Financing Offered on Lines to Sewer Mains

Bronte's city council has made arrangements with First National Bank in Bronte to help local residents finance the sewer lines on their property leading from outlets to the mains in streets and alleys.

As financing is a problem of no small importance to many Bronte residents, the opportunity to secure financial help at the bank is expected to increase the number of

persons who will be able to tie on while the sewer is under construction.

Approximately 220 persons have put up their \$25 deposits for the tie-on charge, and it is expected that more Bronte residents will tie on when they learn that the cost of laying their line to the main can be financed.

It was pointed out that any person who wishes to borrow money

for the purpose of installing a line should contact Mrs. Helen Kirkland, city secretary, at the city hall. She will instruct borrowers as to how to proceed in obtaining the money.

Earl F. Glenn, executive vice president of the bank, stated that a very nominal interest charge will be made on money borrowed for this purpose.

City officials pointed out that users of the sewer will be able to effect considerable savings by hooking on to the sewer while it is under construction, even if they have to borrow the money. The tie on charge while the system is under construction is \$25 and a \$50 charge will be made to tie on at a later date.

Progress Made This Week on New Sewer

Fine working weather this week has allowed Clyde Construction Co. to make steady progress on

Bronte's new sewer system. Much of the ditch work has been done and pipe has been distributed over most of the city.

Fred Sallings, superintendent of schools at Miles is the director general for the meets, and Bob Howard, Bronte athletic coach, is in charge of track and field events.

Starting at the lower end of the line, ditching machines have made their way up past Bronte Hospital and across the highway in the south part of town. Progress has also been made in the new addition in southeast Bronte.

Latest report to The Enterprise indicates that the contractor still expects to finish the job in 60 working days. This means that the project should be ready for use before summer.

Rather than cut the new highway which was recently completed in the south part of town, a crew was brought in to bore under the street. This work was done Monday.

Unavoidable damage to pavement is being done by the ditch diggers, but everywhere possible the lines are being laid in alleys and along the sides of streets at the edge of pavement.

Contracts of Barbee and Simpson Extended by Board

Two school officials were rehired at a meeting of the Bronte School board of trustees last Thursday night. Supt. C. B. Barbee was given a three year con-

tract and High School Principal Joe Simpson was awarded a two year contract.

Supt. Barbee is now serving his second year as head of the Bronte School. He came here from Tomball, where he was high school principal.

Simpson came to Bronte in 1955 from Brady. He has served in various coaching capacities and as math teacher as well as high school principal.

2 Bronte Firms Are Burglarized

Two business firms in Bronte were broken into sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning. Tidwell's Cafe and the Coffee Shop Cafe were burglarized and money was taken from cigarette machines and juke boxes, and cigarettes were removed from the cigarette machines.

Sheriff Melvin Childres and Deputy Jesse Parker investigated the burglaries, but Parker said Tuesday that clues leading to the discovery of the burglars were pretty scarce.

A window was broken out of Tidwell's Cafe, while the back door at the Coffee Shop Cafe was broken open.

Mrs. T. E. Tidwell operates the eating place which bears her name, while I. M. Cumbie operates the Coffee Shop. Both burglaries were discovered when the morning shifts of employees opened up Tuesday morning.

No estimate of the amount of money or the value of the cigarettes was learned.

Two Elections Set for April

Bronte's city council and the board of trustees of Bronte Independent School District have called elections of officers for the first week in April.

Two members will be elected to the city council and two trustees will be named to the school board.

The city election, which is set by law for the first Tuesday in April, will be held April 4. The law states that school trustees shall be elected the first Saturday in April; consequently, that election will be held April 1.

Terms of Councilmen Royce Fancher and Bill Luckett expire this year. Candidates who wish to run for the council positions must file with the city secretary at least 30 days before the election.

Thirty days prior to the election is also the deadline for filing for school trustee. Persons wishing to run should file their names with County Judge W. W. Thetford. Petitions signed by five qualified voters may also be used to place a person's name on the ballot. The petitions may be obtained from Hurlin Lee, president of the school board.

Trustees whose terms expire this year are Allen Sherrod, present secretary, and Jacob Bruce Morrow. Morrow has indicated that he will not be a candidate for re-election, and Sherrod was reported as saying that he "might" be a candidate.

Bobby Webb Is Soldier of Month

Pfc. Bobby Webb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayburn Webb, was named "Soldier of the Month" during January at Fort Leonardwood, Missouri. This award is based on performance and activities, and judged by officers.

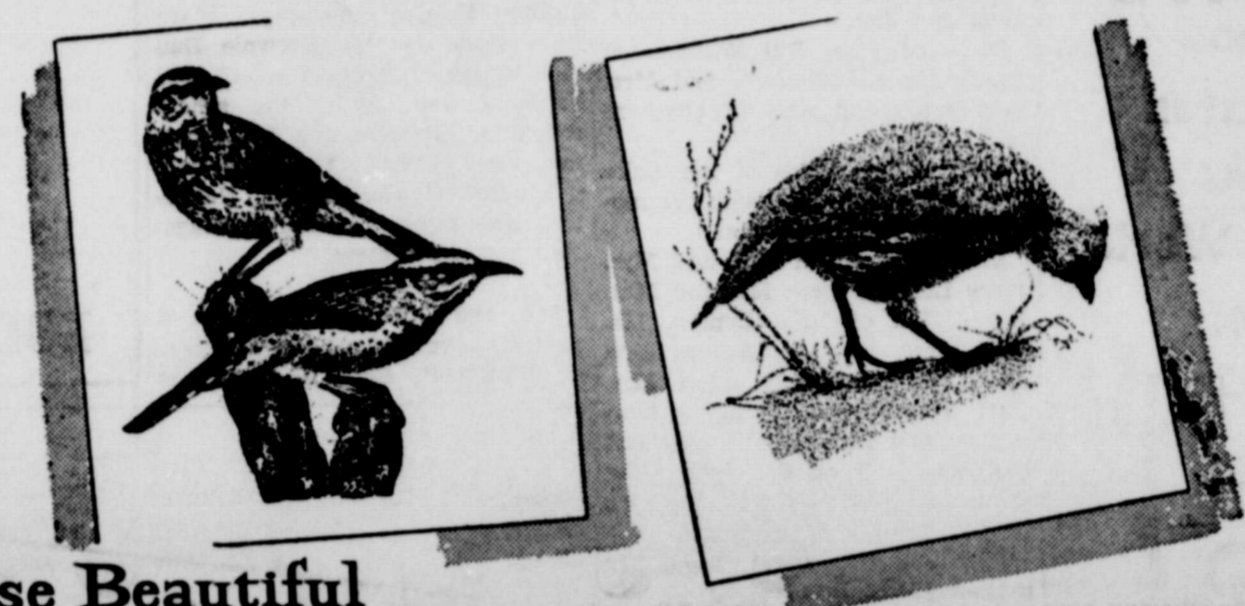

County Agents News Column

Official word of Coke County being certified as a modified-certified brucellosis free county was received from the Texas Animal Health Commission late last week. A certificate stating that Coke County has been approved for the period from January 25, 1961 to January 13, 1964, was received by the County Agricultural Agent.

Again I wish to emphasize that the cooperation of the line-up men in performing the duties that they volunteered to do and the operators of the county in submitting their cattle when called upon made it possible for the county to receive this designation with praise from members of the Animal Health Commission. Only last week a member of the Commission complimented our county on its cooperative spirit in the program.

Now that the desired certification has been granted it is our responsibility to remain within the limits allowed or better still to completely eradicate the disease. To do this each individual cattle owner will need to be certain of the status of the cattle he or she brings in. The program can only be as effective as we make it. It will be impossible for the Texas Animal Health Commission to keep abreast of the cattle movements over the entire state. We must share that responsibility.

