When Mr. Knierim came to India in April 1959 as an agricultural adviser for the International Cooperation Administration, Indian farmers were making little use of irrigation water provided by the 146 square mile reservoir of a dam opened in 1953. Farmers had been practicing dry farming for centuries, depending for moisture only on the four-month monsoon season. They had few farming tools and had little idea of how to practice wet cultivation.

The first problem confronting HERE'S ing to wet cultivation was the le-Indian farmers who were convertvelling of their fields. When corps were rainfed, they relied on their eyes to guide them in levelling operations since it did not matter if the land was only moderately level. But for proper irrigation, the land had to be very level.

Mr. Knierim showed the farmers a simple way to accomplish this. 

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of in-

terest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Members of the Legis-lature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not ex-ceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4.800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.
"In addition to the per diem the

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the fellowing:
