AN OPEN LETTER

TO THE CITIZENS OF BRONTE:

Due to the many rumors that have been circulated around the town in the past few weeks, we, the city council, feel that we should clear up a few points. First of all, it has never been the plan for everyone to have \$2.50 added to their water bill regardless of sewer service or not. Customers only will be billed for the \$2.50 rate. Compulsory tie-on will be limited to extreme cases of health hazards and then at the option of installing adequate cess-pool facilities.

The City Council urges everyone to tie on to the sewer system if it is at all feasible, but it is not our intention to induce hardship upon anyone. We invite your questions and suggestions upon any phase of the ordinances that have been passed or ones that may be passed in the future.

Pets to Be Immunized Here Monday

The Coke County 4-H Clubs will sponsor a Rabies Immunization Day Monday, April 10, with four stops planned over the county. Dr. P. R. Turner, D. V. M., of Water Valley will be present to vaccinate all pets and other animals desired immunized.

The vaccinating will be done at four locations in the county, starting with Silver and ending at Tennyson.

The schedule is as follows:
Silver, Ball Park—9:00-10:00 a.m.
Robert Lee, Show Barn—10:30-12:00 noon.

Bronte, Feed Barn in Park — 1:30-3:30 p. m.
Tennyson, school house — 3:45-4:30 p.m.

You probably can recall how alarmed Coke County and the area became when the incidence of rabies among domestic and wild animals increased sharply. Numerous persons over the county were exposed to the disease and required to be immunized. We do not anticipate having as much rabies during 1961 and vaccinating all pets against the disease will reduce the incidence. You are aware of the finalness of the disease in every known case. We sincerely trust that everyone will respect the disease and have their pet or pets immunized. The only control for rabies is the prevention of rabies.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Cost of the immunization is only \$3.00.

Big Vote Here in Tues. Elections

Blakley Leads in Coke; Wright and Tower 2nd and 3rd

Coke County didn't go along with the majority of West Texas counties in the special senatorial race Tuesday that voted for Republican candidate John Tower. William (Bill) Blakley carried 7 of the 12 (including absentee) Coke County voting boxes with a total of 182 votes.

The voting in Tuesday's election was comparatively light with only 598 votes registered including 10 absentee votes. Heaviest vote cast was in the Bronte box with 222 ballots.

Representative Jim Wright of Fort Worth was the nearest candidate to Blakley with 146 votes. John Tower, Republican candidate of Wichita Falls, ran close to Wright with 138 votes. Texas Attorney General Will Wilson polled 86, Maury Maverick 29 and Henry Gonzalez 6. All others polled 11.

Fancher and Bruton Win in City

A large turnout, 180 strong, came to the polls Tuesday to vote for two aldermen for the City of Bronte. Royce Fancher, incumbent, and C. E. Bruton, a write-in candidate, were the two top men and were elected to serve two years on the local city council. Four candidates were listed on the ballot, and a write-in campaign

started last week added two more contenders to the race. Candidates on the ballot and their vote follows: Fancher, 114; Dolan Mackey, 27; Dr. John R. Harris, 37; Haywood Springer, 30.

Write-in candidates and their vote were: Bruton, 87, Royce Lee, 30; and J. B. Mackey, 1.

The unusual situation of a write-in candidate winning an election was brought about when a campaign was begun last Tuesday to promote the candidacies of Lee and Bruton.

Neat Pruitt Sr. was election judge for the city voting.

Construction Begins on New Post Office

Work has been underway this week on Bronte's new post office building, which will be located at the corner of Oliver Avenue and Washington Streets, the location of the South Texas Lumber Co. yard before it was torn down.

Plumbing and foundation work have been done this week, preliminary to the work on the floor and walls. The new structure will contain approximately 2,639 square feet of floor space, plus a loading platform and adequate space for parking and maneuvering trucks.

The building will be modern throughout, with central heating and air conditioning.

The post office department will lease the building for ten years with two successive renewal options.

Mrs. Wilson Sharp Has Auto Wreck

Mrs. Wilson (Nita) Sharp was still undergoing examination Wednesday noon for possible injuries received when her car overturned Tuesday evening about ten miles north of San Angelo.

