## Four Longhorns Make 6-B All-District Teams for 1960

The Bronte Longhorns placed five players on the all-district offensive and defensive teams of District 6-B for 1960. Three made the offensive team and two were placed on the defensive team. One Bronte player, Mike Luttrell, made both teams.

The all-district teams were selected by coaches of the district at a meeting last Thursday night at Roby. In other business, Supt. Wise of Hermleigh was named chairman of the district for next year. It was also decided that officials from the Sweetwater Officials Association will be used exclusively in district games in the 1961 season.

## Contract for New Post Office Awarded to Abilene Couple

Contract for the construction of a new post office building here has been awarded to Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth L. Musgrave, P. O. Box 1743, Abilene, according to Bronte postmaster Noah L. Pruitt Jr.

Construction of the modern, air

conditioned structure is expected to begin at an early date on property owned by the City of Bronte.

This location is at the corner of Oliver Avenue and Washington Street, a site formerly occupied by South Texas Lumber Co. Occupancy is expected by

July 1, 1961.

The Government holds an option on the property which will be conveyed to the successful bidder. The building will be owned by the builder and will be leased to the Post Office Department for a term of ten years with two five-year renewal options.

Pruitt explained that private ownership of the building meant that the property would remain on local tax rolls.

"The leasing program also is responsible for Bronte getting the new building because no funds are available for the construction of federal buildings," he said. "It will be one of 1600 new post offices acquired this year under the leasing program."

The new Bronte Post Office will have 2,639 square feet of floor space and will feature the new divided lobby with the open patron-service counter. All equipment will be new.

## Final Census Gives Bronte 999

Bronte and Robert Lee almost held their own in population during the last ten years, according to final 1960 census figures, but the rural population of the county reflects the nation-wide trend of small farmers being forced off the farms and into the cities.

The final figures were released late last week. Bronte came up with a final figure of only one person under the 1,000 mark — 999. This is 21 persons below the 1950 count of 1,020. Robert Lee fell slightly under Bronte with 990, compared with 1069 in 1950. County wide, Coke lost 456 persons, having 3,589 in 1960, compared to 4,045 in 1950.

Coke County and the two incorporated towns in the county, however, did not lose nearly as heavily as did many of the rural counties which depend entirely upon farming and ranching to maintain their residents.

### Urban Area Gain

Abilene had the most phenomenal growth in this area during the past decade. The Key City almost doubled its 1950 figure, jumping to 90,368 in 1960 from 45,570 in 1950. San Angelo, experiencing a slight gain, had 58,815 compared with 52,093 in 1950. Other larger towns in this area which gained during the past ten years were Big Spring, Snyder, Del Rio, Lamesa, Sweetwater, Midland and Odessa. Brownwood and Colorado City both lost in population. Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls were the only three West Texas cities that passed the magic 100,000 mark.

Highway Department crews all over West Texas were busy Wednesday sanding bridges and hills, expecting them to be extremely dangerous Wednesday night.

The weather forecast for this area stated that a slight warmup should occur Thursday, with a high of 42 predicted.

## B. F. Meyer Burial Held At Bronte

BRONTE — Services for Benjamin F. Meyer, 59, of Shreveport, La., were held in Shreveport Tuesday with graveside services at 2 p. m. Wednesday in Fairmont Cemetery in Bronte. Clift Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Meyer, a supervisor-inspector for the Federal Aviation Agency, died Sunday afternoon in Shreveport after suffering a heart attack.

He was stationed at Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, from 1942 to 1946. He was a major.

Mr. Meyer had been with the FAA for 30 years, 12 of them in Shreveport. He was a native of Angola, Ind.

He was married to Mrs. Maurice (Mug) Kennedy in San Angelo in July 1948.

Survivors include his wife, two daughters, four brothers and three sisters.

He was the brother-in-law of Coke County Sheriff Paul Good of Robert Lee and a son-in-law of Mrs. Kate Good of Bronte.

In spite of the fact that Bronte showed a loss of 21 persons during the past ten years, we are taking the position that the city has actually grown during this period. The 1950 census was taken right in the middle of the oil boom and there were dozens of families living here in small apartments, rooms and trailer houses.

True, we lost 21 people, but the number of permanent residents no doubt showed a sizeable increase. Many new homes have been built in Bronte during the past decade and our population is much more solid than in 1950. So, if any of you are feeling downhearted about our loss, cheer up; we believe we've grown.

Our main worry should be the loss we've suffered in the rural areas of West Texas. The extended drouth during the 50's was to blame for a lot of the migrations from farms and ranches. Dry weather, coupled with not too patronizing government policies toward small farmers did the job up pretty well. What we need is some way to induce people to return to the land, but that's going to be quite a chore.

Good rains this week are bringing cheery smiles to stockmen of the Bronte area. Some of them act almost as if they'd received a Christmas present ahead of time.

