Church of Christ to Have Grand Opening

The congregation of Bronte Church of Christ will be celebrating Sunday when they have the official opening of their new church building. The new structure was recently completed and has been in use the past two weeks.

The new building is of concrete tile and brick construction. Dimensions of the auditorium are 40x70 feet, with an additional space of 28x40 under the roof for Sunday School classes. The new part of the building cost approximately \$19,000, and with the Sunday School wing and equipment the entire plant is valued at about

\$38,000.

The church is issuing a special invitation to everyone to attend the Sunday services. In addition to the regular services at 10:50 a. m. and 6 p. m., the church is sponsoring a lunch at the park at 1 p. m. and a special program of congregational singing will be held at 3 p. m. Following the singing, the church building will be open for inspection by everyone present.

A gospel meeting is also underway at the Church of Christ. Starting last Sunday, Aug. 6, the meeting will be concluded Wednesday, Aug. 16. J. B. Hudson of Roscoe is the visiting preacher. Joe Wolf, minister of the church, said that everyone in this area is invited to attend any or all of the remaining services.

The new auditorium is of laminated beam construction, giving the ceiling a semi-circular shape. This type building does away with all supports which might hamper the vision of those attending services.

The structure is centrally air conditioned and heated. Indirect lighting is used throughout. In the back of the building are located a Sunday School classroom on one side of the entrance and the minister's study on the other side. A large foyer occupies the space between the two rooms.

Constructed over these rooms is a balcony which has been designed to house the church's nursery. It is glassed in so those using it can see the rest of the congregation, but is practically sound proof, thus eliminating disturbing noises. A loud speaker in the nursery allows persons occupying the room to hear the services.

A new baptistry has been installed at the back of the pulpit. It is made of steel and has been covered with blue fiberglass.

The Bronte Church of Christ has 102 members and the average attendance is 120 to 130 each Sunday. Early day history of the Bronte Church is not available, but it is known that the building recently vacated was built in 1926. It is believed that the church started employing a full time minister in 1948. Prior to that time young ministers from ACC preached to the congregation most of the time.

The Bronte Church sponsors a gospel meeting each summer, and vacation Bible School is held each year for youngsters of the community.

Joe Wolf, present minister, has served the church since October, 1960. Other recent ministers include W. L. Fry, who came here in 1948. He was followed by Idus England, Leon Sharp, Bill Pugh, Melvin Placke.

Elders of the church are James Al Brown, Owen Cosgrove, and Allen, Austin Sandusky and Horace Taylor. Deacons are Horace Grigg, C. E. Bruton, Albert Bragewitz and A. Wynne.

Gray Construction Co. of Hobbs, N. M. was general contractor for the building project.

Faculty Complete For School Term

Three teachers were recently employed by Bronte School District to complete the faculty for the 1961-62 school term.

The three new teachers are: Mrs. LaRue Ussery Broussard, who will teach Spanish, some English and serve as librarian; John E. Hartsell, who will be high school English teacher; and Bobby Eugene Bingham, who will be director of Bronte School's Band.

Mrs. Broussard, whose main duty will be teaching Spanish and working in the library, taught last year at DeLeon. She has had 12 years teaching experience, and has also taught at Scranton and Desdemona. She has a Bachelor of Arts degree from TSCW at Denton.

Mrs. Broussard is a member of the Methodist Church. She has two sons, one the seventh grade and one a high school sophomore. They will live in one of D. K. Glenn's rent house.

Hartsell, the new high school English teacher, is graduating this month from Howard Payne College at Brownwood. This is his first position as a public school teacher. His home town is Chico.

The new English teacher was recently married to the former Pat Guinn of Burnet. She will graduate Aug. 31 from Shannon School of Nursing in San Angelo. Hartsell is a member of the Baptist Church.

Bingham, who will be Bronte's band director this coming year, has a Bachelor of Music degree from Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. He is working on his Master's Degree this summer.

Jesse Parker Nabs Two Suspects and Stolen Automobile

Three Latin American youths allegedly stole an automobile belonging to Betty Read of San Angelo late Monday evening. The car was parked in front of the Shannon Hospital when the theft occurred.

An alarm was broadcast to law officers in the vicinity surrounding San Angelo, and Texas Ranger Ralph Rohatch ordered roadblocks to be placed at strategic points.

Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker discovered the automobile being driven through Bronte. He immediately gave chase and halted the automobile north of Bronte. While he was making the arrest one of the trio escaped. The two being held in San Angelo City Jail are Samuel Luna, 18, and Antonio Menchaca, 18.

Horses were provided for law officers by Mr. Joe Hester of Bronte to aid them in trying to apprehend the fugitive. Bloodhounds were brought from Sonora but the dogs ran into difficulty because of dense growth of grassburrs.

Law enforcement officers worked all night Monday in an effort to catch the Latin American youth, but were unable to capture him.

Sheriff Melvin Childress, who also aided in the roadblock, said that he wanted to express his appreciation to the many, many citizens for the cooperation that they gave law enforcement officers in this incident Monday night.

The Nolan Butler family visited over the weekend in Eastland where his brother, Bruce Butler, is seriously ill.

Improvements include construction of a half million gallon tank for storage of treated water, the construction of approximately 3,050 feet of 8 inch, and 3,350 feet of 6 inch water line, and the installation of additional fire plugs.

The UCRA is financing the project for the City of Bronte. The principal will be repayable on a monthly basis at no interest charge. Payments now made to the UCRA on the city's mains from Oak Creek Lake to Bronte amount to \$700 per month. The additional cost will add but little to this amount.

Henry Recognized For 25 Years of Voc. Ag. Teaching

J. T. Henry, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture in Bronte Public Schools since 1936, received the Distinguished Service Award of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas, in Austin, August 9. Henry has taught Vocational Agriculture for 25 years, all of which have been in the Bronte Schools.

The award was presented at an Awards Breakfast sponsored by the Association. It is part of the state-wide conference of Vocational Agriculture Teachers, designed primarily to allow teachers to explore new trends in agriculture and participate in workshops. Education features of the four-day meeting were under the direction of George Hurt, Director of Agricultural Education, Texas Education Agency. He was assisted by J. A. Marshall, E. C. Weekley, E. L. Tiner and ten Area supervisors.

Henry, a 1932 graduate of Sterling City High School, received his Bachelor of Science degree at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, in 1936, and his Master's Degree at Sul Ross College, Alpine, in 1953.

Active work with FFA members in Livestock and Leadership contests which have taken top honors in state competition, won for Henry the Honorary Lone Star Farmer Degree in 1946. The state's highest award was conferred by the Texas Association of the FFA.

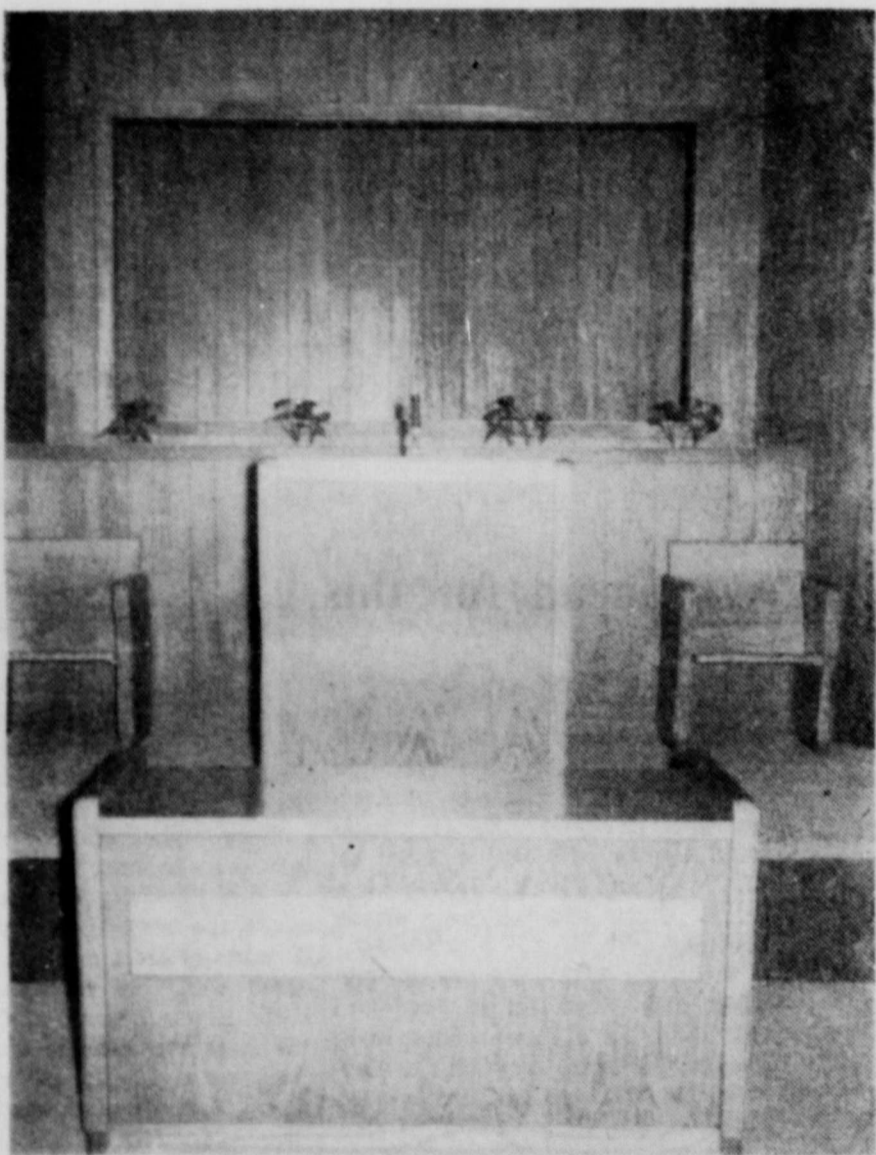
Henry is active in community and church activities, being a member of the Methodist Church, Bronte Lions Club and Masonic Lodge.

