Funeral services for Mrs. W. J. Gideon, 69, were held Saturday, March 25, at First Methodist Church here at 10 a. m. Rev. Bob Grimes, pastor, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Lester Vinson, pastor of First Baptist Church, and Rev. R. W. Blackmon, pastor of Kickapoo Baptist Church.

Burial followed in Fairview cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Pall bearers were B. E. Modgling, J. L. Brunson, L. T. Youngblood, Sam Gray, H. O. Whitt and J. A. Percifull.

Mrs. Gideon died at 10 p. m. Wednesday, March 22, in Bronte Hospital following a heart attack. She had been in poor health for the past two years but was ill for only three hours before her death.

She was the former Annie Lockhart, born Sept. 2, 1891, at Sherwood, the daughter of the late W. W. and Sarah Teague Lockhart. She attended Sherwood schools and San Angelo College.

She was married Feb. 11, 1911 to W. J. Gideon at Bronte and they had made their home here since that time. They observed their golden wedding anniversary earlier this year.

She had taught school at Union and Bronte. She had been a member of Bronte Methodist Church for 46 years. She was a member of the Progressive Club and the Methodist W. S. C. S.

She is survived by her husband, and three children, George W. Gideon of Ozona, Mrs. Mack Gilliam of Odessa and Mrs. Ralph Meyer of Evergreen Park, Ill.; nine grandchildren; one great-grandchild, one brother, Ernest Lockhart of El Segundo, Calif.; and three sisters, Mrs. J. D. Leonard of Bronte, Mrs. Will Phillips of Ozona and Mrs. Tom Flanagan of Los Angeles, Calif.

Three Elections Set for Voters Next Few Days

The other two elections will be held Tuesday, April 4. One will be for the election of a United States Senator to fill the place vacated by Lyndon Johnson when he was elected Vice President of the United States, and the other will be to elect two councilmen for the City of Bronte.

Both Tuesday elections will be held at the city hall in Bronte. The senatorial election will also be conducted in all voting boxes in the county and over the state.

Write-in Campaign In Council Race

A write-in campaign was in the air Tuesday and Wednesday to get some additional candidates in the city council race. It became apparent Tuesday morning that the campaign was underway, even though no one contacted by The Enterprise would take credit for starting it.

The names of Royce Lee and C. E. Bruton have been mentioned as possible write-ins.

The Enterprise contacted both of them and they both said they were not seeking the jobs and did not want them.

Bruton wrote a letter to the editor in The Enterprise stating his position and thoughts on the matter of becoming a city councilman. He told The Enterprise publisher he would serve if elected.

In a talk with Lee, he stated that he would take the stand of Calvin Coolidge when he turned down an offer for a presidential nomination, and said, "I do not choose to run." Lee said that if he were on the council, he would be in favor of continued improvement in the city, and he stated "I have nothing but a 'pat on the back' for the men now on the council."

Lee said he was for erection of stop signs all over town, more and better street and alley upkeep, better traffic regulation, and other improvements. "These things take money," he said, "but they are what I am for." He added that he wanted the voters to know his stand on these matters before they considered writing him in for city councilman.

FOUR FOR COUNCILMAN

The race for city council positions is not quite so mild as the school trustee election. Four men are seeking the two positions, and a write-in campaign was in the air this week. It is more thoroughly covered in an accompanying story.

Candidates who announced and have their names printed on the ballot are Dr. John R. Harris, H. A. Springer, Royce Fancher and Dolan Mackey.

Fancher is the only candidate who is now serving on the council. Bill Luckett is the other outgoing member and is not a candidate for reelection.

Noah Pruitt Sr. will be election judge for the city election.

71 FOR SENATOR

The rash of candidates for U. S. Senator finally reached a total of 71 before the deadline. One candidate, Wesley Roberts, has withdrawn, but his name is on the ballot. Of the 71, six appear to be in the running. Two conservatives, Republican John Tower and Democrat William Blakley; two middle of the roaders, Will Wilson and Jim Wright; and two liberals, Maury Maverick and Henry B. Gonzales, have waged extensive campaigns and with their wide selection of political philosophies, give voters plenty of choice.

Every voting box in the county will be open for this election. Matthew Caperton will hold the election at Bronte. Other judges for east side voting boxes will be: C. N. Webb, Tennyson; R. V. Copeland, Olga; and Homer Cornelius, Juniper. Don Fields, Calvin McCutchen and T. R. Harmon will count absentee ballots.

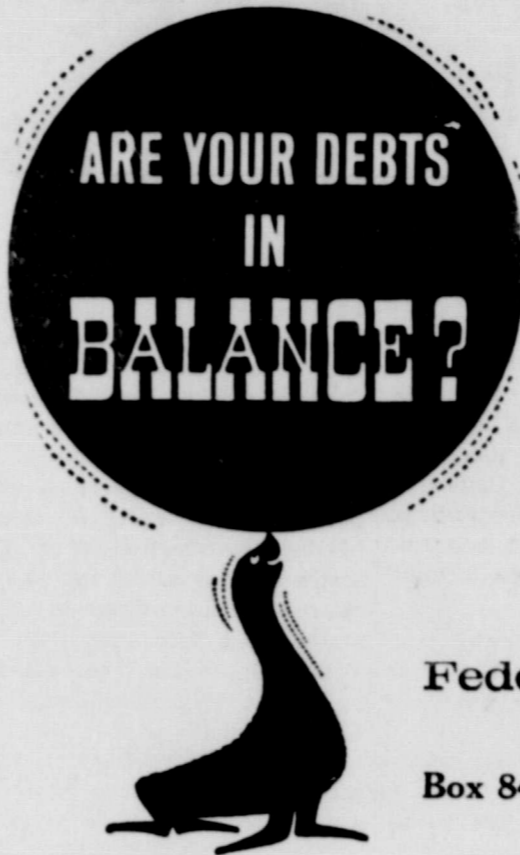

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County Agents News Column

RABIES SUSPECTED IN AREA

Rabies is not a pleasant conversational subject, but is a disease that has caused some alarm in the area in past years. It could happen again. Dr. Pearce Turner said that a few rabid animals have been found in the Water Valley area. Several suspects have been seen in this area in recent weeks.

Homer Jameson, Silver, killed a strange acting skunk about three weeks ago. His neighbor to the west, Arch Mathers, had one to get into his hog pen about a month ago and bite his son's Sears gilt.

A. B. Sheppard killed one that had been fighting his dogs a couple of weeks ago. And Jesse Parker reported a strange acting skunk found in Bronte about two weeks back.

None of the heads of the four skunks mentioned above was sent off to be tested for rabies. The skunks were acting strangely and we should assume that rabies may still be in the area. There is no cure for the dreaded disease so preventive measures should be taken to safeguard human and other life.

The Coke County 4-H Clubs have asked Dr. P. R. Turner of Water Valley to work with them on a prevention program. Dr. Turner will be in the area on Monday, April 10, to immunize dogs and cats against the disease. We will outline a time schedule next week. We sincerely hope you will take advantage of the opportunity to have your pet immunized.

A new publication is off the press that should interest sheepmen of the area—"Performance Testing of Rams as an Aid in the Improvement of Pinewool Sheep." The publication outlines the following procedures for testing ram lambs: Select the most promising ram lambs at weaning and put them on post weaning performance tests; identify each animal, shear and weigh; place the rams on good range or self-feed in dry lot; weigh the rams periodically to determine the rate of gain; shear a second time at the next regular shearing; score the animals and dispose of the low performers.
