## Longhorns Back Home Friday

The Bronte Longhorns stay at home this Friday night and will meet the Roscoe Plowboys at the local stadium in a non-conference football tilt. Game time is 8 p. m.

Class A Roscoe is a new foe for the Longhorns and the local fans have no previous history on which to base their predictions for this week. So far this season the Plowboys have won two and lost three of their games. They have scored 56 points to their opponents' 110. With this record, most dopsters, here in Bronte at least, are favor-

ing the Longhorns to beat the visitors from up in Nolan County.

Bronte, Hermleigh and Roby are the only unbeaten Class B teams in this area and all are in District 6-B. Roby won last week over Roscoe 8-6, while Hermleigh was idle. Other teams of the district except Loraine fared well last week. Robert Lee downed Baird 36-12, Trent beat Sands 38-0 but Loraine fell to Cooper of Abilene 32-6. So far this season the district has a 19-6 record, four losses being had by Loraine and one each by Robert Lee and Trent.

The Longhorns will start conference play next week when they travel to Hermleigh to play the tough Cardinals.

## 168 Customers Signed Up for Sewer Service; 72 More Needed

Up to Wednesday morning 168 persons had signed and put up their deposits for sewer service. This means that 72 more signers are needed before bids on the new sewer system are opened on Oct.

18. A total of \$6,000 is needed before bids on the new sewer system are opened on Oct. 18. A total of \$6,000 is needed in the sewer operating fund, which means that 240 deposits of \$25 are needed.

City officials are confident that the required number will be signed up and that the contract can be let on the date planned.

Anyone who does not have the money to put up the \$25 deposit may borrow it from the First National Bank. The bank has offered to loan the money and allow the borrower to pay it back at the rate of \$2 per month until a total of \$26 is repaid. The extra dollar is charged for interest and book-keeping expense in handling the small loan accounts. The \$2 payment will be collected by the city secretary along with water bills each month.

Persons who plan to tie on to the sewer when it is completed are urged to go ahead and make their deposit, city officials said, so that the needed number can be reached by Oct. 18.

3. Improved chair height and over-the-hood visibility which will increase the ease of parking and add to driving safety.
4. Other safety items include improved brakes, overlap electric windshield wipers, and a new placement for the fuel tank which protects it from road hazards such as hard bumps and flying stones.

