## Bronte Downs May Tigers 30-0 In Season's Opening Ball Game

The Bronte Longhorns won their first game of the 1961 season with the greatest of ease. The local eleven defeated May 30-0, in a game played here last Friday night.

The Longhorns looked good in some departments, but showed lack of polish in others. Fans are hoping to see a much smoother operating outfit this Friday night against Ozona's Lions.

May's weak team was unable to contain the Longhorns, and every man on the squad was allowed to see action on the field.

Tommy Boecking opened the ball game with a kickoff to Johnny Woods, who brought the ball out to the 34 yard line. May was able to pick up fair yardage on a couple of plays, but a fumble gave Bronte the ball on May's 42.

Charles Lee and Buddy Walker alternated carrying the ball and six plays later Lee went over from the 6 inch line for Bronte's first TD of the evening. A conversion kick failed and Bronte led

## Longhorns to Tackle Ozona Lions Friday

Bronte Longhorns will hit the road Friday night for the first time this season when they travel to Ozona to tangle with the Class A Lions. The second game of the season follows Bronte's one-sided victory last week over the May Tigers.

Football dopesters in Bronte are of the opinion that the Longhorns are going to have to show a lot more polish and head-up football playing than they did last week if they defeat Ozona. The Lions defeated Coahoma last Friday

night by a score of 26-0. In their first game McCamey defeated the Lions 23-8.

The Longhorns will be playing Friday night without the services of Dee Arrott, outstanding back. Arrott re-hurt an injured knee Monday and Coach Bob Howard said he will not be able to play this week and probably not next week. It is also doubtful if Tommy Lee, center, will see too much action against the Lions. He is hampered by a leg injury.

Howard said the Longhorns are

going to Ozona with the intention of winning a ball game. He added that he believes they can do it if they will come through as well as they are capable of doing.

Another consideration is the fact that the Lions will be looking for revenge to square things with the Longhorns after the 29-24 beating they took here last year. Bronte was not picked by most people to win the 1960 game, yet they gave the visitors a good licking. Pete Hickman, former star on the Robert Lee Steer team, is coach at Ozona, and he would like nothing better than for his boys to give the Longhorns a good shellacking.

## Last Rites Held for Mrs. Eugenia Jones At Norton Church

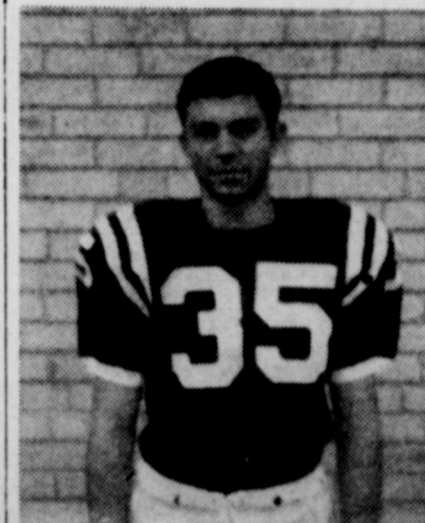

Mrs. Jones died at 7:30 a. m. Friday in Bronte Hospital after an illness of several weeks.

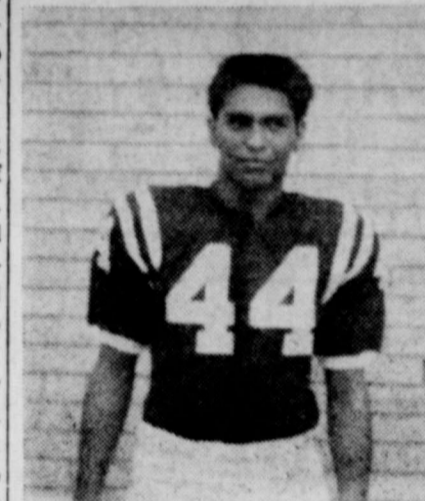
She was born Feb. 3, 1883, in Alabama, the former Eugenia Lee.

Boecking gave the ball one of his famous boots on the kickoff and sent it over the May goal line for an automatic touchback. After three attempts, May couldn't gain the needed ten yards, so the Tigers punted to the Bronte 39. Lee made a first down on May's 45 and on the next play Rudy Olivas took a reverse handoff and made a beautiful 42 yard run to the May three yard line. Lee carried to the two foot line and then Walker went over standing up for the tally. Conversion try was no good. Score 12-0.

Once again Boecking kicked the ball into the end zone, giving May a first and 10 on their own 20. On the first play from scrimmage, the Tigers fumbled and Jack Corley fell on the ball for the Longhorns. Lee carried to the six, and then went around right end for the third tally of the game. Again the try for extra point failed, leaving the score 18-0. May took Boecking's kick behind

the goal line again, but they tried running it out and carried to the 13. After three tries, May punted to the Longhorns. Bobby Allen picked up five to give Bronte a second and five on the 48. Allen, Jimmy Wells and Lee tried the carrying chores, but were plagued with penalties and a bad pass from center. Lee punted to the May 30, where the Tigers took over. Bronte recovered a May fumble, but officials ruled the ball was already dead, and Wells almost intercepted a pass before the Tigers were forced to punt. Olivas returned the punt to the Bronte 40 and after failure to make ten, Lee punted. Four downs later May returned the punt, taken by Olivas. He handed off to Wells who almost got in the clear. He was stopped by May's Bill Lee on the 31. Lee made 11, Olivas gained six, and Lee carried again to the three yard line. From there Walker went through the middle for the TD. Again conversion try

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## HD Agent's News Dept.

