Longhorns Down Trent Gorillas at Homecoming Tilt

Important plays were executed by the Bronte Longhorn offense last Saturday night when the local lads met the Trent Gorillas, but the Bronte defense was really what saved the day and a chance at the district championship. The Longhorn line as well as the backfield defense held the powerful Trent eleven until it finally broke their backs, and limited them to only one touchdown.

The Bronte offense showed it has the ability for taking advantage of long run opportunities when Buddy Walker made a spectacular 72 yard run for the first Bronte touchdown. Likewise the Bronte boys showed they could make it the hard way when they pushed from their own 36 to the Trent 20 on the ground. A diving pass reception by Charles Lee then put the Longhorns on the 3 and from there Dee Arrott carried the ball over in two tries. Bronte's counters came in the 1st and 4th quarters, while the lone Trent touchdown also came in the final period.

First Quarter

Tommy Boecking started the ball game with a kickoff taken by Johnny Heatly who fumbled the ball but recovered. On the first play from scrimmage, Heatly made a first down on his 36, and Buddy King then made 8. Then Heatly took the ball on a 40 yard jaunt that put it on the Bronte 16 yard line. Things were looking bad, but the Longhorn line, with the help of a 5 yard penalty against the Gorillas, held them below the needed yardage for a first down. The ball went over and Bronte had a 1st and 10 on their own 11 yard line.

Walker carried a couple of times for 7 yards, then Arrott quick kicked on 3rd down to the Trent 39. Once again the Gorillas got off on a good drive and it looked as if they were on their way to pay dirt. Good gains by Heatly, King, and Quarterback Johnny Swinney put the ball on the Longhorn 18 with a 1st down. The Gorillas tried four times, but the Longhorn defense held and they wound up about a foot short of a 1st down.

Bronte took over with the ball on their own 8. Arrott made 4 and Rudy Olivas made 6 for a 1st on the 18. The next play unraveled the most spectacular play of the game when Walker got loose for his 72 yard touchdown run. He had good blocking and with only one man between him and the double stripe, Olivas threw the key block on this one defender. From there on it was a matter of outrunning a pursuing Gorilla. Walker turned on the steam and his would be tackler never laid a hand on him. Arrott ran over the extra points and the Longhorns led the ball game 8-0.

Youngblood to Attend Water Meeting Nov. 17

L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker and chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority, will attend a meeting Nov. 17 in Austin of the State Board of Water Engineers. Purpose of the meeting is to discuss the state water situation and "ultimate distribution of the remaining water of the Colorado River Basin," Youngblood said.

The chairman pointed out that much talk has been circulating about building a dam on the Colorado in Coke County, but that it is all in the speculation stage. He said there are no plans at present to build the dam in Coke County because there is no sale for enough water to make the project economically feasible. "We are not asleep on this matter," Youngblood said, "and will be constantly alert to any opportunities which present themselves."

Following the study made at the Nov. 17 meeting, recommendations will be made to the President of the United States on distribution of the remaining water of the Colorado River watershed.

Shorthorns Wind Up Perfect Season; Beat Robert Lee

The Bronte Shorthorns wound up their 1961 football season Friday night by defeating the Robert Lee Dogies 14-0. The Shorthorns have had an absolutely perfect season, as they have not been defeated, have not been tied and have not been scored on. The lads have made 102 points in five games to their opponents' 0.

The Shorthorns found pay dirt in the second quarter when Royce Lee ran from about his own 20 all the way to the double stripe. Lee flipped a pass to Manuel Reyes for two extra points.

In the last period Tony Olivas went over for the second counter. Conversion try failed, and the score for the game was set, 14-0.

Outstanding defensive work was done by Alvaro Martinez, and Fidencia Cantu proved his worth in completing passes tossed by Lee. Tad Richards also made good gains on the ground throughout the game, along with Lee and Olivas.

John Boyles coaches the Short-

trict 6-B since their 14-8 victory last Saturday over the Trent Gorillas. The Steers, on the other hand, are next to the bottom in district rating, as they have won only one district tilt.

Coach Bob Howard said Tuesday that he believes the Longhorns will win the game, but they are heavily handicapped because Quarterback Eddie Spiller will not be in the lineup. Spiller sustained a back injury in the game with Trent and will not be able to play any more this season.

Results of the other two district games last weekend gave Robert Lee an 8-6 victory over Loraine and Roby beat Hermleigh, 16-6.

