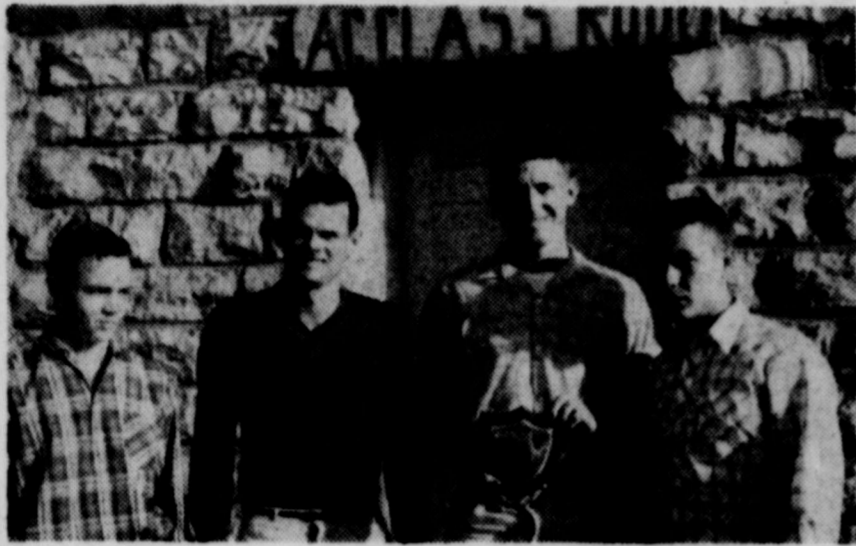

Livestock Judging Team Takes Third Place at Angelo Contest

Bronte high school's livestock judging team won third place honors at the livestock judging contest held last weekend in conjunction with the San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo. A total of 59 teams participated in the competition. Bronte's team, composed of Bobbie Allen, Dee Arrott, Jack Corley and Don Hester, made a total of 1,479 points.

Llano was high team with a score of 1,525; Bandera was second with 1,510. Other teams that had high scores, in the order of their placing, were Odessa, Fredericksburg, Crane, Midland, Menard, Brown County 4-H and Robert Lee.

J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture instructor and coach of the team, said that none of his team members was rated in the high individual placings, but that all of them were sufficiently high to total up the 1,479 points.

Henry said he was exceptionally well pleased with the results of the contest, and that he expects his team to be heard from in other contests this year.

Survey Starts On Kickapoo Dams

Flood prevention dams on the Kickapoo Creeks came a step nearer to reality this week when a surveying crew of the Soil Conservation Service moved in and started to work. R. W. White is here with a five-man survey crew.

The men are collecting information on Sites 1 and 4, so that the two structures can be designed. White said that in all probability the Kickapoo Water District would be able to advertise for bids on construction in two or three months.

F. S. Higginbotham, president of the water district, said that most of the preliminary work on the project has been completed. Only four more easements have to be secured, he said.

Locations of the six proposed structures are:

Site 1: On Barton and Glenn Waldrop.

Site 2: On Mrs. Eva Keeney.

Site 3: On Edward Rawlings.

Site 4: On W. D. McDonald.

Site 5: On Edward Rawlings.

Site 6: On Mrs. Edna Butner.

The flood control project has been underway here many years, after two disastrous floods caused many thousands of dollars damage to the City of Bronte and surrounding area.

The Kickapoo Water District was formed by a special act of the Texas Legislature. Members of the board of directors include: F. S. Higginbotham, president; D. K. Glenn, vice president; J. A. Percifull, secretary; and Preston Davis and Austin Sandusky, members.

Bronte Lions Club will sponsor a Broom Sale here Saturday, March 18. The same type merchandise which has been sold at these sales the past several years will be featured again this year. The items are made by the Texas Blind Shop. The big truck which houses the merchandise will be parked on the Main Street side of the First National Bank.

H. O. Whitt, who is in charge of the sale, said that the Lions Club, as well as the blind people who make the goods, will greatly appreciate the patronage of residents of the Bronte community.

Many items will be on sale, including all sizes of brooms, rubber mats, garage brushes, floor brushes, water mops, dust mops, dish cloths, ironing board covers and pads, pot holders, dust cloths, lint brushes, lawn rakes, damp and iron bags and other items. Toy brooms and mops as well as the real items, will be on sale for kids.

The merchandise which will be sold is known through the area for its unusual high quality. One person at the sale last year was heard to remark, "They shouldn't make this stuff so good. The broom I bought last year is still good."

Members of the Lions Club will make a house to house canvass in town, as well as having someone on hand at the truck to handle sales.

Proceeds made by the Lions Club will be used to carry on local projects of the organization.

Absentee Voting Begins Here

County Clerk, J. L. "Chilly" Tinkler announced this week that his office has received the official voting ballots for the special U. S. Senatorial election that will be held Tuesday, April 4.

Absentee voting begins this week. "A voter who desires to use the absentee ballot must come to the County Clerk's office and have in his possession his poll tax receipt," Tinkler said.

