Delmir Sheppard Dies Suddenly

W. Delmir Sheppard, age 60, died suddenly at 9:15 p.m. Sunday at his home in Robert Lee from a heart attack.

Sheppard, a lifelong resident of Coke County, was born February 20, 1900 at Robert Lee. His parents were the late M. B. Sheppards of this county.

Sheppard was married to the former Miss Norma Whiteside October 29, 1922, at Robert Lee.

He was engaged in ranching in Coke County until his death. He operated several ranches in the Divide area and other parts of the county on which he raised sheep and cattle.

Sheppard was a member of the Methodist Church in Robert Lee and the Coke County Game Management Association.

One of his sons, Harold Sheppard, was killed in a highway accident near Spearman 7 weeks prior on a Sunday evening at 9 o'clock. Harold Sheppard was buried in the Robert Lee Cemetery October 11.

Funeral services for Delmir Sheppard were held at 2:30 p.m. under direction of Clift Funeral Home at the Methodist Church with the Rev. Travis McNair officiating.

Survivors other than his wife include three sons: Delmir Morris, Bert and Jerome, all of Spearman; one daughter, Mrs. Nelda Brock, of Shallowater; one brother; three sisters; and 15 grandchildren. Among Mr. Sheppard's grandchildren are Donna, Randy, and Ricky Sheppard of Bronte.

W. W. Millikin of Bronte was painfully injured late Tuesday night of last week when his pickup rolled several times about 11 miles south of Junction.

Mrs. Millikin reported Wednesday morning that her husband was getting along fine and she expects to go to Junction Sunday and bring him home. He has been in the Kimble County Hospital there.

Millikin had been to Uvalde on a hunting trip and was returning home Tuesday night when the accident occurred. Mrs. Millikin said that he apparently went to sleep and lost control of the vehicle. Her husband told her that the pickup turned end over end.

After the wreck, Millikin did not think that he was badly hurt and asked a passerby to have a wrecker sent out from Junction. However, the longer he waited for the wrecker, the worse he felt, so he stopped a Goodyear test truck driver and was taken into Junction to the hospital. 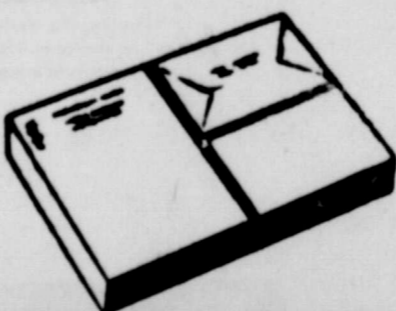
