## Nine Students Will Go to State Meet

### Trackmen Win Third

Bronte High School's track team brought high honors and two blue ribbons home with them last weekend when they won third place in the regional Interscholastic League meet held at Odessa. In addition to the first place winners, the Longhorns had a second place winner and two fourth places. The school amassed 45 points, to be bested only by Grandfalls with 64½ and Clint with 47 in the Class B division of the meet.

Four Longhorns who will attend the state meet in Austin on May 5 made up the 440 yard relay team. Barry Curlee, Buddy Walker, Dee Aroott and Rudy Olivas had a time of 45.8 on this event. The only other Longhorn to qualify for state was Tommy Boecking who placed first in the 880 yard run. Boecking's time was 2:06.4.

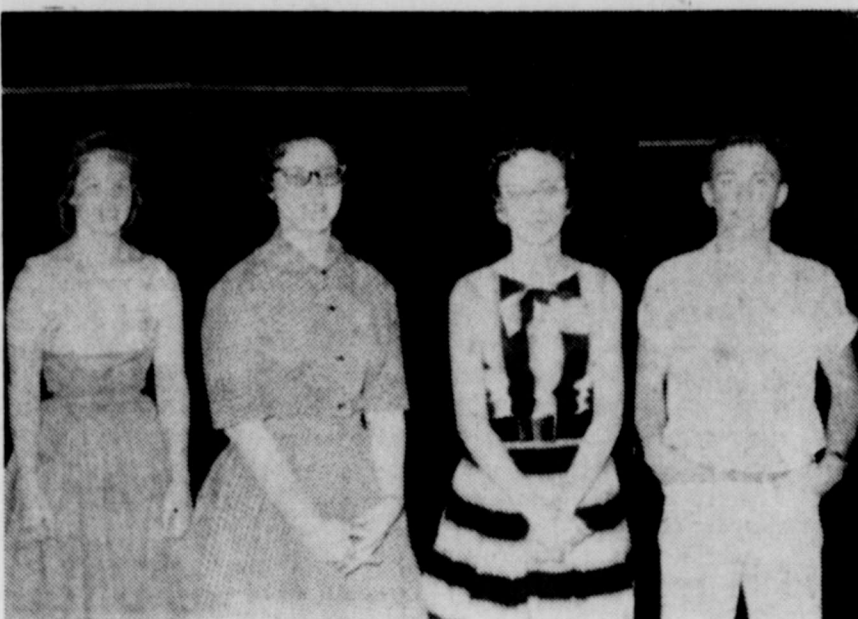
Jim Morrow tied for second place in high jump but lost his chance to go to state on a coin toss with the other second place winner. Morrow's jump was for 5 ft. 10½ in.

Barry Curlee took fourth place honors in both the 100 yard dash and the 220 yard dash.

Other Longhorns who were district winners and qualified for the regional meet were Tommy Lee and Jack Corley in shot put and Eddie Spiller in pole vault. Charlie Lee also was qualified to go to regional but was unable to attend on account of illness.

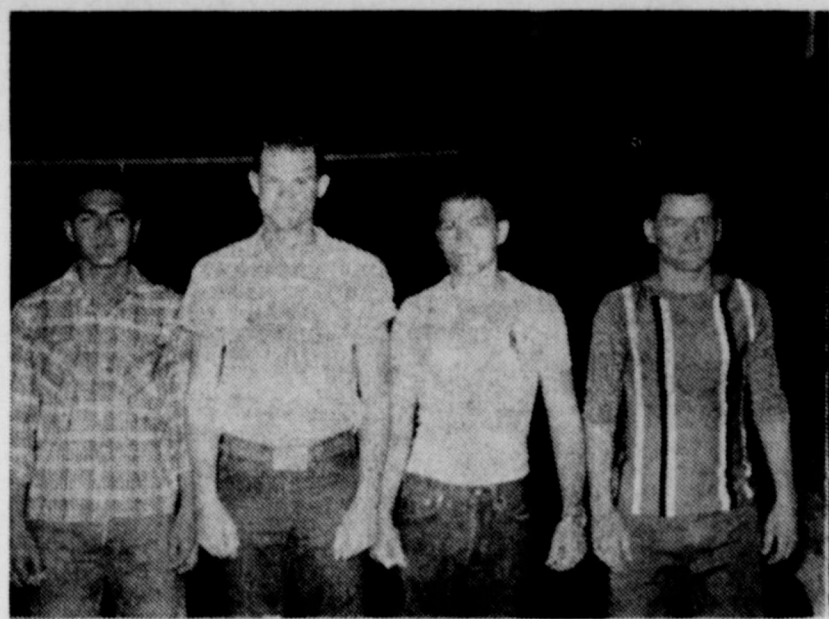
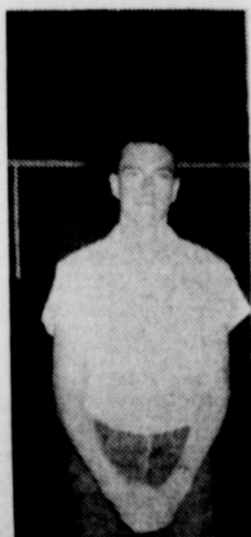
Johnnie Sims represented the Bronte high school in tennis but failed to place as did the girls volleyball team.

