Mrs. Virginia Hayes of Albany; three grandsons; two brothers, George Payne of Chico and Jesse Payne of Modesto, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Lilly Rope of Texarkana and Mrs. Annie Gregory of Marshall.

Burial was in Blackwell cemetery under direction of Patterson Funeral Home of Sweetwater.

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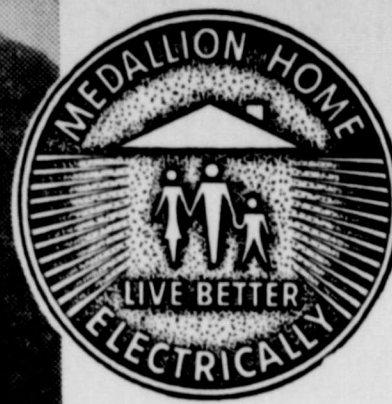

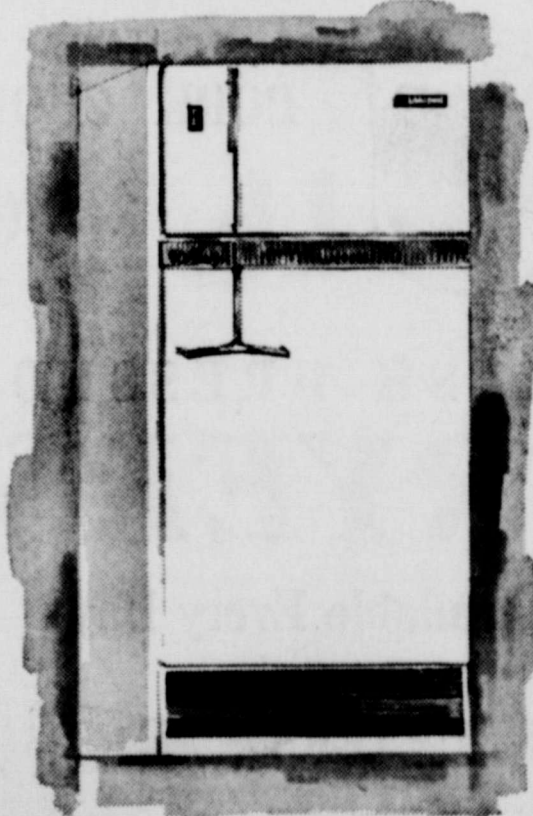