Deadline for absentee voting in the Special U. S. Senatorial race is three days prior to the regular election day, the date being in this instance, March 31.

The candidates, 71 of them, are listed alphabetically on the ballot.

Two Sewer Workers Receive Severe Burns

Two workers for Clyde Construction Co. were severely burned in two separate explosions last week. The explosions were caused from the ignition of gas in ditches being dug for Bronte's new sewer system.

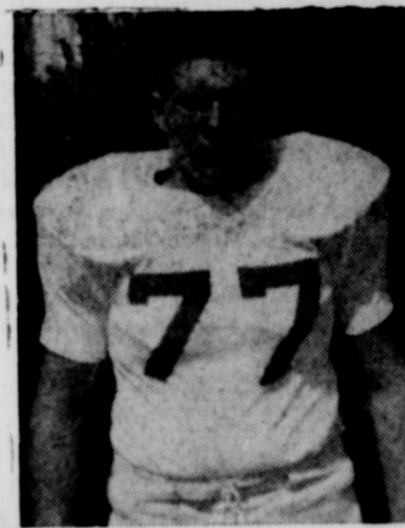
C. E. Kull was burned when a gas accumulation caught fire in the west part of town and H. O. Trijo was burned when gas in a manhole in which he was working caught fire. The second accident

occurred near Bronte Motor Co.'s building.

Dr. John R. Harris said Wednesday morning that the two men were resting. He stated that they both suffered 1st, 2nd and 3rd degree burns on the face, arms, forearms and hands. "They have been awfully sick," he said, "but are improving."

Lone Star Gas Co. had a crew of workmen here last weekend looking for leaks and repairing those found. Clifford Daniel of Miles, who is in charge of the gas system here for Lone Star, said that a large number of leaks had been found. He blamed the leaks on the construction work, saying that the ditch digging equipment had jarred the gas lines causing them to leak.

Larry Little, engineer in charge of the sewer construction, had the contractor to stop operations for a short time until cause of the gas leaks could be determined. Operations went back to normal Monday morning, however.

Mike Luttrell Signs to Play With Arkansas

Mike Luttrell, outstanding line-man on the 1960 Bronte Longhorn squad, has signed a pre-enrollment form to play football for the University of Arkansas Razorbacks. The pre-enrollment form commits him to play for Arkansas instead of any other Southwest Conference team. However, he still plans to make a trip on April 14-15 to West Texas State College at Canyon to look into an offer made by that school.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Luttrell Jr. of Bronte.

Coach Bob Howard said that Coaches Doug Dickey and Jim McKenzie of Arkansas were here last week contacting Luttrell.

Howard said that unless Mike decides to go to West Texas State he will sign a letter of intent to play for the Porkers after track season is over.

Luttrell did a fine job in the line for the Longhorns last season and was the only man in this district to be placed on both offensive and defensive All-District teams. He was also placed on the All-Area teams selected by the San Angelo Standard-Times and Abilene Reporter-News.

The offer made by Arkansas and West Texas State will give Mike a full four year athletic scholarship, which provides, room, board, tuition, books, fees and laundry expense.

Last Rites Held for Mrs. D. K. Glenn, 96

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. for Mrs. D. K. (Mollie) Glenn, 96, long time resident of Odessa. Mrs. Glenn died early Tuesday. Services were conducted from the First Baptist Church in Odessa, and burial was in an Odessa cemetery.

Born Mollie Sears, February 20, 1865, she came to Texas as a small child with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Bryant Sears. Mrs. Glenn attended Add Ran College near Granbury, which was later moved and ultimately became Texas Christian University.

Molly Sears and D. K. Glenn were married October 15, 1886, later moving to Midland where he operated the first livery stable. At the time of his death in 1935, they had lived in West Texas for half a century.

They were parents of nine children. One son, the late Bryant Glenn, was a resident of Bronte for many years.

Grandsons were pallbearers.

H D Agent's News Dept.

Plans for the 4-H Clubs Aunt Jemima Pancake Supper are coming along fine. We are getting some wonderful cooperation from Hale Kincaid and other Silver Lions, who are becoming very proficient at staging successful pancake suppers.

The one act play contests will be March 24 also; so we hope you will all come out to eat with us, then attend the plays.

The County Foods Contest will be April 8. All 4-H girls who are planning to participate should be selecting their recipe and working on a script. Scripts should be brought to my office within the next week to be checked.

The next time you broil steaks or hamburger patties try using a flavored butter such as Provolone Butter, Parmesan Butter or Basil Butter.

Spread one of the following butters generously on top side of steak or pattie. Broil 4 inches from heat, buttered side up for 3-5 minutes (depending on how well done the meat is desired). Salt. Turn steaks. Butter other side and salt well. Broil 3-5 minutes or until browned. Serve garnished with parsley.

Provolone Butter: Blend together ¼ cup (½ stick) softened butter, 1 teaspoon chopped onion, ½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce and

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2 tablespoons grated Provolone cheese.

Parmesan Butter: Blend together ¼ cup (½ stick) softened butter, 2 teaspoons oregano and 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese.