Annual Easter Egg hunt at the Bronte County Park will start at 3 p. m. Sunday, according to Aubrey Denman, park caretaker. Denman said the Lions Club of Bronte will bear the expense of the egg hunt again this year.

Four groups will be formed for the hunt: children under three years old; three years old up to school age; first graders up to nine years old; those over nine years old.

Denman urged all the egg hunters to be on time as the hunt will start at 3 o'clock sharp. "It's pretty discouraging to a child to get there late, after most of the eggs have been found," he said.

Voters may go to the clerk's office and cast their ballots or they may write to the clerk's office and the ballots will be mailed to them.

The four, along with five athletes who won first place honors in the region, will give Bronte a total of nine students eligible to compete at the state level. The state meet will be held in Austin the first weekend in May.

### Fire Truck Fund Growing Slowly

Funds to buy a new fire truck for the Bronte Fire Department have been coming in slowly the past week. After having a total of \$114.40 last week at press time, the total this week at noon Wednesday had risen only to \$273.22. This represents \$158.82 collected during the past week.

Firemen are sponsoring the drive to purchase the new truck and will need approximately \$4,300 to get the kind of equipment they need. The truck they want to purchase is a tank type machine, especially suitable for fighting grass and other rural fires where the supply of water is limited.

Dolan Mackey, president of the Volunteer Fire Department, urged everyone to get their contributions in as soon as possible. Acreage owners are requested to contribute 3 cents per acre, and city residents are asked to contribute 10 cents for each \$100 valuation as it appears on the city tax rolls.

Those who wish to give to the fire truck fund are asked to bring it by the Enterprise office or mail to Drawer O, Bronte, Texas.

A complete record of contributions is being kept, and if the drive "falls through" all money will be returned to the donors, Mackey said.

Dr. Gartman, in presenting information on the screwworm control program at the meeting held in Robert Lee last Friday night, mentioned picking up a mailing carton or bottle at the County Agents office. We have a small supply. If you would like to have one drop by the office.

Whether you pick up a mailing carton or not, please send in for identification any worm cases you may have. One case of screw worms north of their buffer zone left unattended could seriously hurt the program. Their knowing where screwworms are occurring is a must for the program to succeed.

Incidentally, Dr. Gartman lives in Mission rather than Mason as we erroneously reported.

The Sonora Experiment Station will not conduct their Field Day this year as in the past. Instead, for convenience of ranchers in West Texas, three field days, will be held away from the Station in which the Sonora Station Personnel will participate.

According to the 1959 census, Coke County has 337 farms with an average of 1701.9 acres. The 1954 census showed us to have 419 farms with an average of 1304.6 acres. That is a loss of 82 farms in five years.

Other figures released show Coke County to have 13,216 cattle and calves; 177 milk cows; 640 horses and mules; 860 hogs and pigs; and 104,023 sheep and lambs.

Coke County ranked 24th in sheep numbers in the state and 62nd in the nation. We ranked 50th in the nation in wool production.