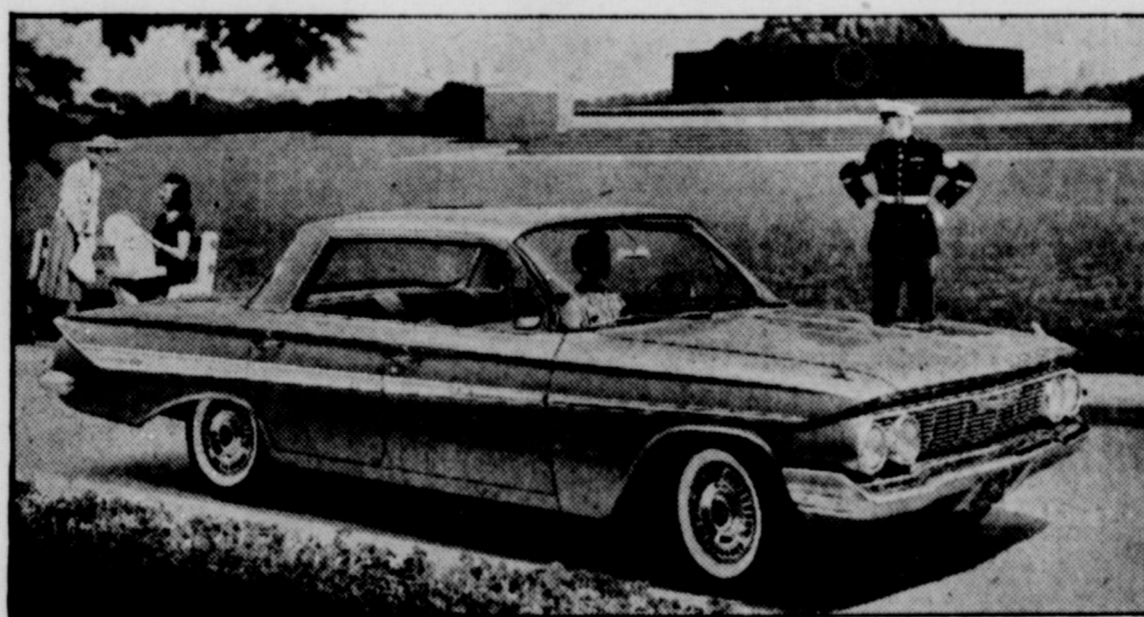

It can carry six passengers and a 700-pound cargo or, with an optional third seat, nine passengers and 250 pounds of cargo.

The Lakewood Station Wagon is a four-door, conventional type

six-passenger model. But, with the second seat folded down, it offers 68 cubic feet of cargo capacity. One exclusive feature is the 10-cubic feet of lockable storage space under the hood.

As in 1960, the lineup in the conventional-size passenger cars will be offered in the Impala, Bel Air and Biscayne series. But, they have been expanded to include an Impala two-door Sedan not previously available.

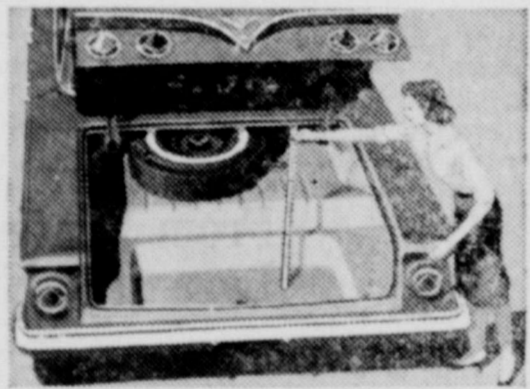

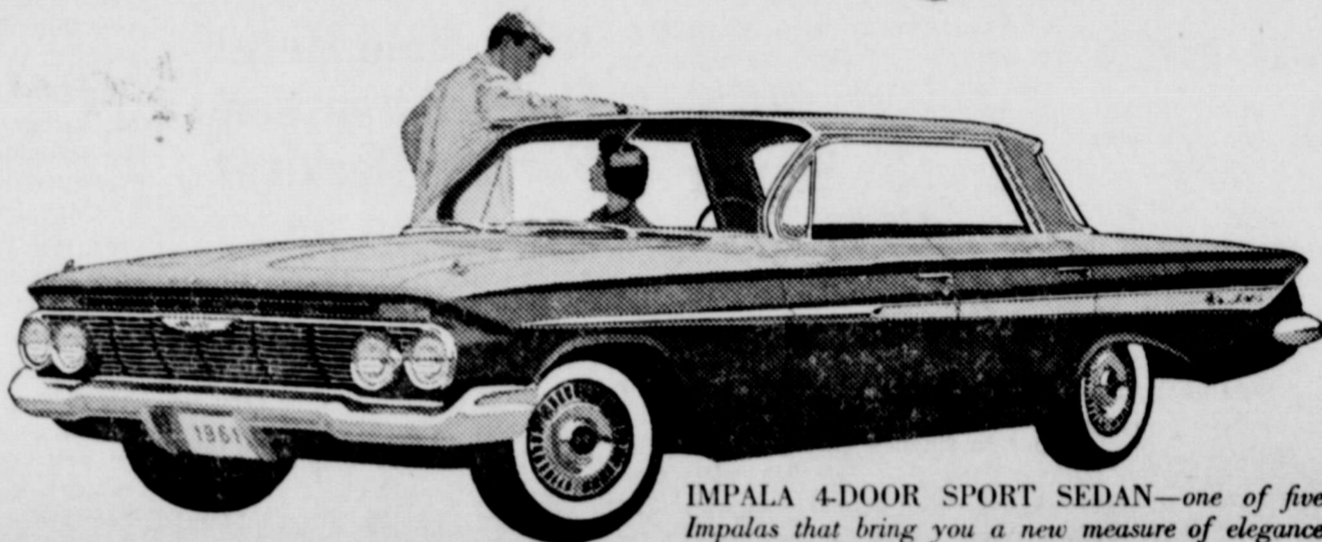

## County Agents News Column

The ball started rolling on plans for bhucellosis testing in the county in a meeting with Dr. Post, Dr. Syler and a group of local operators last Thursday.

