In his official proclamation covering the week long observance, Gov. Price Daniel said, "The development of citizens and leaders for America is a high purpose in 4-H Club work.

"The 4-H program stresses the development of head, heart, hands and health as well as teaching the latest practices in agriculture and home economics.

"Since the 4-H program was inaugurated by the United States government in 1914, the movement has spread across our nation and established bridges of understanding to more than 50 foreign countries. 4-H Club members learn by conducting result demonstrations and participating in 4-H activities. By putting into action what they learn, club members improve their homes and communities.

STUDENTS TAKE TESTS FOR MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS

Five students at Bronte High School took the 1962 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Tests, according to Joe B. Simpson, high school principal.

The students were Joe Shaver, Vic Glenn, Wesley Murphy, Greg Whalen and Charlene Lacy.

Tests were administered Tuesday, March 6. The tests were for students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1963.

The qualifying test is a three-hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the eighth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, association, unions, and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. In 1961, 945 scholarships were awarded.

Test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools by May 15. The scores are used by class advisors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

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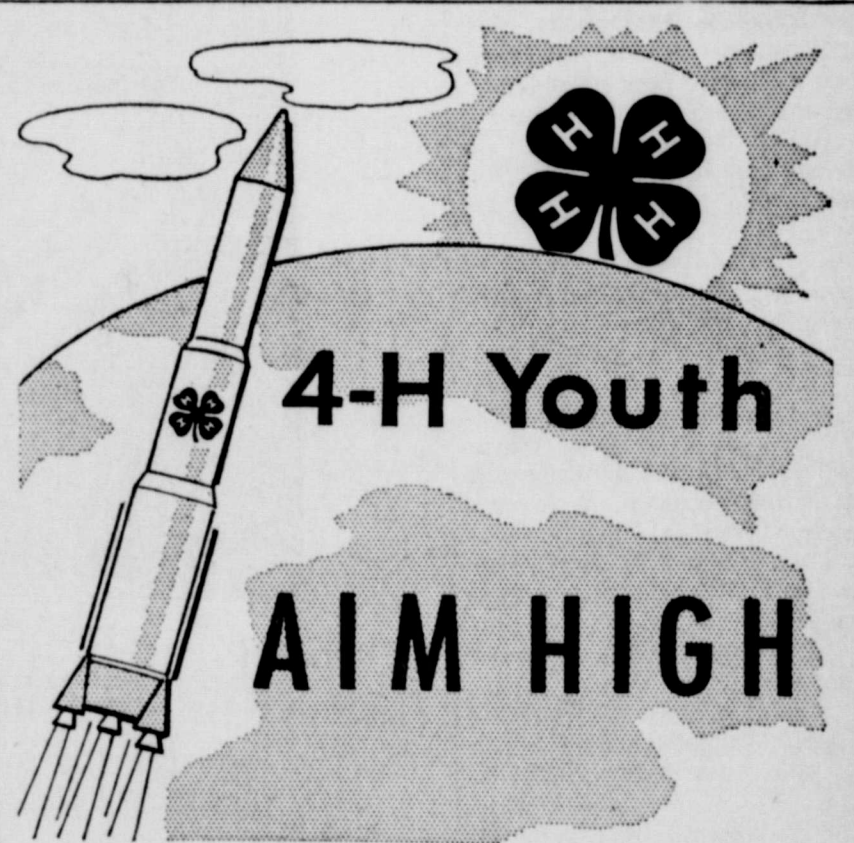

Coke Fares Well In Houston Show

The Coke County entries in the Houston Fat Stock Show encountered stiff competition in most quarters but emerged with their share of the honors. The 73 animals in competition there were awarded \$380.00 in prize monies, 36 ribbons, one trophy and two champions banners. Twenty of the steers and lambs entered qualified for the premium sale and 40 others were put on the block, returning approximately \$3800.00 in gross sales to the 23 4-H Club and FFA chapter members with entries in the show.

Robert Wink gained the widest acclaim, exhibiting his shorthorn heifer to the Championship of the shorthorn division of the scramble show. Ronnie Varnadore also took top honors with his hampshire buck lamb, exhibiting to the reserve championship of the show. Both entries received appropriate banners and in addition Robert received a beautiful trophy in reward for his efforts.