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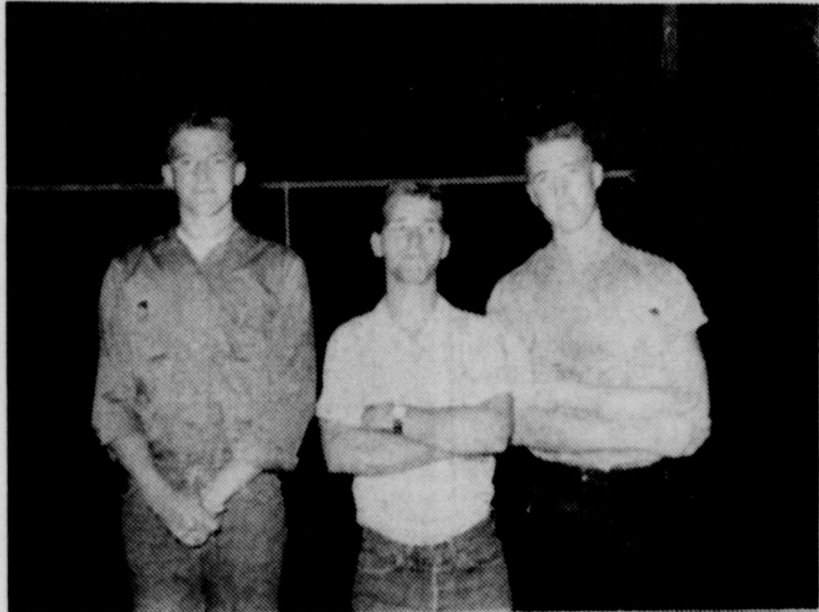

I have some "fan mail" and one reader ask for a recipe — here is one for a good biscuit mix and two variations using the Mix. Biscuits may be made by using 2 cups mix and 3/4 cup milk.

### MASTER MIX

9 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup baking powder  
1 tablespoon salt  
2 teaspoons cream of tartar  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 cups shortening.

Sift dry ingredients together three times. Cut in shortening until mix is consistency of corn meal. Store in covered container. To measure the Master Mix pile lightly into cup and level off with spatula. Yield 12 cups.

