## City Tax Rate Raised to \$1.40

In a special meeting of Bronte's city council Monday afternoon the city tax rate was raised from \$1.00 to \$1.40 for each \$100 valuation.

The tax raise was necessary in order to assure being able to meet sewer bond obligations which will come due before tax paying time in 1961. The 40 cent raise

## City Stands to Lose \$17,000 If Sewer Users Don't Sign

The City of Bronte and its citizens stand to lose \$17,707 unless the required 250 persons sign up so the contract can be let by Nov. 1. In view of the time requirements to advertise for and let bids, little time remains for local residents to put up their deposits and sign up for sewer service.

The greatest loss to the city will be \$13,092 which was granted by the federal government to help pay for the disposal plant and lines leading to it. On top of that amount, the city will have to pay \$2,665 to the bond company which handled the bond election last spring.

To bring the total up to \$17,700 the city will have to pay its engineering firm \$1,950 for working up plans for the project.

Up to Wednesday morning 142 persons had put up the deposits, leaving 108 needed to reach the minimum number of 250.

Deposits should be made to Mrs. Helen Kirkland at the city hall. She also has blank notes for persons to sign who wish to borrow the \$25.00 from the First National Bank in Bronte.

This week, Mayor J. A. Stephenson received a wire from Senators Lyndon B. Johnson and Ralph Yarborough and Congressman O. C. Fisher stating that Bronte's \$85,000 from the Housing and Home Administration has been approved. Only thing holding up the sewer system now, the mayor said, is obtaining the necessary 250 tie-on deposits.

was authorized by voters last spring when they approved the sewer bond.

Members of council explained that no payments are being made at the present time, but payments will begin before next October when next tax money will start coming in. Consequently, in order to have money to meet the obligations when they come due, they had to get the additional levy on the tax statement which will be sent out Oct. 1, 1960.

An ordinance explaining how the additional money will be used is contained in this issue of The Enterprise. Also, a copy of the proposed budget for 1960-61 is being printed in this issue.

The tax allocations are same as last year except for the 40 cents which is being levied for the sewer fund.

## County Agents News Column

Several 4-H club members entered record books in the various awards programs contests judged in San Angelo last week. The Coke County 4-H Club girls and boys received six first place awards, two seconds and three thirds from the sixteen records submitted for competition on the district level. Miss Hooper and I are very pleased with the results. The girls, boys and the leaders that assisted them are to be congratulated.

I would like to mention the brucellosis Type Two test program again. In conversation with one of the San Angelo veterinarians over the weekend, I was again told that the test crew now testing in Tom Green County would move to Coke County upon completion of work in Tom Green County. Watch for an official announcement on the program in the near future.

We experienced a very good year for growing pecan — and other trees. Naturally, when a tree grows it removes certain elements from the soil. A pecan tree removes zinc from soil in much of this area in amount that will cause a deficiency. The good growing year which I attributed to the sub-soil moisture available during most of the season has made the deficiency more acute in many cases. We have had several calls on the subject and I still see trees over the county showing a zinc deficiency in the form of rosetted growth and or die back on the end of the limbs.

It is still not too late to spray to help offset the deficiency. A foliage spray of 36% zinc sulfate (at the rate of 1 pound to 50 gallons of water will help a deficient tree. Extreme cases will require one to several sprayings to correct.

A good time to apply zinc sulfate is when you apply casebearer control sprays in the spring. Mix the two together.

**AN ORDINANCE**  
Levying taxes for the use and support of the municipal government of the City of Bronte, Texas, for the fiscal year 1960-1961 and apportioning each levy for the specific purpose and declaring an emergency:

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:**

That there is hereby levied and there shall be collected for the use and support of the municipal government of the City of Bronte, Texas, for the fiscal year 1960-1961 upon all property, real and personal, and mixed within the corporate limits of said City, subject to taxation, a tax of \$1.40 on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property. Said tax being so levied and apportioned to the specific purposes herein set forth:  
55 cents.

1. **GENERAL FUND.** For the maintenance and support and pay-

ments of the General Government (General Fund) Fifty Five Cents (.55c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) Valuation is provided for these purposes.  
20 cents.

2. **POLICE DEPARTMENT FUND.** For the support of the police fund, Twenty Cents (.20c) on the One Hundred Dollar Valuation (\$100.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary to provide for this fund.  
20 cents.

3. **STREET & ALLEY FUND.** Twenty Cents (.20c) on the One Hundred Dollar Valuation (\$100.00) to the Street & Alley Fund to provide for the maintenance and improvement of the streets and alleys of Bronte.  
5 cents.

4. **FIRE DEPARTMENT FUND.** Five Cents (.05c) on the One Hundred Dollar Valuation or so much thereof as may be necessary for maintenance of equipment and other needs in the fire department.  
40 cents.

5. **SEWER FUND.** Forty Cents (.40c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) valuation to the Sewer Fund for payment on Interest and principal of the General Obligation Bond.

The fact that there is need of haste in preparing the tax roll in order to have it complete by October 1, 1960, creates an emergency and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor.

**Cumbie Awarded \$2,201.09 in Suit**

(From Robert Lee Observer)

A Coke County jury granted Edward M. Cumbie \$2,201.09 for damages to his property last Saturday.

On June 7, 1958, the Coke County Commissioners appointed a Special Court of Commissioners to determine the amount of damages that would be caused by the relocating of highway 277 north of Bronte that affected a tract of land (3.79 acres) owned by Edward M. Cumbie.

The Special Court of Commissioners, after a thorough examination determined that the amount of damage to the Cumbie property would be \$1,685.90. Upon their recommendation, Coke County placed the \$1,685.90 in escrow.

The Texas Highway Department took possession of the land for the purpose of relocating Highway 277.

July 20, 1958, the State of Texas appealed to the Coke County Court that the \$1,685.90 was in excess of the amount of damage caused by the relocating of highway 277.

The condemnation suit trial was scheduled for County Court on September 6, 1960. The jury was charged on Saturday, September 10, to bring forth a verdict.

After deliberation of three hours, the jury ruled in favor of the defendants, Edward M. Cumbie and others.

Attorneys for the State of Texas were Marvin F. Scentell and Frank C. Diekey, Jr.

Earl Smith was the defendant's attorney.
