The House Agriculture Committee Monday unanimously approved the proposed million dollar flood control project on the Kickapoo Creeks north of Bronte. This information was received Monday afternoon by Mayor J. A. Stephenson in a wire from Congressman O. C. Fisher.

Last Friday a House subcommittee approved the project and the measure was approved by the Senate agriculture committee earlier last week.

The project is designed to prevent the heavy damage which has been sutained here in floods, which have occurred on the creeks in 19-07, 1930, 1939, 1953 and 1957. Heaviest recorded damage was in 1953 when the losses amounted to \$577,-787. Besides great loss in the city of Bronte, the damage to cropland, roads and other rural property was heavy.

The Kickapoo watershed drains about 40,750 acres of Coke County land.

Work has been underway for several years toward making the Kickapoo dams a reality. Taking the lead in pushing the project was Bronte Lions Club. A water district was formed by a special act of the Texas Legislature. F. S. Higginbotham is president of the district, D. K. Glenn is vice-president, J. A. Percifull is secretary and Preston Davis and Austin Sandusky are directors.