Dr. Post stated that they hope to start at least one testing crew in Coke County by the middle of next week. And by the middle of the second week in October they hope to have four testing crews in operation. Dr. Syler will probably be in charge of the units working in Coke County.

To facilitate matters, the county was roughly divided into four areas. One crew will be placed in each area to draw the samples of blood for the tests and to do the vaccinating of heifers that are desired vaccinated.

Several local operators in each area volunteered at the meeting to serve as contact men. They, along with a few others that we hope to secure will help line up work for the testing crews. If enough men will help, the burden on each man will be negligible. As soon as the list is completed, we will list the names of those assisting. They will contact the cattle owners in their assigned area to be prepared for the testing crew

and probably will be able to answer any questions that were not answered for you in the general meetings.

The livestock market situation is not as rosy as we would like for it to be, but, according to our economists October outlook report, the beef cattle market should hold its own or improve slightly during the remaining quarter of the year. Swine are expected to take their normal fall dip in price, but the outlook is attractive for the first half of 1961.

The only comments offered on the sheep market situation were in regard to imports. Mutton imports were down 26% for the first half of the year compared to the

first half of last year. Wool imports were also down 26% for the same period. But lamb imports were up 72%. That is a very sizeable increase of a commodity we are vitally interested in.

Deep plowing of root rot infested land that you intend to plant in 1961 is one of the best means of fighting the costly disease. If no rain fall occurs for two weeks after plowing under the stubble, normally the practice is very effective. If hot weather accompanies the dry period, the control is still better.

The plant pathologist's interpretation of deep plowing is 10 to 14

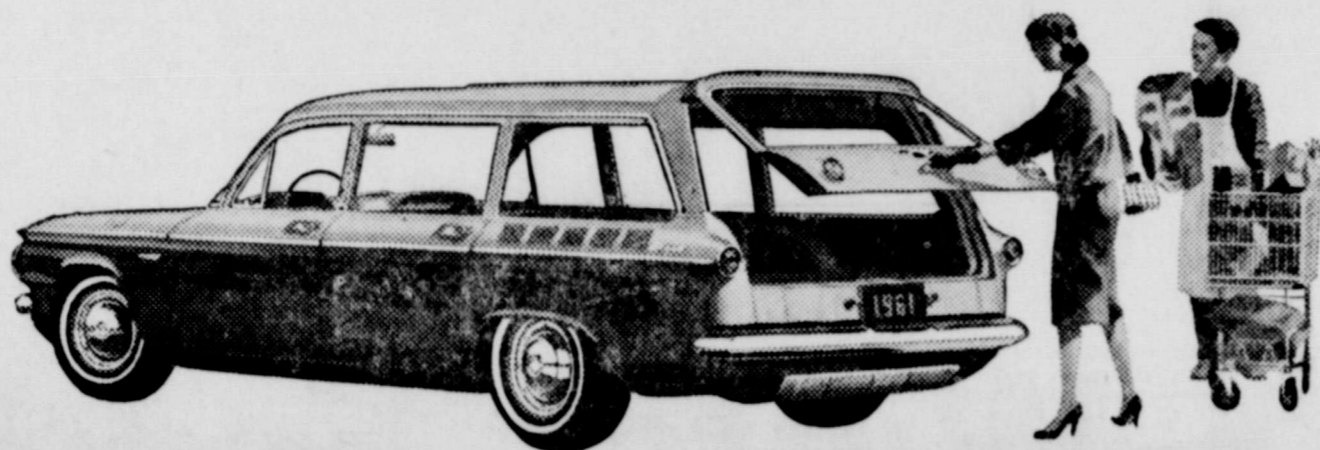
inches. Where an operator's harvest is late as much of ours is and his soil has the disease, it is usually best to rotate the cotton land. Land that we devoted to some other crop this year that was deep plowed during hot weather should reduce root rot losses. Some fields in the county had heavy losses to the disease this year.