Basil Butter: Blend together ¼ cup (½ stick) softened butter, 1 teaspoon grated onion and ½ teaspoon basil.

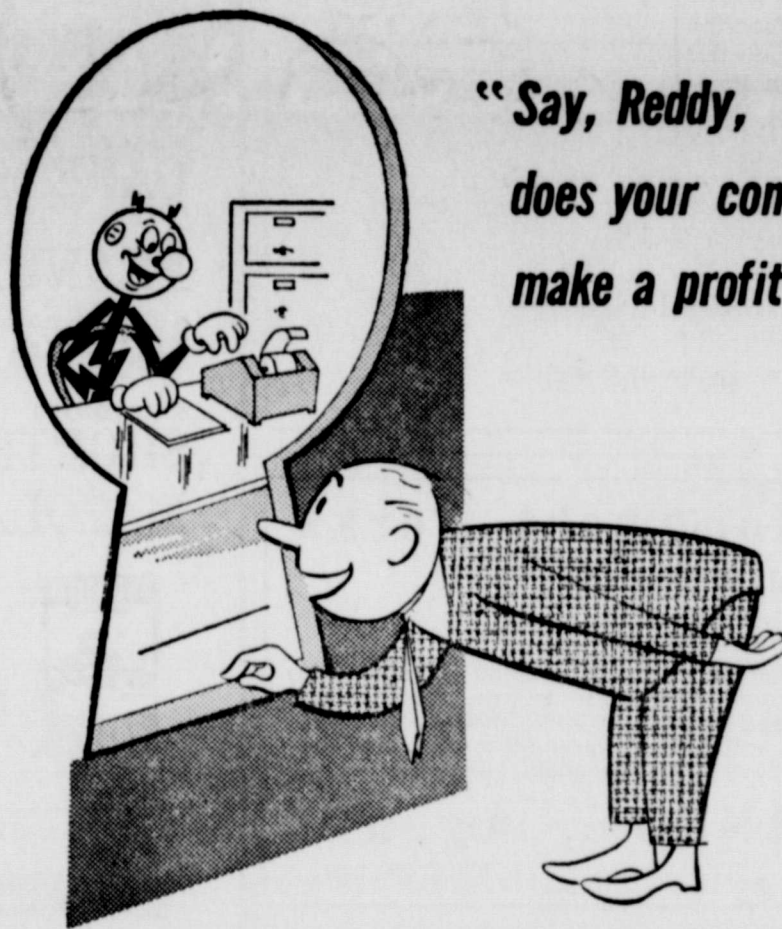

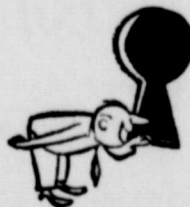

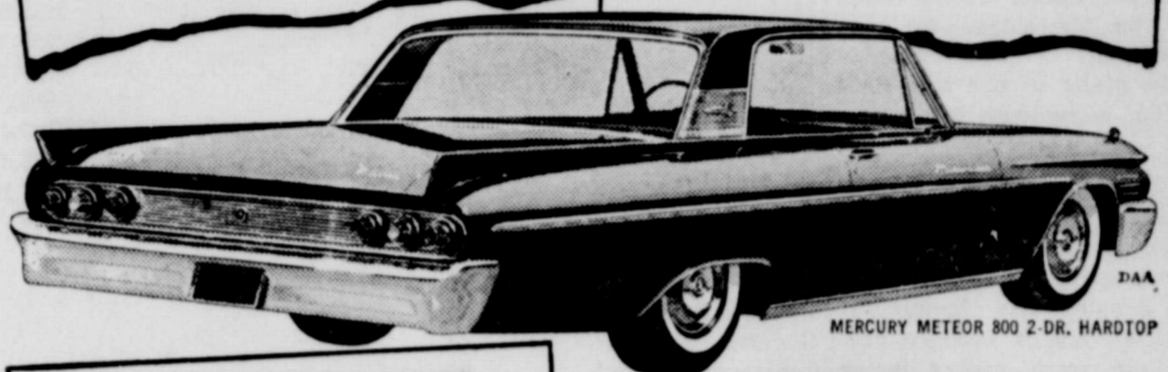

Mrs. Annie Wilkins, just south of Bronte, has completed seeding a field to native and introduced grasses. Last June she drilled grain sorghum in this field for a dead litter. As part of her Great Plains Conservation Contract she drilled Blue Panic, Sand lovegrass, Indiangrass, and Switchgrass to protest the field from erosion and for livestock grazing.

O. W. Newell, about three miles south of Bronte, is also carrying out a Great Plains Conservation Contract on his farm. He has seeded a field to Blue Panic in rows. He plans to use this field for grazing along with his rangeland.

An earthen diversion has been completed on the L. T. Youngblood stock farm about seven miles north of Bronte. The diversion is 836 feet long and is used to protect a field from excess water runoff.

R. C. Lasswell has completed an earthen diversion on his place about eight miles north of Bronte. The diversion is 1120 feet long and is used to divert additional water into a pond for livestock water.