Her husband said the accident occurred on a hill when the right front tire blew out and the car turned end over end. He said conflicting reports had been received as to how many times the car turned over. One witness said it turned over three times, while others said it turned over once.

Sharp said Wednesday that no serious injuries had been found, but that his wife still had some more tests to take. He said the automobile was a complete loss.

Howard said Tuesday that Robert Lee is a slight favorite to win the district, but that Bronte has a good chance to upset the Steer tracksters. The local coach stated that Robert Lee's track team is built around senior boys, while Bronte's tracksters are most all juniors and sophomores. The added year of experience gives the Steers a slight edge, he said.

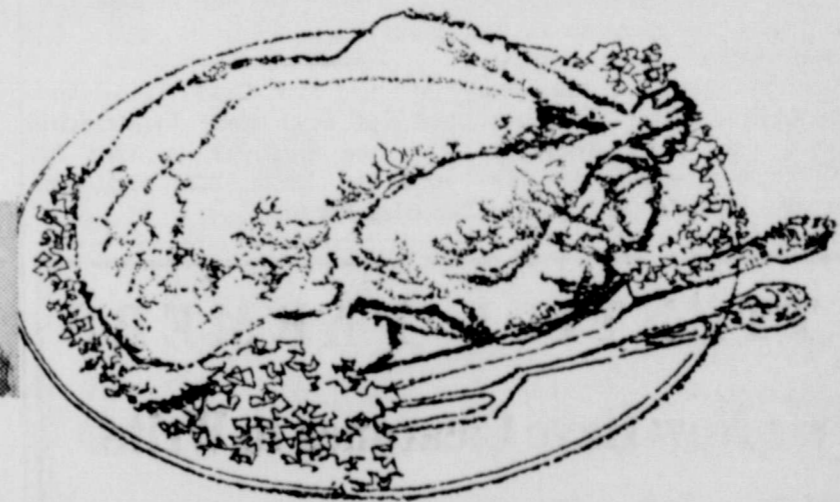

WEST TEXAS UTILITIES NAMES NEW VICE PRESIDENT, DIRECTOR

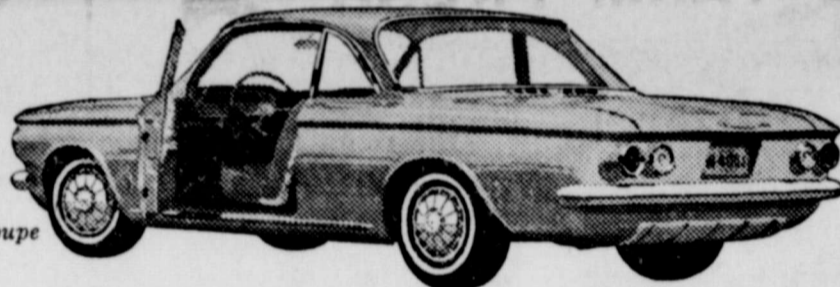

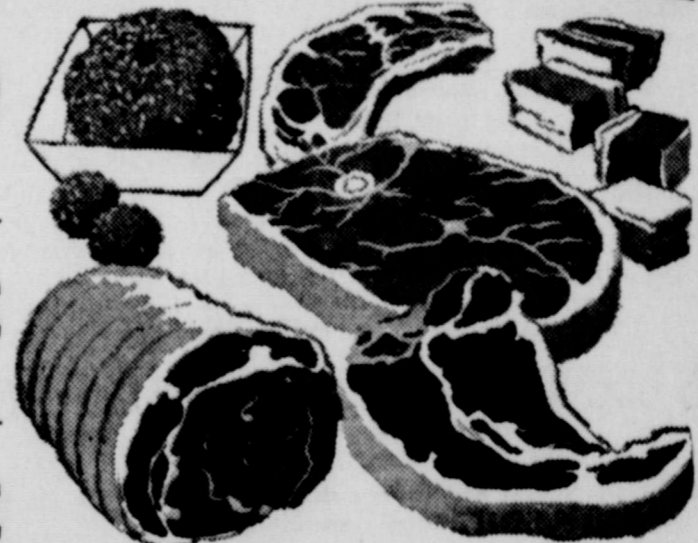
