Longhorns Travel Friday for Game with Santa Anna Eleven

Bronte's Longhorns will travel to Santa Anna Friday night for a football tilt with the Mountaineers. Santa Anna, a Class A high school, is undefeated in 1960 play, as are the Longhorns.

Coach Bob Howard, well pleased with the performance of his club last week against Ozona, said the Longhorns should be able to best the Mountaineers, but he expects them to be somewhat down after the high they reached last Friday night.

Santa Anna has defeated Goldthwaite 12-0 and Rising Star 26-6. They lost only 2 or 3 of their last year's starters and are expected to be pretty strong again this year.

The Longhorns are at full strength for the contest with no important injuries sustained last week.

A large crowd of Bronte fans is expected to follow the Longhorns to Santa Anna Friday night. Game time is 8 o'clock.

1st Baptist Church Approves Record Budget for Year

The First Baptist Church of Bronte has adopted a record budget of \$17,143.78 for the new church year beginning Oct. 1.

Leading the church in this far-reaching goal is the Budget-Finance committee which is made up of laymen of the church. J. B. Mackey serves as chairman and other members are Matthew Caperton, C. B. Barbee, Royce Fancher, Cecil Kemp and E. F. Glenn.

The budget reflects substantial increases in World Mission giving through the cooperative program and provision of money for new educational equipment such as picture projection materials, new teaching aids, etc. It also provides for the employment of two part-time workers which have already been selected. Wendell Gideon, Bronte School band director, will serve as choir director, and Mike Anderson, also a local teacher, will direct young people's activities as Youth Worker.

Provision has also been made in anticipation of remodeling present space or in event of need to begin additional new construction.

Oct. 9 has been designated as Commitment Sunday when members of the church will participate in a special dedication service by signing commitment cards.

Sept. 26-30 is expected to be a busy week for every worker in the church as Preparation Week is observed. Leonard Fletcher, newly elected Associate Superintendent of the Sunday School, will lead in a study and discussion of the book, "Outreach for the Unreached," by A. V. Washburn. Classes will meet each night at 7 o'clock. This will be an effort to stimulate interest as the church begins its new year of activity and training.

Included in preparations for the campaign are lay speakers in each Sunday School class and worship service for the next three weeks. Bob Howard was lay speaker at the service last Sunday.

Posters, direct mail, a church paper and the church bulletin are also being utilized to point up the importance of all areas of stewardship.

Almost all members of the church will be serving on one of the working committees.

Mighty Lions Fall to Mightier Longhorns

Bronte's powerful Longhorns outplayed the highly touted Ozona Lions all the way last Friday night to win the tilt with the Class A school 29-24. Actually the Longhorns beat the Lions more than the score indicated as evidenced by the score which was 29-12 early in the fourth quarter. The Lions had some real speed merchants on their squad, but they had a hard time penetrating the tough Bronte line.

Luttrell started the ball game with his kickoff, and Ozona returned it to the 31. On the first play from scrimmage the Lions fumbled and Bronte recovered the ball. Dee Arrott carried for 7 and Larry Robinson picked up 3 for a 1st down. On the next play Ozona was penalized 5 yards, then Arrott carried to the 4 yard line for a 1st and goal to go. Robinson plunged to the 1 and then he went over on the next play, to make the score 6-0. Arrott's pass to Eddy Spiller was good for 2 conversion points, leaving the score at 8-0.

Luttrell's kickoff was returned to the 38, and Ozona made steady gains with Jim Freeman, Tony

Parker and Jim Doran carrying the ball. In 13 plays they moved the ball from their own 38 to cross the double stripe for their first tally. They tried to run the ball across on conversion, but were stopped short, leaving the score 8-6 in Bronte's favor.

Arrott took the kickoff and went back up field to his own 32. On the next play Rudy Olivas wasn't able to find a hole and made no gain. Bronte was off sides on the next try and lost 5 yards. The only punt of the game came on the next play when Arrott quick kicked the ball all the way back to the Ozona 18.

