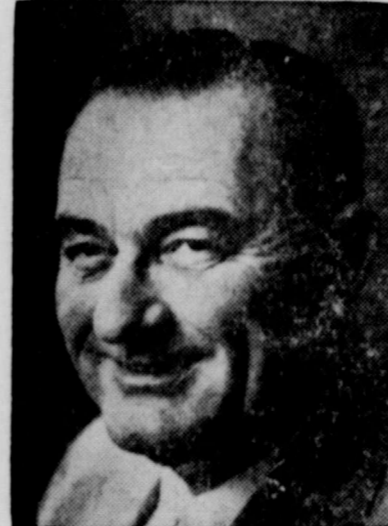
The Longhorns are favored to win the tilt this year. A season record of seven wins, one loss and one tie compares favorably with the Robert Lee record of five wins and four losses.

## Democrats Carry Coke

Coke County went along with the rest of the nation in backing Sen. John Kennedy and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for Democratic nominees for president and vice president of the United States. The nationwide election was held Tuesday, Nov. 8. In this county the Kennedy-Johnson ticket received 799 votes while Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, the Republican nominees, received 575 votes.

In the race for United States Senator, Lyndon Johnson won in Coke County as he did over the rest of the state, over Republican John Tower. In the county Johnson received 919 votes to 441 for Tower.

Governor Price Daniel won handily over the state, and again Coke County followed the trend, giving Daniel 1152 votes and Republican William M. Steger 225.

Constitutional amendments three and four carried in Coke County, but Nos. 1 and 2 failed to get a majority. The vote was: No. 1 — For 390, Against 415; No. 2 — For 531, Against 317; No. 3 — For 434, Against 415; No. 4 — For 579, Against 276. The above figures do not include the amendment vote from the boxes at Lometa and Divide.

All of the amendments carried on a statewide basis.

Robert Lee gave the Democratic ticket its heaviest vote in the county with Bronte a close second.

Democratic nominees for all other offices, state, county and precinct, carried by large majorities in Coke County.

## City Gets Okay On New Sewer

The City of Bronte received the official okay Monday afternoon to go ahead with construction of its new sewer system. The word was received from the State Health Department in a telegram to Mayor J. A. Stephenson.

The proposed contract with Clyde Construction Co. of Odessa was submitted to the Health Department for approval shortly after the bid was accepted on Oct. 19. Clyde Construction's bid amounted to \$129,527.

Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, said Tuesday that she talked with Scott Engineering Co. on the phone and that the approved contract has been sent to the Odessa firm for signing.

City officials expect the contract to be signed with no further difficulty and construction to begin in the near future.

The city has signed an agreement with Mrs. Annie Wilkins for the land on which the disposal plant will be located. It will be situated southeast of town.

## Longhorns Down Trent Gorillas 33-8 Friday Night

The Bronte Longhorns maintained their record of only one defeat this season when they beat the Trent Gorillas, 33 to 8. The win kept the Longhorn season clean except for the loss to Hermleigh, apparent winners of District 6-B.

The first quarter of the tilt with Trent went scoreless, but in the second quarter the Longhorns crossed their opponents' goal line on two occasions. Dee Arrott ran about five yards for both the counters. Try for extra point failed after the first tally, but Arrott's pass to Don Spiller was good for two points following the second TD.

A pass in the third quarter from Arrott to Don Spiller was good for a 39 yard touchdown play, but conversion try failed. Larry Robinson also carried the ball over for six points in the third period. He went over from the five yard line. Mike Luttrell kicked the extra point to make the score 27-0.

Early in the fourth quarter Buddy Walker did the honors for the Longhorns by taking the ball from the two yard line for the final Longhorn tally. Try for EP was no good, leaving the score at 33-0.

The Trent Gorillas kept right on trying to remove the zero from their side of the scoreboard and on the last play of the game Don Jones made the six point counter. Johnny Heatley ran the conversion making the score 33-8 in favor of the Longhorns.
