69 Pay \$25 Sewer Deposit

Sixty-nine prospective users have put up their deposits for sewer service, Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said Wednesday morning. "We still need a lot more," Mrs. Kirkland said. The city council is urging that everyone who plans to use the new sewer system when it is built to deposit the \$25 which will be a tie-in charge.

Getting as many of the tie-in deposits on hand as soon as possible is one of the requirements of the Housing and Home Administration before that agency will consider buying bonds which the local residents voted last spring.

You'll have to pay it before you can hook on to the sewer, so please do so now, so we can get on with construction.

Persons putting up the \$25 deposits are assured that the money will not be spent until the sewer system is in operation. It will be deposited in an escrow fund at the First National Bank, where it will remain until the sewer system is completed. At that time it will be converted into an operating fund for the sewer system.

Boys Ranch Gifts Needed by Monday

D. K. Glenn, who is Wagon Boss for a fall stock drive in this area to benefit Boys Ranch, said Monday that anyone who has stock to donate to the drive should contact him as soon as possible. Plans are to bring all the stock to the Santa Fe stock pens in north Bronte on Monday, Aug. 15.

After the stock have been assembled at the local pens they will be taken to San Angelo and marketed through regular channels. Any class of livestock will be acceptable, Glenn said, whether they be good calves and lambs or old cows and ewes. Donations of the stock to Boys Ranch are tax deductible.

All proceeds from the stock drive will go to the Ranch to be used in helping "hard luck" boys and in training them to make first class citizens.

A large amount of construction work is underway in Bronte at this time, with new homes going up in all parts of town.

Just completed is a new house owned by Taylor Emerson. He has sold the property to Dr. Robert N. Muckleroy, who began the practice of medicine August 1 at Bronte Hospital. The house is located in the northeast part of

town immediately east of Mrs. Forrest Clark's home. It is a three bedroom home.

Social Security Will Observe 25th Anniversary

Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager, of the San Angelo Social Security office, noted today that social security has been serving America for 25 years. August 14 will be the 25th birthday of the signing of the Social Security Act.

Ellington stated that social security means many things. It means aid to the aged, dependent children, and the disabled; it means vocational rehabilitation and old-age, survivors, and disability insurance. The Government insurance part of social security — the part called old-age and survivors insurance — has grown over the past quarter of a century until 14 million men, women, and children are receiving monthly checks.

Ellington added that these checks are mailed each month to families whose income has been cut off because of the retirement, disability, or death of the family breadwinner. This program has a hometown touch in that it is administered through district offices located in all parts of our nation.

An open house ceremony will be held on Monday — August 15th at 3:00 p. m. in the San Angelo office located in the Continental Fidelity Building. All residents of the area have been extended an invitation by Ellington to attend this anniversary celebration.

A Great Plains Conservation plan has been prepared on the O. W. Newell stock farm 3 miles south of Bronte. Included in the plan is a wildlife area for the protection of quail. Newell also plans root plowing and seeding a mixture of K. R. Bluestem, sideoats grama, plains bristlegrass, green sprangletop, and blue panic. He further plans cross fencing, and a concrete storage tank and pipeline for livestock water. Cropland will be seeded to blue panic in rows for livestock grazing. All newly seeded areas will be rested a full growing season to allow time for a good root system to develop.

When soil temperature is 70 degrees F., grasses use all available moisture for growth. When the soil temperature is 130 degrees, grasses use all available moisture to keep cool and none for growth.

When air temperature registers 108 degrees, a thermometer on bare ground will register 130 degrees. At the same time a thermometer placed under a healthy clump of bluestem grass and mulch cover will register only 90 degrees.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballots; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of in-

terest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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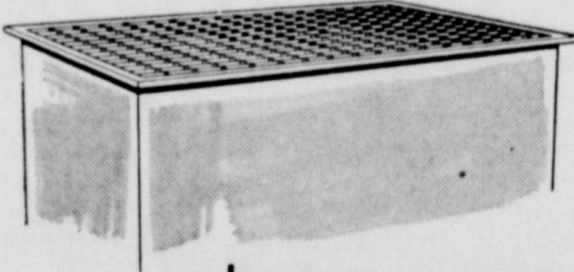

Caverns of Sonora Officially Opened

A fabulous new cavern near Sonora was officially dedicated and opened July 23, with many official dignitaries, members of the press and cave enthusiasts present.

The cave was first opened for public viewing July 16, but the official ceremonies were set for a week later. A party and barbecue along with a tour of the cavern was held Friday evening and the official dedication followed on Saturday.

The cavern is located 13 miles west of Sonora, a few miles off Highway 290. It is the largest cave in Texas open to the public.

Holding a constant temperature of 70 degrees, the cavern is described by speleologists as having beauty and color in profusion not known to exist anywhere else in the world. No other cave has helictite loops, the perfect "butterfly formation, giant four-inch calcite crystal with perfect crystalline faces, six foot "soda straws" (3/16 inch in diameter with paper thin walls constantly dripping water). Formations are fluorescent and phosphorescent and are still growing since this is a "live" cavern.

A full 90-minute tour will be conducted this year by developers Jim Papadakis and Jack Burch, who plan to supplement this with an alternate longer tour in 1961. Broad smooth trails make traveling through the cavern easy.

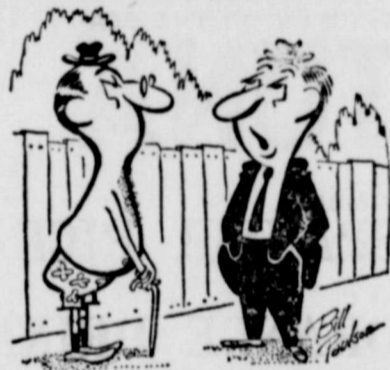

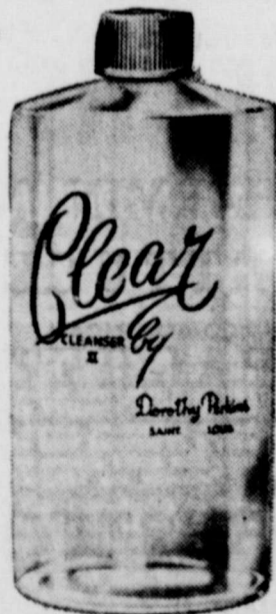

COUNTY STOPS BOUNTY MONEY FOR RATTLES

From Robert Lee Observer

Coke County will cease to pay a 50c bounty on rattlesnakes after next week. An order passed by the Commissioners Court in session Monday designated Aug. 20 as the final day for the payments. Bobcat, coyote and rabbit bounties will be continued. Approximately \$8,000 has been paid out in bounties since Coke County started paying in the spring of 1959. County officials felt the money had been well spent, but it has resulted in larger drain on the county treasury than had been anticipated.

Most of the bounty money has gone for rattlesnakes. During ten months of last year rattler payments amounted to \$3,173.50. At 50c per rattler, that meant 6,347 snakes. Last year bobcat and coyote bounties at \$12.50 each amounted to \$387.50, while payments for rabbit ears at 5 cents a pair was \$268.85.

More rattlers than ever have been killed this year. Up to Tuesday morning \$4,351.50 had been spent by the county since Jan. 1 for the rattles from 8,503 snakes.

J. L. Tinkler, county clerk, who pays the bounty money, gave the following figures on the number of rattlers paid for by months so far this year:
