ANNUAL MEETING, BARBECUE HELD BY COKE FARM BUREAU

About 75 persons were present Monday night when Coke County Farm Bureau held its annual convention at the Bronte School lunchroom. The supper was served by employees of the lunchroom and following the meal, the group moved into the school auditorium for a business session.

O. T. Colvin gave the introduction and Bill Hamilton, county president, was in charge of the business meeting. Annual reports were given by Hamilton; the secretary-treasurer, Mrs. C. E. Arrott; the membership chairman, Frank Coalson and chairman of the pol-

icy development committee, Ulmer Bird.

Membership goal for the Coke County group is 221, and Coalson reported that present membership is 195. Bird read a list of resolutions to the group, and they were passed and will be presented at the state convention.

The nominating committee made its report and the following officers were re-elected: president, Bill Hamilton; vice president, Frank Coalson; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. C. E. Arrott. Seven directors were elected as follows J. B. Arrott, Ben Boykin, James Arrott, Austin Sandusky, Ulmer Bird, James Royce Smith, and H. H. Holland. Seven holdover directors complete the board of 14 members.

Hamilton was elected as first delegate to the state convention, with Bird being named second delegate. Alternates are Coalson and Austin Jordan. The state convention will be held Nov. 13, 14 and 15 at Galveston.

The Bronte Longhorns will enter their second District 6-B contest Friday night against the Loraine Bulldogs. It promises to be a good ball game in spite of the fact that Loraine lost its game last week.

In season standings the Bulldogs have a better record than the Longhorns, having won three and lost three. The Longhorns have won one, lost three and tied two. In district standings, the Longhorns are ahead of Loraine, as that team lost its first district contest last week to Trent.

Even though it has gone down in the books as a Loraine loss, results of that team's game last week were somewhat questionable. According to a report of the contest in the Colorado City Record, Loraine, trailing Trent 20-14, made a touchdown just as the game ended. The paper said game officials allowed the tally at first and then reversed their decision and ruled that the game was over before the play started. Loraine school officials have announced they will protest the outcome to Interscholastic League officials.

A fracas developed after the game and one Trent fan was removed from the field and fined for hitting an official.

Hermleigh Holds Bronte Longhorns to 8-8 Tie

The Bronte Longhorns were held to an 8-8 tie last Friday when they met the Hermleigh Cardinals here. The contest was the opening of district play for both teams. The visitors made their counter in the first quarter, while the Longhorns scored in the second period of play.

The Longhorns traveled deep into Hermleigh territory three times during the game but were unable to cross the double stripe.

The game was played on a wet field and frequent changes of the ball were necessary. A hard shower fell just prior to game time.

Hermleigh started the ball game with a short kick to the Bronte 47 yard line. Both teams ran two series of downs before the Cardinals drew first blood. With a fourth and 2 to go, quarterback J. B. Roberson threw a pass to fullback Jim Robinson for the tally. Terry Smith ran the conversion for two extra points, making the score 8-0.

Once again the Hermleigh kick was a short boot, and Bobby Allen returned it to his own 49 yard line. Buddy Walker made 7 through the middle and Rudy Olivas picked up 6 more for a first down on the visitors' 38 yard line.

Second Quarter

Charles Lee added 3 more for

the Longhorns, and on two carries Walker made 10 for a first down, and 9 more to place the ball on the 16 yard line. On the next play Olivas went around the left end for 11 yards and a first down on the Cardinal 5 yard line. Walker carried the ball across the goal line on the next play, and Lee went over right tackle for two extra points to tie up the ball game and end scoring for the night.

Tommy Boecking kicked a long one which the Hermleigh backfield brought out to the 16 yard line. The Cardinals got stuck and couldn't make the necessary yards so the ball went over to the Longhorns for a first and 10 on the Hermleigh 22. During the next series of downs the Longhorns suffered two penalties, one for off-sides and one for clipping, for a total of 20 yards. Lee tossed a couple of passes to Eddie Spiller, one good for 11 yards and the other a no gainer, and Olivas went around left end for 6, but the Longhorns still lacked 9 yards having a first down, so the ball went over to the Cardinals.

With Robinson and Smith carrying, Hermleigh racked up two first downs, but on the third play of the next series, Roberson fumbled and Jack Corley recovered for the

Longhorns on the Hermleigh 39 yard line.

Walker carried the ball a couple of times for 11 yards and a first down on the midfield stripe. Dee Arrott went into the ball game and tossed an incomplete pass to Boecking, then Lee did likewise.

The next play was a pass from Lee to Olivas good for 6, and then Lee passed to Spiller for 16 yards and a first down on the 28. Lee tried a couple of passes to Boecking, but they didn't connect and then Lee was swamped before he could get rid of the ball. The ball was placed on the 33, 4th down and 19 yards to go. A pass from Lee intended for Olivas was incomplete, and the ball went over to Hermleigh on the Cardinal 33. The visitors got off one play for short yardage before the end of the half.

Third Quarter

After Boecking's kickoff, the Cardinals made three consecutive first downs. Roberson, Robinson and Smith did the carrying chores, taking the ball up past midfield, when they were penalized 5 yards for illegal procedure. After this setback, Robinson tried a pass, only to have it intercepted by Jimmy Wells. This break gave the Long-

Storm Sewer Work Now in Progress

The storm sewer running from Main Street and Highway 277 to the East Kickapoo Creek is being completed this week, after many months of having an open ditch running along the south side of east Main Street.

Cage Bros. Construction Co. submitted the low bid on the labor for the project. Their price of \$1,381 was accepted by the city council and work was begun Monday.

The line is being built of 30 inch pipe and is being laid with a six inch fall per 100 feet. The 30 inch line ties onto a double 24 inch line which runs 100 feet from Highway 277.

The new line will begin in the vicinity of the West Apartments and run past Randall Street. From there the natural fall of the terrain will carry the water on to the creek.

Commissioner Howard Brock of Precinct 2 is supplying the pipe for the job.