Mrs. Anna Mae Benningfield underwent major surgery last Thursday at Coke County Memorial Hospital. She is making a good recovery.

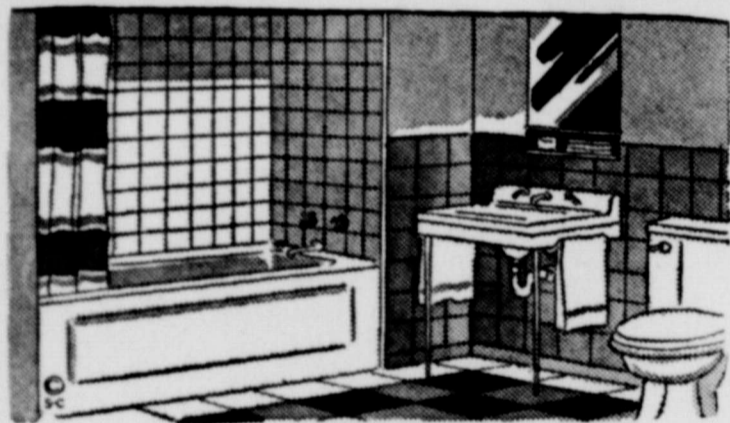

# Longhorns Squeak By Jim Ned, 8-6

The Bronte Longhorns squeaked by the Jim Ned Indians, 8-6, last Friday night in a rough and tumble football game played at Tuscola. Dee Arrott's dive through the right side for the two extra points saved the day for the Longhorns.

Plagued by penalties, especially in the first half, the Longhorns were unable to cross their hosts' double stripe until the second half. Jim Ned's lone tally came in the second quarter. The touchdown came on a plunge through the center of the line from the Bronte 1 yard line. The TD was set up after a sustained drive by the Indians placed the ball on the Longhorn 15 yard line. The down was No. 4 with 9 to go, but the Indians successfully passed and the ball was placed on the 1 from where they carried it over the goal line. The extra point try failed and the Indians led 6-0.

The Longhorns picked up steam with the beginning of the second half, and after a drive up the field Arrott went over from the Indian 2 yard line. Arrott also ran the conversion, which gave the Longhorns their 8-6 victory. The position on the 2 was set up on a 2 yard gainer by Larry Robinson.

Following the Bronte touchdown, the two teams had it nip and tuck for the remainder of the quarter. After the last quarter began, the

Indians were trying desperately to overcome the 2 point lead held by Bronte. Their attack, carried on the ground and in the air, was stopped short two times by the Longhorns defenders. During this period the Longhorns were obviously playing for time, and the local lads managed to hold on to the ball until the final whistle blew.

The Indians gave the Longhorns the toughest competition they have had all season. Their team was big and fast, and only constant effort by the Bronte line and backfield defenders kept them from outdoing the Longhorns. Outstanding defense was evidenced by Jerry McCutchen, Don Hester, Mike Luttrell, Jack Corley, Kenneth Shaver, Rudy Phillips and Douglas Rogers. Eddy and Donald Spiller, Robinson, Arrott, Buddy Walker and Rudy Olivas turned in a good performance in the backfield.

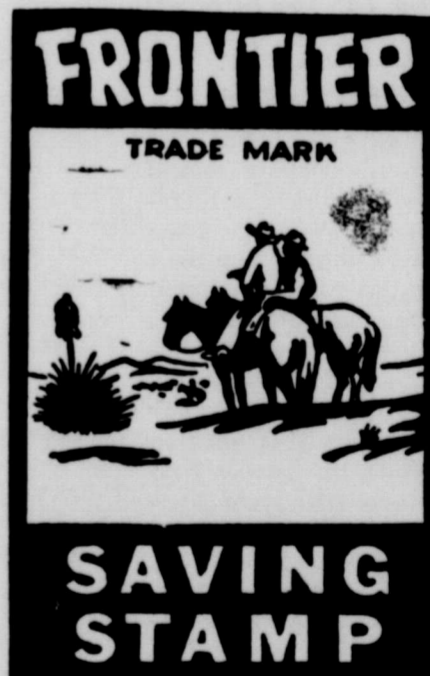

cek, delegates to the State Home Demcnstration Association meeting in Brownsville gave an interesting report on their trip to the members of the Home Demonstration Council September 23rd.

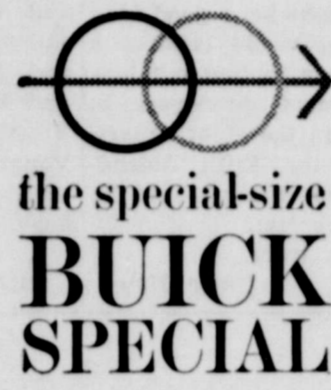

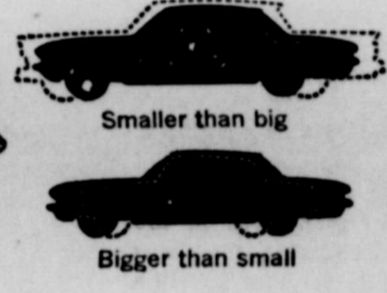

## \$452,880 Bid on Piping for New Oak Creek Plant

Bids for the piping contract at West Texas Utilities Company's new power plant on Oak Creek Lake were received Tuesday, Sept. 20.

The apparent low bid of \$452,880 was submitted by the National Valve and Manufacturing Company, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The second low bid was submitted by the H. B. Zachary and Company, of San Antonio. The six bids which were submitted on the project were opened in the office of T. J. McCarty, WTU Construction Engineer at WTU's General Office in Abilene.

The bid, which covered the installation of all piping at WTU's new \$10 million power plant, calls for construction to begin on April

1, 1961, with completion scheduled for December 31, 1961.

Engineers estimate that some 25 plumbers, steam fitters and helpers will be utilized in installing the more than 300 tons of pipe that will go into the plant. Pipe sizes range from ¼ inch copper pipe for instrumentation use to 20 inch diameter size. Some of the pipe installed will be designed for working pressures of 1,450 pounds per square inch.

The Austin Building Company, Dallas, Texas, General Contractors, began construction of the plant in May. The first 75,000 kilowatt generating unit is scheduled for operation early in 1962. The plant location is 11½ miles north of Bronte.

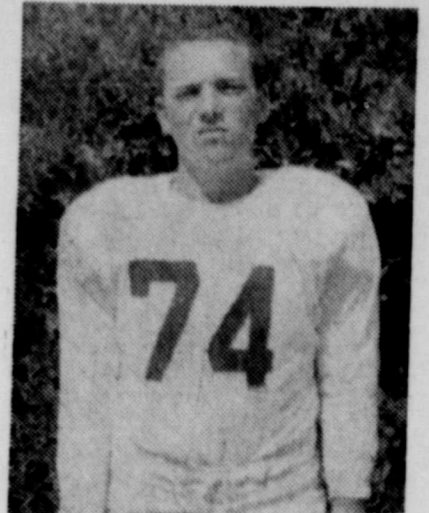

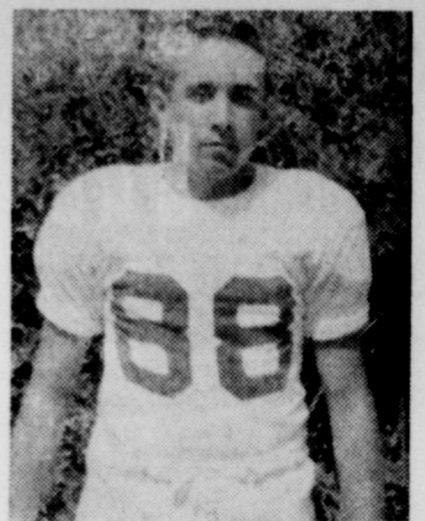
