Last Rites Held For Mrs. Eaton, Pioneer Woman

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, July 14, at Kickapoo Baptist Church for Mrs. Harriet Louise Eaton, 91. Mrs. Eaton, a pioneer woman of this community, died at 7:30 a. m. Monday in Abilene. She suffered a slight stroke about three months ago and never improved from the illness. Rev. R. W. Blackmon, pastor of the church, officiated.

Mrs. Eaton was born Aug. 31, 1869, in Milano, the daughter of J. H. and Rebecca Denton Offield. As a girl she attended school in Coryell County. She was married to F. R. (Pink) Eaton in 1887 in Hamilton County. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

Mrs. Eaton is survived by two sons, Frank Eaton of Bronte and Jack Eaton of San Angelo; two daughters, Mrs. Odessa Kightliger of Denver, Colo., and Mrs. May Pendergrast of Abilene; two brothers, Ira and Charley Offield of Breckenridge; a sister, Mrs. Edna Matlock of Breckenridge; 12 grandchildren, 12 great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren. Miss Ada Woullard and Leslie Woullard of Bronte are cousins of Mrs. Eaton. A large number of nieces and nephews also survive.

Mrs. Eaton was the oldest of eight brothers and sisters, four of whom are still living.

Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Jesse Parker, Steve Badley, Howard Brock, Leslie Lammers and two of Mrs. Eaton's grandsons.

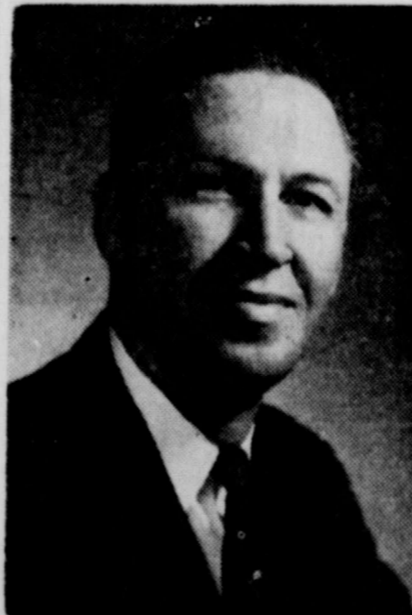
First Baptist Revival Starts Sunday, July 23

UNCLE HUIE from HOG CREEK says

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

I see by the papers where the new Postmaster General says the finances in his department is all out of whack. He is advising that we got to hike the rates another notch or two, maybe three. We been getting that song from ever Postmaster General, Democrat and Republican, fer 40 year and the finances git worse and worse and the rates git higher and higher. About two more Postmaster Generals and it'll be cheaper to go see a feller than write him a letter.

I don't think finances is the only thing out of whack in this department. Fer instant, out here on the rural route I can mail a parcel post package weighing 70 pound, making the mail man haul it into town and git it off fer me. But if I haul it into town myself and mail it at the window they won't take but 40 pound of parcel post. Don't ask me why. It's the post office Department that's crazy, not me.

I ain't saying they ain't some excuse fer it. Sometimes they is technical reasons fer things that don't meet the eye. A feller has to figger all the angles afore he can pass sound judgment on somepun. I recollect onct when a travelling salesman stopped at

one of my neighbor's house and ask him how fur it was to town. Friend neighbor told him as how he allowed it was 4 mile there and 6 mile back. When the salesman ask him how come it was more one way than the other, he told the salesman he walked straighter going than he did coming home.

The Congress has been working on this problem of post office finances so long and getting no place that I figgered I better bring it up at the store Saturday night. The thing hadn't been in the committee more'n 10 minutes till the fellers had it solved.

One feller said he was reading last week where our Government has spent \$86 billion on foreign aid in the last 15 year, averaging around \$5.7 billion a year. The post office is coming up short about two-thirds of one billion ever year, so he allowed as how we could pinch a little piece of that foreign aid off ever year and pay up the postal deficit. Another one of my expert friends claimed that them countries like the Congo and Vietnam would never miss it, especial since the grafters git about half of it anyhow. August Set As Roundup Time For Boys Ranch

"When It's Roundup Time in Texas" is more than the name of a well-liked range song to everybody connected with Boys Ranch of West Texas near San Angelo. It reminds them of the annual Fall Roundup Sale of donated livestock which was instituted last year and which has already become vitally important to the Ranch's hard-pressed budget.