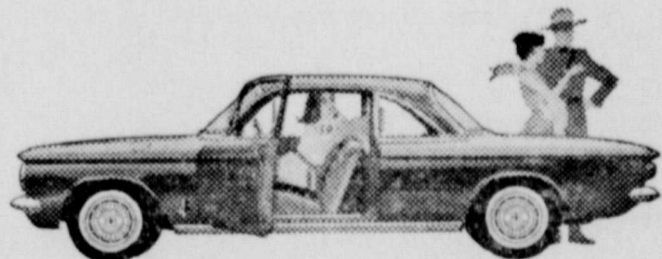

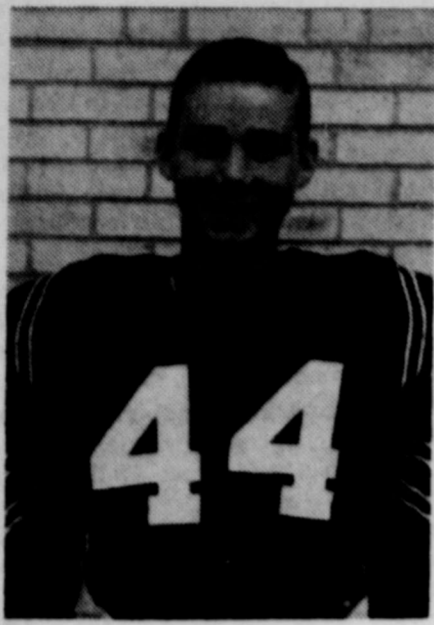

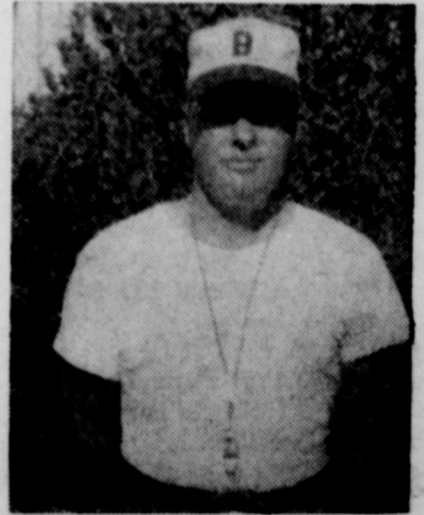

Gov. Designates Veterans Week

As a tribute and in remembrance of those who took up arms in the cause of democracy and freedom in World War I, Gov. Price Daniel has designated the week beginning November 11 as World War Veterans Week in Texas.

Veterans Day, Nov. 11, has for the past several years served as a day of Commemoration for the veterans of all American wars. This observance, originally known as Armistice Day, began as a tribute by a grateful people to the American soldiers, sailors and marines who fought and died in World War I.

The observance begins on the 43rd anniversary of the signing of the armistice which ended hostilities between Germany and the Allies on Nov. 11, 1918.

Next Sunday, Nov. 12, at 1:30 p.m. a World War I Memorial will be unveiled on the State Capitol grounds in Austin. Located in the northeast corner of the grounds, the 9-foot red granite shaft is being erected without expense to the state.

Lt. Gov. Bruce Reagon will be the principal speaker at the unveiling ceremonies. All veterans of World War I and their relatives and friends are invited to be in Austin for the event. Senator Ralph Yarborough will be the featured speaker at a WWI veterans dinner at the Driskill Hotel on Saturday, Nov. 11, at 7 p.m.

Coke County Barracks No. 2409 Veterans of World War I was organized early this year and has a paid up membership of 32. The veterans meet once a month and alternate their sessions between Bronte and Robert Lee.

At the monthly meeting last week in the American Legion Hall at Bronte plans were discussed for boosting next year's membership

to 40. A barbecue and program for Nov. 11 was abandoned, but a dinner meeting with the ladies as guests is planned for January.

New officers are to be elected at the meeting in Robert Lee on Dec. 7.

County Agents News Column

A committee of livestock men from all parts of the county will meet in the conference room of the courthouse to plan and initiate a local program in conjunction with the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation's proposed program of screw worm control.

Hulan Harris, Robert Lee vocational agriculture teacher, J. T. Henry, Bronte vocational agriculture teacher, and I will meet with the group at 7 p.m. You are welcome to meet with us if you so desire.

I recorded a few rainfall measurements from the rain last week.

Buster Burson recorded 2 inches at his place on the west side of the county. Nolan Pentecost also had 2 inches and so did L. E. Wink (2.3 inches from both rains). Pat Havins recorded 1.5 inches in the Valley View community, while Floyd Harmon measured 1.3 inches in the Wildcat community, as did J. T. Henry at Bronte. Joe Rawlings measured the least, .8 of an inch at Lometa, while T. M. Wylie Jr. recorded 1.4 at his home in the Friendship community. Walter King measured an even 1.5 inches on his place west of Blackwell.

Some interest has been shown in planting peas in the county. This has been a growing enterprise in Dawson County to the west. I see no reason why it should not be a good practice here. Peas are good soil builders, add nitrogen to the soil when innoculated and will work fine in rotation with cotton.

You might give the idea some thought. Cow peas, crowders, cream peas and purple hulls were listed as the kinds grown in Dawson County.

I would be watchful of frost bitten plants in the near future. Johnson grass and sorghum plants sometimes develop a high prussic acid content following frost.

2nd Quarter

Hopes for the Gorillas were dashed when they fumbled the ball on their 42 and after 8 or 10 boys unstacked Leslie Brice was on the ball for the Longhorns. The Bronte backfield worked some fancy ball handling quite successfully in this series of downs and Arrott came up with a 1st on the Trent 31. On the next series, however, Arrott Walker and Olivas all carried the ball but got it only to the 23, so the Gorillas took over.

After two 2-yard carries and an incomplete pass, the Trent lads faced a 4th down situation that forced them to punt. Jerry Barnes kicked the ball to the Bronte 25. The Longhorns took over but couldn't move the ball enough yards for a 1st down. Charles Lee punted, but it fell short and the Gorillas took over on Bronte's 30. Trent tried desperately to gain, as time for the half was fast approaching. Two passes, one for a loss and the other incomplete, a center plunge by Swinney and a fancy lateral to the whole Gorilla backfield yielded them a loss of 9 yards. The ball went over and Walker carried three times for a 1st down on the Trent 45 before the half ended.

Third Quarter