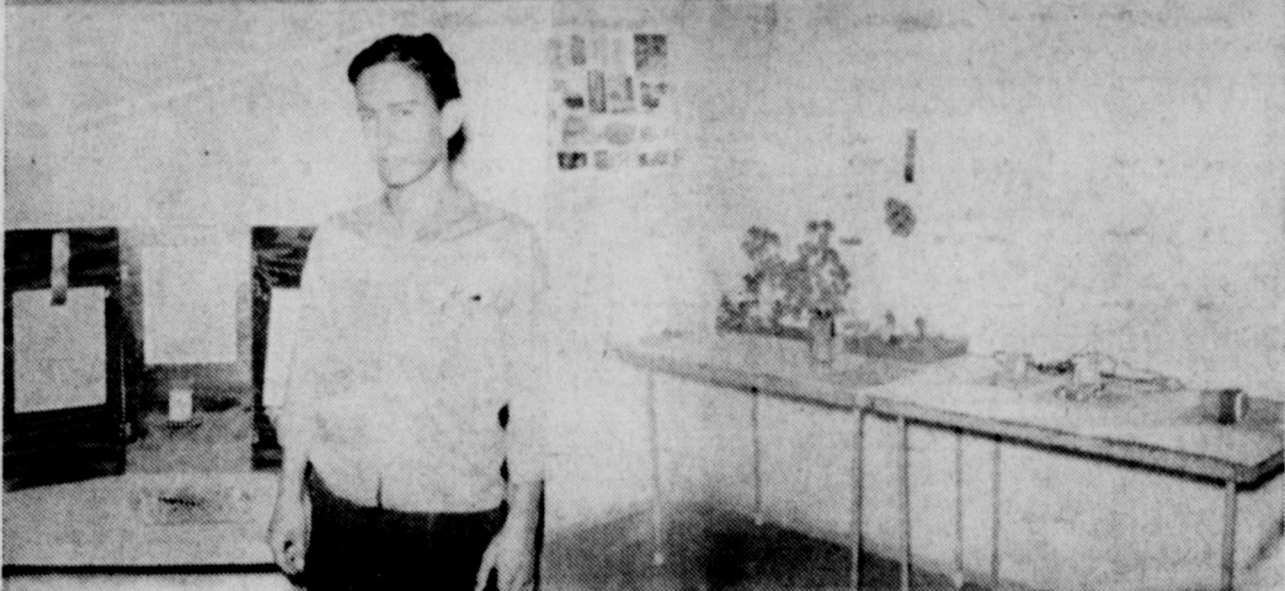


**SCIENCE FAIR WINNERS —**

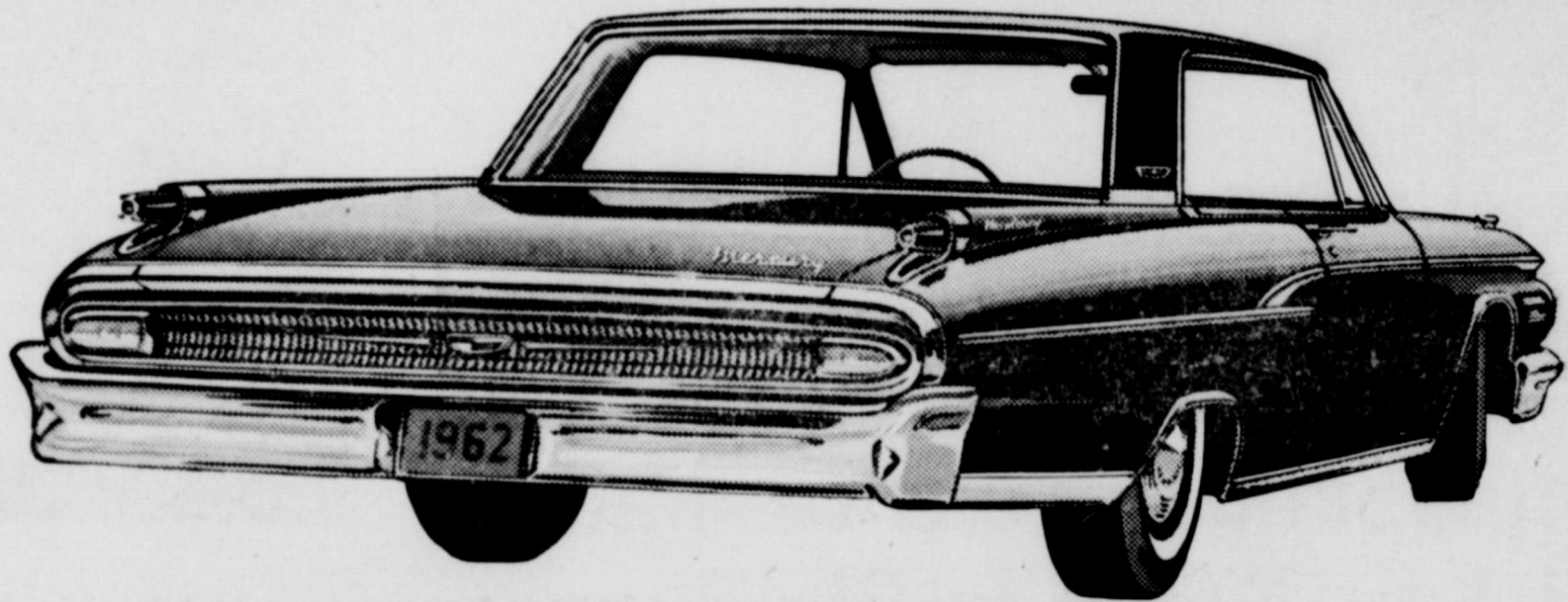

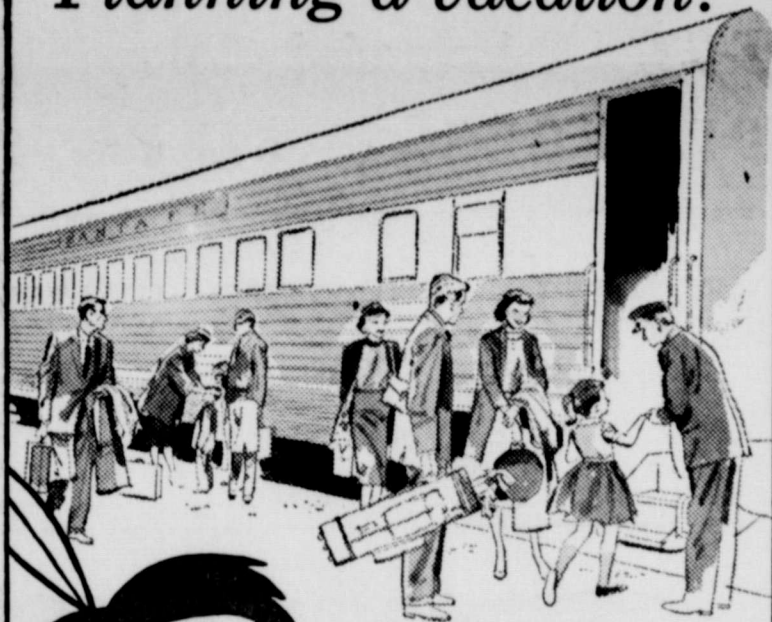