The month of August will be roundup time this year. That's when West Texas ranchmen will be asked to donate whatever livestock they can afford — whether it be a good calf or a worthless old ewe — for sale.

Donations of livestock will be attended to by the acting Auctions and Wagon Bosses listed below in this story. Donated livestock will be accepted and sold for the benefit of the Boys Ranch, without handling charges, by the auction firm at any regular sale tirely net, thanks to the generosity of the ranchmen who give the livestock and to the aucion company.

Boys Ranch of West Texas is home to 55 to 60 boys who, because of circumstances beyond their control, need a home where they can get the love and training necessary to become good citizens. Along with this, they also require housing, food and decent clothing.

Last year, a single special sale at Producers Livestock Auction in San Angelo yielded several thou-

Proceeds of the sale will be ensand dollars. But stockmen in charge of the sale noted that many ranchmen were unable to donate livestock at one particular time. This year's roundup sale is spread throughout August and is being assisted by 14 leading auction firm in various parts of West Texas.

Local "Wagon Bosses" will also participate in the campaign, contacting prospective donors and rendering all possible help to the stockmen and auction operators. It's an area-wide effort to give

West Texas stockmen an opportunity to do whatever they can to help a worthwhile cause, and to lend a helping hand whose chance for a better life depends on their generosity.