The Balmorhea Substation will hold their annual Field Day on February 25 for persons interested in touring the station and hearing reports of tests conducted there during the past year. They will have some interesting reports to make on performance testing, supplemental feeding of range cattle and liquid supplements for range

cattle. Also, the results of their first year of testing steers with stilbesterol implants will be given as well as some other feeding test reports. It should be an interesting as well as educational Field Day.

Have you bought your planting seed yet? If you have not be sure that you check and know what you are buying. One way you can be sure of having good seed to plant is to buy certified seed. You can recognize certified seed by the BLUE tag and the state seal on the bag. This shows that the seed was grown of stock from approved sources and that it has made the superior performance that is required. Also, certified seed will be free of weed seed, seed of other crops and of inert matter.

Certified seed are usually higher in price than just plain seed but this is not always the case. Planting poor quality seed that are cheaper initially could lead to poor yields or a crop of poor quality.

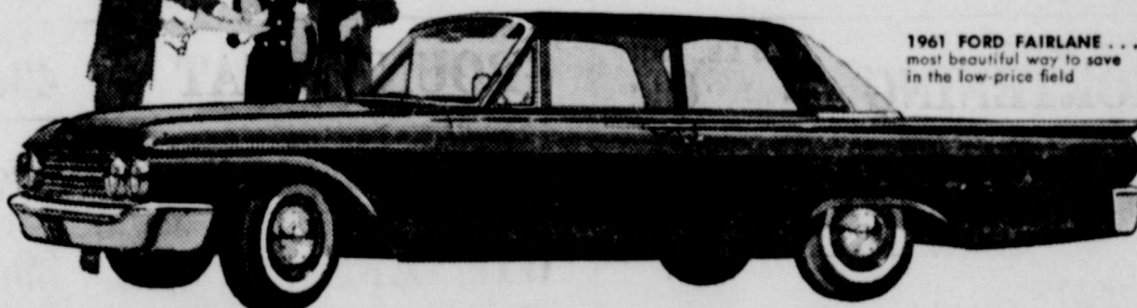

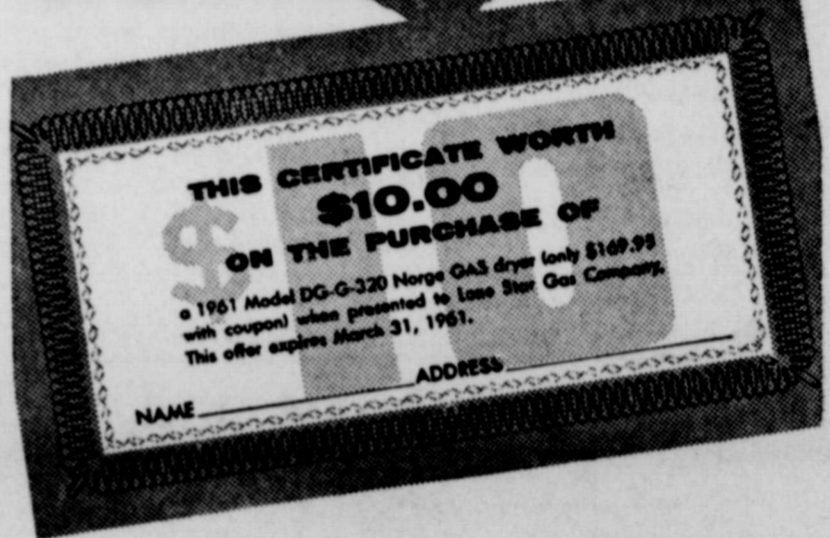

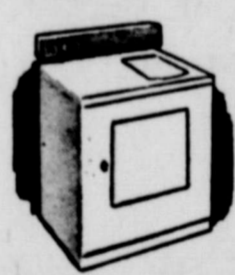