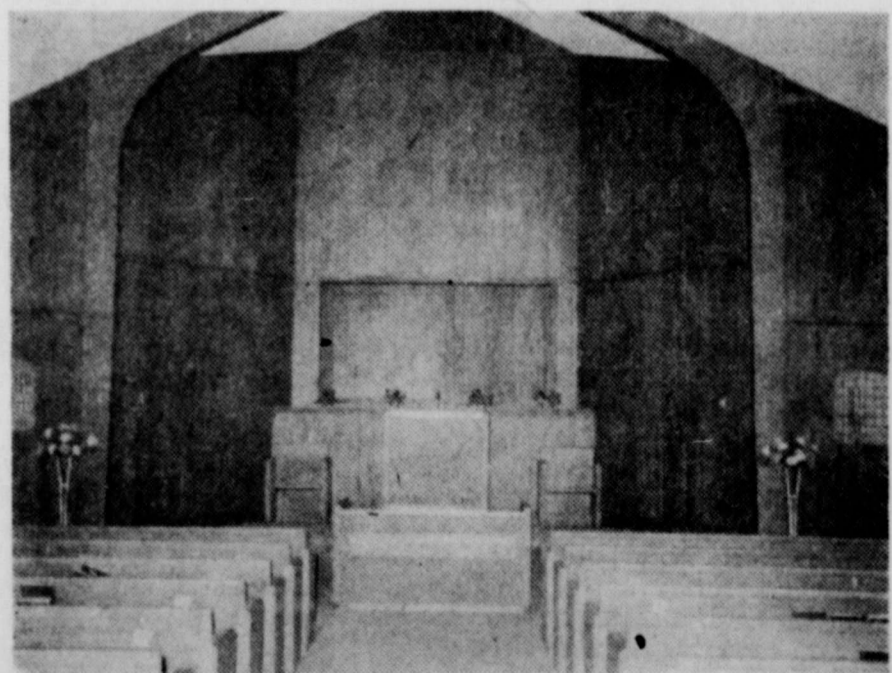

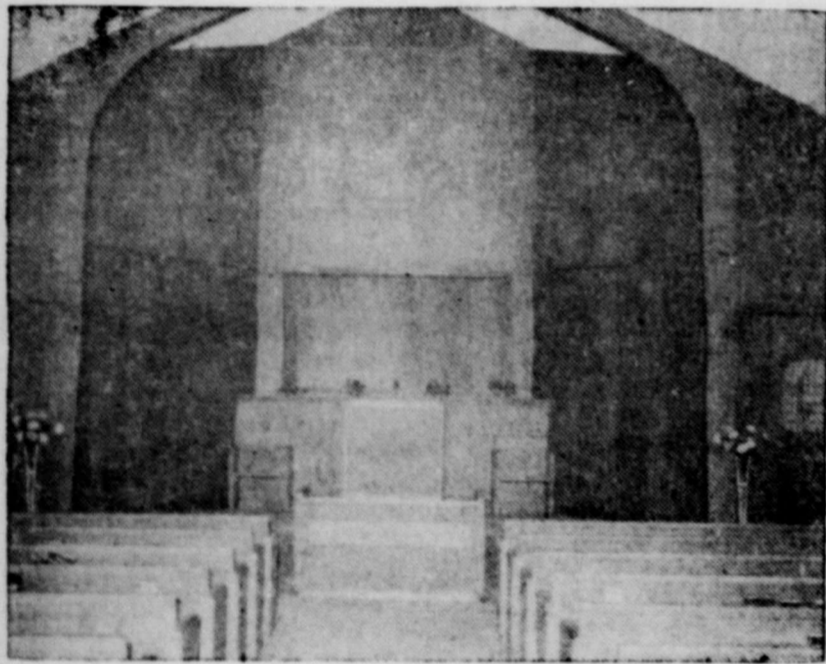

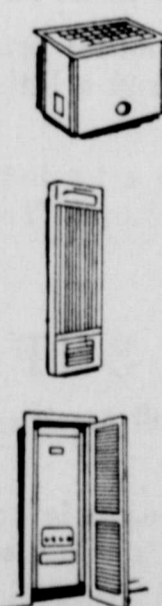