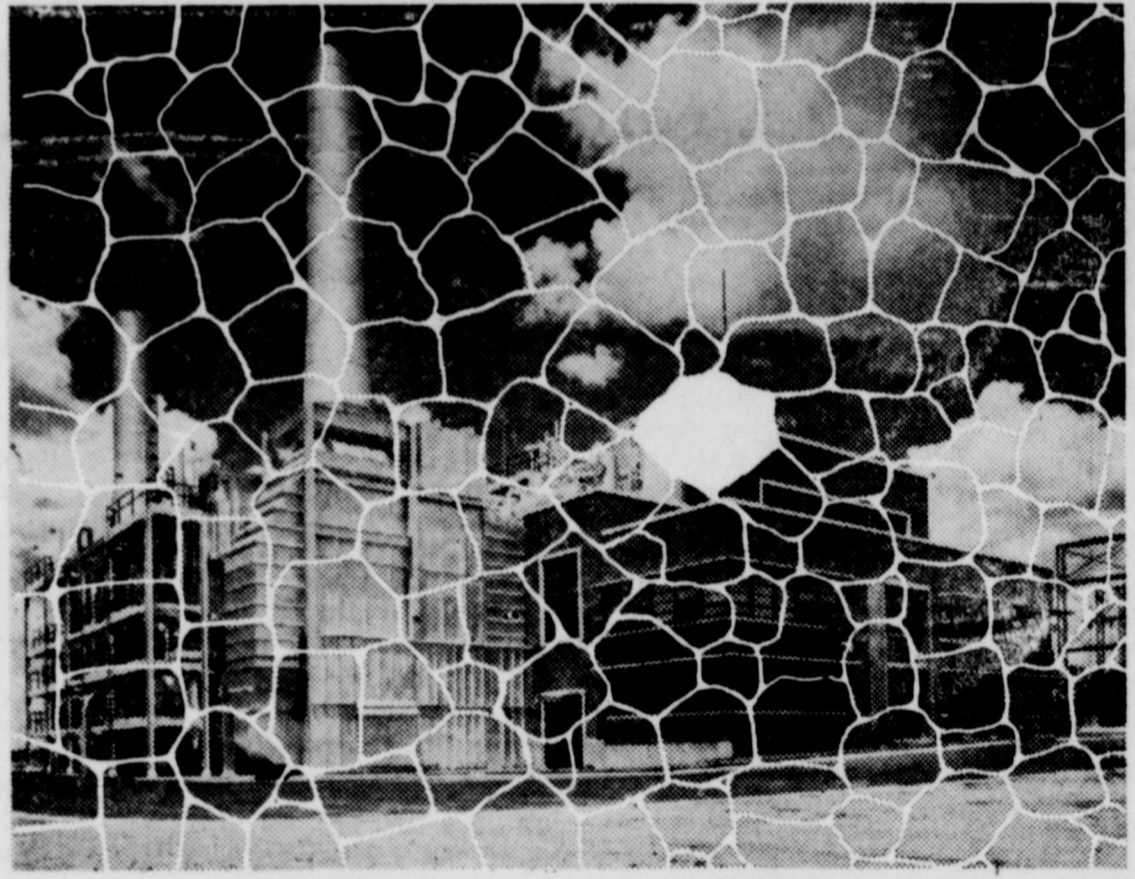

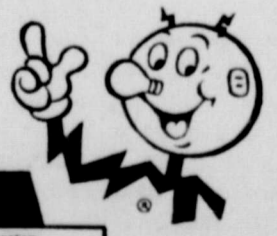

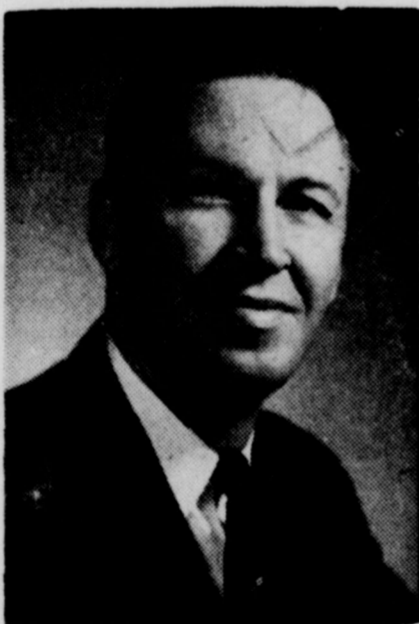

**Babes of Wild Picked Up
At Your Own Risk**

Despite warnings to refrain from picking up young of the wild, the practice persists in many areas, according to J. B. Phillips, assistant director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

"Wardens all over the state have been notified to make arrests where violations are reported," he says. Too many people are inclined to pick up baby animals, especially fawn deer. These animals have a much better chance of survival in their native woods than they do in the city, even when bottle fed."

He also pointed to the danger of having these animals for pets when they grow up. There are many instances where the animals will revert to the wild and seriously injure the person who raised them.

Phillips also warns against molesting nesting birds or tampering with other young wild game.

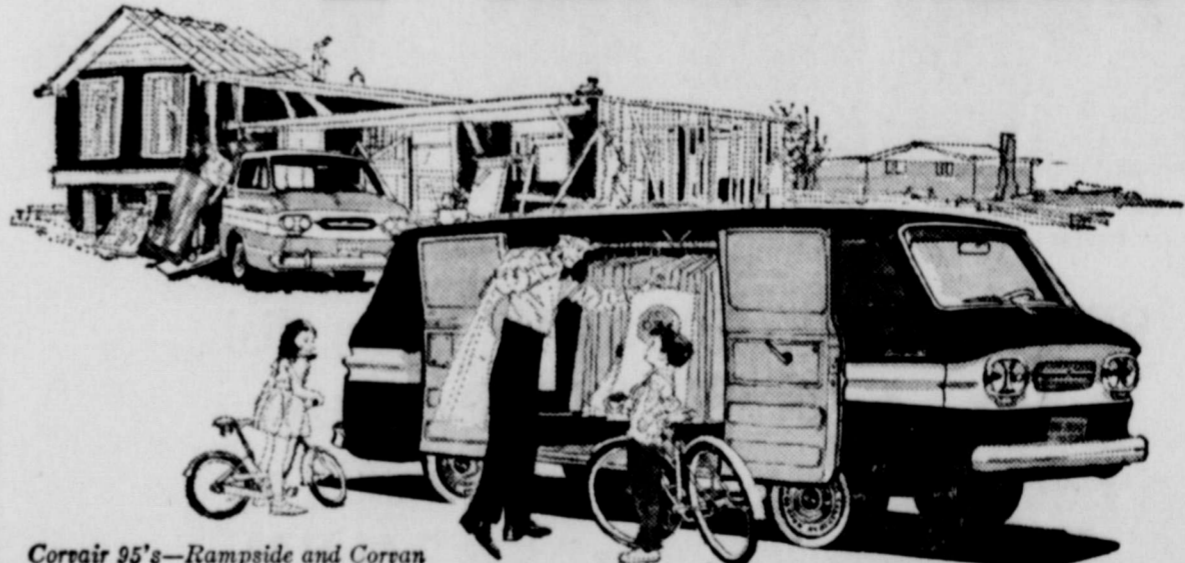