Ozona picked up 2, and on the next try, they attempted a lateral but again the Lions lost the ball to the Longhorns via the fumble. This gave Bronte the ball with a 1st and 10 on the Ozona 22. On the first play of the series, Arrott picked up 2, but Ozona drew a penalty half way to the goal line, which put the ball on the 10.

Arrott and Robinson carried once each and then Bronte was penalized 5 for backfield in motion, making it 2nd and 11. Arrott

made 6 and the quarter ended.

2nd Quarter

When play was resumed at the other end of the field, Arrott went over the double stripe on two tries. Bronte was penalized 5 yards on the conversion try, but Mike Luttrell made up the loss by booting the ball through the uprights on the second try. Score: 15-6 in Bronte's favor.

On the next series of downs, Ozona was able to carry the ball from their own 18 to Bronte's 7 yard line. With a 4th down and 2 yards to go, Jack Corley went through and stopped the ball carrier short to stave off Ozona's second serious threat.

The Longhorns were unable to score again before the half, and after taking the ball to the Ozona 44, they lacked the required yardage and the ball went over on downs. Ozona tried to beat the clock, with passes, but Eddy Spiller knocked one down and then the Longhorns intercepted an Ozona toss just as the first half ended.

Housing and Home Administration, an agency of the federal government.

Brown said that if an acceptable bid is received on Oct. 18, the sewer system should be completed in 90 to 120 days. He also pointed out that in all probability the city would receive a better bid than it would have, had the bonds been sold to the federal agency. "Contractors just don't like all the red tape they have to go through when dealing with FHHA," he said.

R. K. Dunbar & Co. has contracted to purchase the \$50,000 tax bonds voted for the sewer system, and the same firm was joined by Dittmar & Co., Inc., in contracting to purchase \$85,000 in revenue bonds. Both firms are from San Antonio.

The city's need to obtain signers to use the sewer system when it is completed was only slightly lightened by the change in plans. Instead of 250 users, now only 240 are required to be signed up before the contract is let on Oct. 18.

Members of the council reiterated their plea of the last several weeks in urging Bronte residents to put up their \$25 deposits for sewer service. In addition to serving as a deposit, the \$25 will also serve as a tie-on fee. One hundred fifty-six deposits had been received to Wednesday morning.

BAND UNIFORM FUND GROWING

A real balance of \$481.00 was reported to the Band Boosters club meeting last Thursday night. An actual balance of \$631.00 was reported with \$150.00 outstanding accounts against it. The organization voted to sponsor the birthday calendar program again in the fall covering the 1961-62 school year.

A definite goal of \$1,100 was set as the amount the Band Boosters will try to raise in their concerted drive for "New Band Uniforms This Year."

Total expense of the uniforms is to be about \$3,750.00 and it is expected that the PTA will contribute \$400 as their project for the year and the local school will aid the project in the amount of \$2,250. Fifty uniforms will be ordered at a cost of \$75 each.

A committee to select the new uniforms was appointed and includes Mrs. C. O. Richards, Mrs. Royce Lee, and band director Wendell Gideon. Also on the committee will be a representative of the PTA, School Board, and the Longhorn band.

Members were reminded that a membership drive is in progress with dues being \$1.00. It was voted that membership cards be printed as soon as possible.

It was also announced that extra birthday calendars are on sale at the Bronte Enterprise, with proceeds going to the Band Boosters organization.

Robinson chalked up another 1st by going 12 yards to the 25. Steady gains by Arrott, Robinson and E. Spiller gave Bronte a 1st and goal to go on the 2. Robinson went over on the first carry to put the score at 21-6. Arrott's conversion run was no good, leaving the score at that figure.

After the kickoff Ozona gained steadily and carried the ball over Bronte's goal line to make the score 21-12. The extra point try failed.

Robinson returned the kickoff to the 29 and Arrott went to the 46 for a 1st down. Arrott's pass to Spiller was good for another 1st down. In the next series of downs Ozona was penalized half way to the goal line a couple of times, leaving the Longhorns with a 3rd and goal to go from the 4 when the 3rd quarter ended.

4th Quarter