Ronnie and Donnie Devoll re-

ceived ribbons on five of six of their lamb entries, exhibiting the 10 and 26 place finewool lambs. Royce Hood was successful with two of his entries winning 5th with his fine wool entry and 37th with his Southdown lamb. Other placings in the fat lamb show are as follows: Ronnie, Jimmy and Marcia Varnadore, 15 place crossbred lamb, 33 place southdown; Dee Arrott 36th fine wool; Mike Malone, 38th place finewool; Ricky Harris; Dick Waldorp; Bobby Blaylock, 37th fine wool.

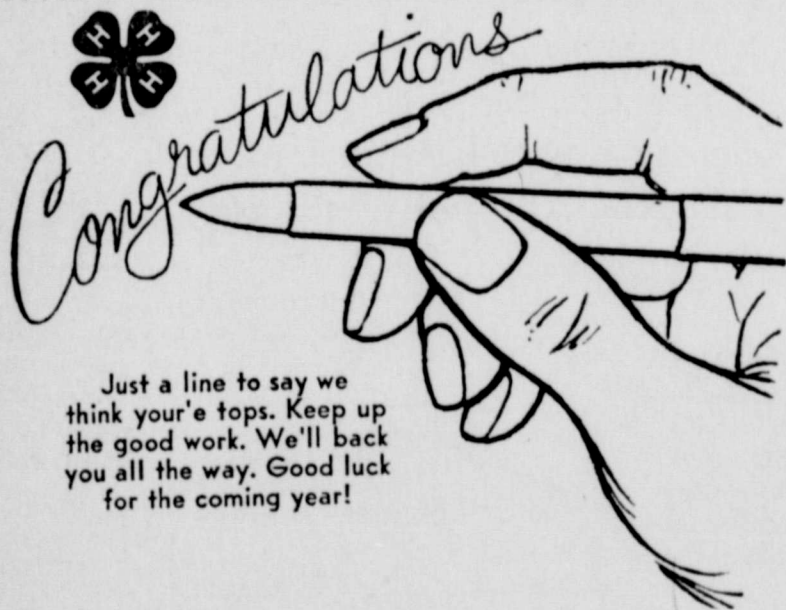

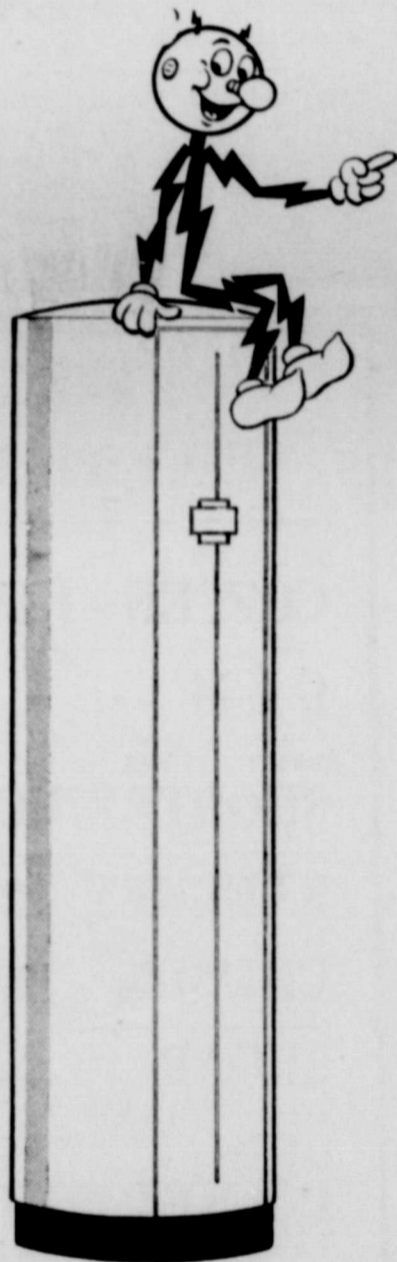

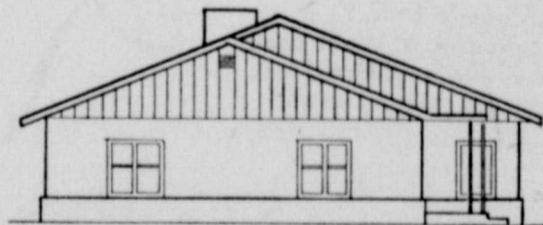