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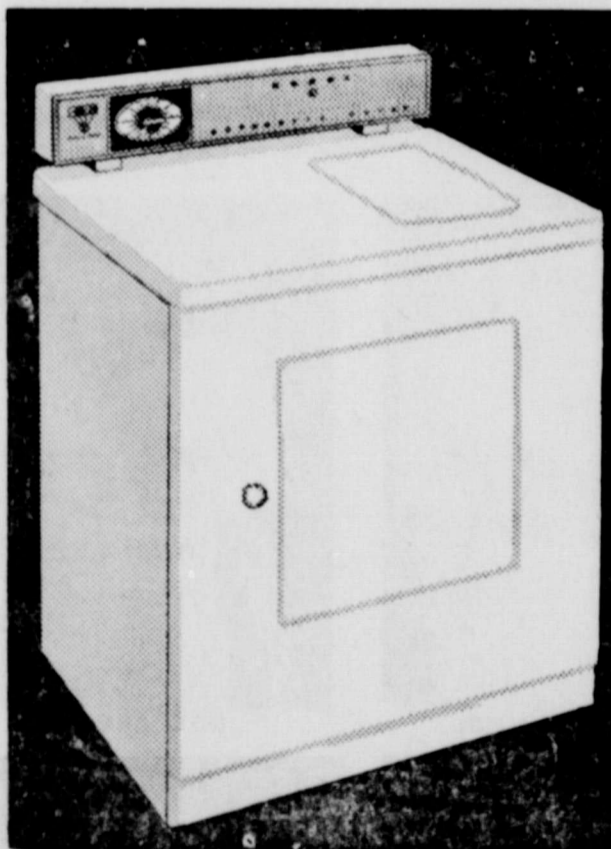

outscored Talpa 45-40. Noodle won the semi-final game from Robert Lee, 49-42. Consolation went to Winters B team which beat Lueders 54-36.

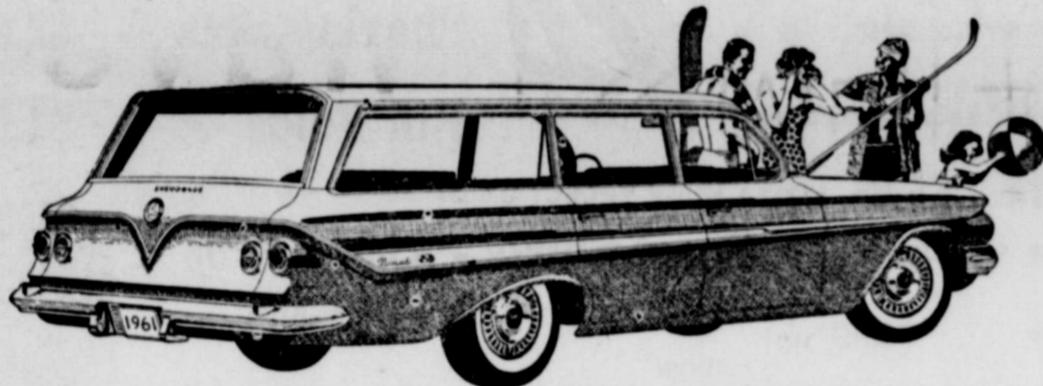

## Judge Denies New Trial in Condemnation Suit

From Robert Lee Observer

Coke County Judge W. W. Thetford, denied a motion for a new trial in the State of Texas vs. Edward M. Cumbie and others in a land condemnation suit at a special hearing Saturday in Robert Lee.

Marvin Scentell, attorney for the State of Texas, entered the plea for a new trial. He has 30 days to appeal the decision to the State Court of Civil Appeals. Earl Smith, a San Angelo attorney, represented Edward M. Cumbie and others of Bronte.

In County Court in Robert Lee on September 10 of this year a jury ruled in favor of Edward M. Cumbie and granted him \$2,201.09 for damages to his land.

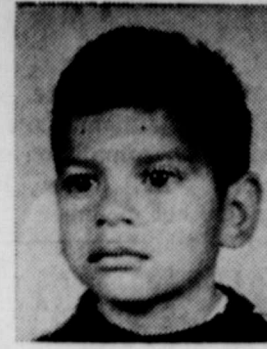

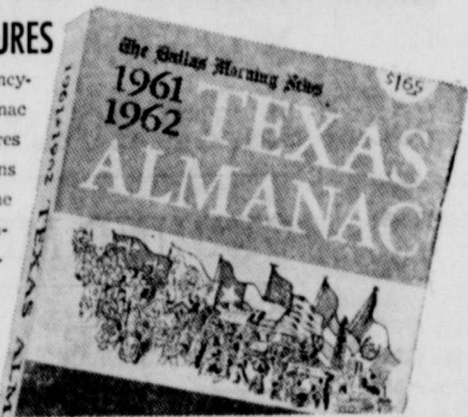