I was in Abilene Saturday to assist in judging the home demonstration exhibits at the West Texas Fair which opened Monday. If you go up for the Fair, be sure to go by the Women's Building and see the Home Demonstration and 4-H exhibits.

Are you considering new accessories for the fall? To get the most for your money, plan carefully before you buy — remembering the color and design of your basic dresses or suits. Have you ever brought home a bargain hat or bag — or shoes of a delightfully "different" color only to find that they didn't go with a thing you had? In that case they were expensive accessories after all. Accessories should accent or compliment a garment. They can add spice to a simple dress or suit, or supply the unifying note with a striking print dress or plaid suit.

Avoid using too many different colors in one costume. The eye jumps from one spot to another, and you lose the effect of unity. A general rule for the use of contrasting color, texture or pattern in accessories is never to repeat more than three times — generally two are smarter: for examples, shoes, bags and gloves, or bag, hat and glove. Keep your accent — above the waist or below it — gloves can fall in either category.

Intensity of the color is important. Don't overdo it. The more brilliant or intense the color, the smaller the area it should cover.

Basic colors in accessories, namely black, brown or navy, are always in good taste and easy to use.

Color in shoes is a fashion to be used with caution. It calls attention to the feet and ankles. Be certain yours can stand the spotlight.

A final suggestion: Look smart but not extreme. Don't overdress. The best dressed women are often the most simply dressed.

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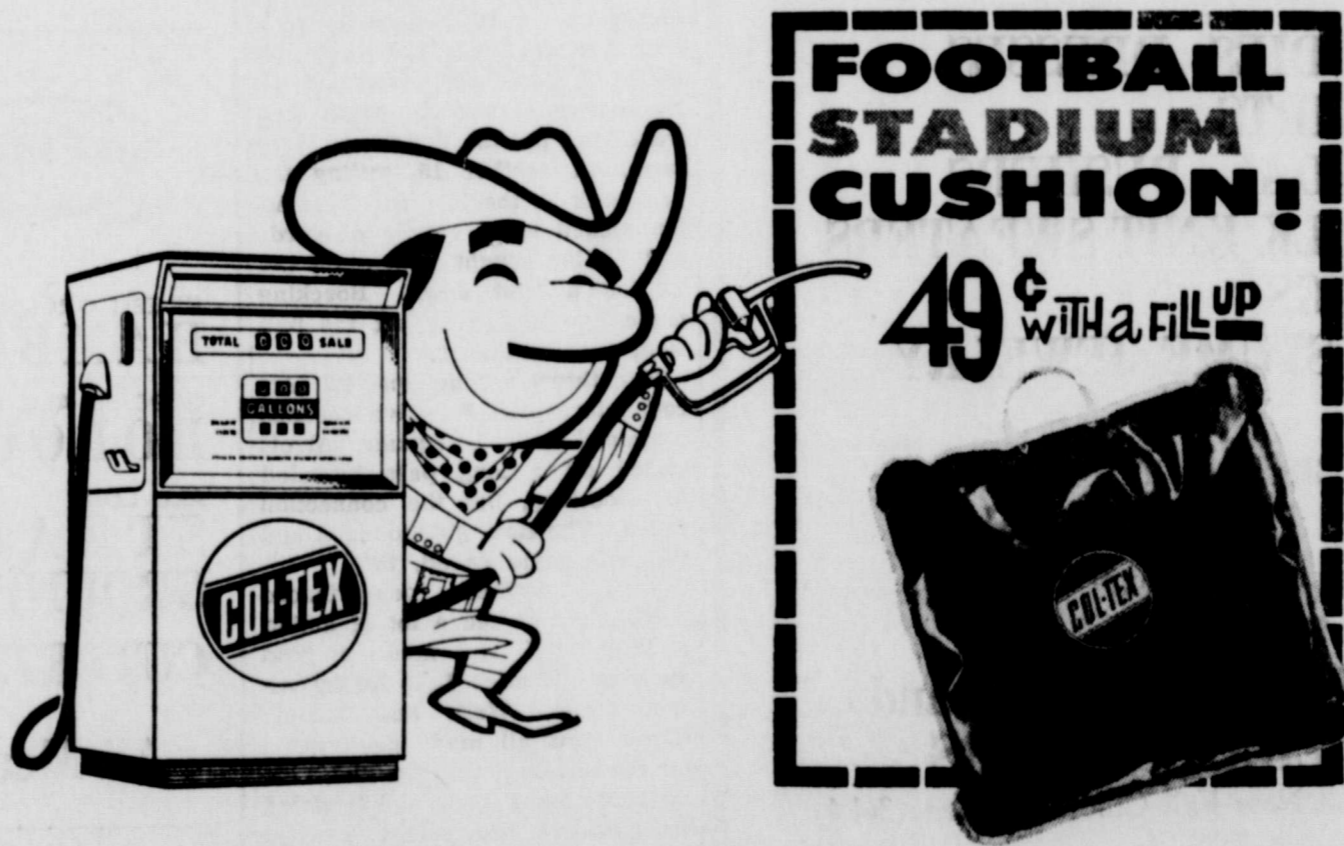

Lee and Walker gained enough for another first down on the Tiger 30. A short time later the ball went over after Woods intercepted a Longhorn pass.
