We always like to see a good political campaign like this one has been. The candidates this year have really been working and have put in lots of hours to try to swing all of us over to their side. We've printed several thousand candidate cards here at The Enterprise and are sure a similar number have been printed in Robert Lee. These office seekers have done something with them.

As is our practice, we are not going to back anybody editorially for offices down close to home. In fact, we almost got in bad trouble two years ago for writing a good word in this column for a candidate for President of the United States. We may not even do that again. Not for two more years anyway.

The country's agricultural program has always seemed a little out of balance to us, and we've always been pretty lukewarm toward many of its give-away plans. Recent happenings have surely pointed out clearly that this program needs some major overhauling, to say the least. Daily newspapers all over the state, and even in other states, are full of the Billie Sol Estes story. This mess has roots deep in the government's farm give-away program.

Other cases we've recently read about:

In Colorado a citizen had an opportunity to buy a 7,000 acre ranch, at \$130,000, no down payment, \$13,000 a year for 10 years. He made the deal, but before he made it he worked out a deal with the government whereby he receives \$27,000 a year in soil bank payments. In 10 years the gift from uncle will pay for his land and give him a \$140,000 bonus.

In Nebraska, a County Club had 14 acres of ground they didn't need. They leased it to a nearby farmer and he planted it to corn. Now they have decided to expand their golf course and they took the 14 acres back. They received a check for \$288 from the government for taking the corn land out of production.

In the last three years, six government agencies have lent upward of \$35 million helping poultry raisers increase egg production. During that same time a seventh agency has spent \$12 million buying surplus eggs.

And, of course, everyone knows the government will pay farmers not to plant certain crops, and will also pay them to use fertilizer

Classes were held five nights last week.

## Politics Warms Up As Date of Election Nears

Politicians are extremely busy this week, going into the final rounds of their campaigns for office. Their campaigns will be climaxed with the Democratic Primary election to be held a week from Saturday, May 5.

Interest is running high in county races, where every contest has two candidates. On the east side of Coke County, interest is even greater because of the commissioner races. The contest in precinct 4 has four candidates, while the commissioner race in precinct 2 has two candidates.

Heading the list of county races is the county judge contest. The incumbent, W. W. (Bud) Thetford is opposed by Charlie Boecking of Bronte. Thetford is a former school teacher before winning the

## Fire Truck Fund Growing Slowly

Funds to buy a new fire truck for the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department continue to come in slowly. Approximately \$400 has been received for the fund.

Firemen want to raise approximately \$4,300 to purchase a new tank type truck, suitable for fighting fires in rural areas where the water supply is limited.

Land owners are asked to contribute 3 cents an acre to the fund, while city property owners are asked to give 10 cents per \$100 valuation, as their property appears on the city tax rolls.

Dolan Mackey, president of the fire department, has asked that everyone make a contribution as soon as possible. Those who wish to contribute to the fund may leave their money at The Enterprise office or the First National Bank.

A complete list of contributors is being kept, so the money can be returned if the drive is not completed.

## Meeting Called to Discuss River Dam

U. S. Army Engineer District of Fort Worth Corps of Engineers has scheduled a public hearing for 10 a.m. May 22 at the Court-house in Ballinger for the purpose of hearing reports on the Colorado River and its tributaries.

The Corps of Engineers has extended an invitation to all interested parties and individuals to attend the meeting and give oral reports and written briefs for or against an improvement on the Colorado River above the county line between Coke and Runnels Counties.

According to a notice issued by the Fort Worth District of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers the purpose of the meeting is to study reports in order to develop

a multiple-purpose plan of improvement for the Colorado River Basin in the interest of navigation, flood control and allied purposes.

Residents and groups of this area that are interested in pursuing the possibility of constructing a flood control dam in this county for flood control, economic, wildlife and recreation reasons are urged to attend this meeting next month and give a comprehensive report to the board of engineers.

According to some experienced observers this is another step forward in determining the feasibility of constructing a dam in this area. A U. S. Mapping crew mapped the county this past winter and early spring.

## Candidates Must File Statement

One of the important dates this year for Texas political hopefuls is April 27.

Each candidate is required by state law to file an accurate sworn statement of all gifts or loans of money or other valuable things received by him, his campaign manager, or assistant campaign managers on account of his candidacy.

This record shall contain all information required to be reported by each candidate.

The candidate and opponents must file the statement not less than seven nor more than 10 days prior to the election. The democratic primary election this year is May 5; therefore the deadline for filing the statement is April 27th.

Each candidate for county office must file the statement and oath with the county clerk. Candidates for a district or state office must file the statement with Secretary of State.

The statement must also include all expenses and debts incurred in connection with the office.

Howard Brock is seeking re-election to his job as commissioner of precinct 2. He is opposed by C. E. (Eldred) McGuire, rancher who lives west of town.

In precinct 4, Claude Ditmore, the incumbent, is not seeking re-election. Four farmers or ranchmen of the precinct are after the job. They include J. D. Huffaker, E. J. (Gene) Halamicek, Robert I. Brown and Jack Corley.

Not having opponents are J. T. Liles and Roy P. Ross, running for justice of the peace in precincts 2 and 1, respectively. D. K. Glenn is also unopposed for county Democratic chairman.

## District Races

A contest is in progress for state senator from the 25th district. Dorsey Hardeman, present senator, is opposed by W. A. (Bill) Stroman. Both men are from San Angelo and both are lawyers. Stroman is formerly state representative from San Angelo.

Coke County is in a new legislative district this year, having been placed in the 78th representative district by the last session of the legislature. David Read, who has been the 78th's representative for the past two years, is seeking re-election. He is opposed by Ed J. Carpenter, Howard County judge. Both men live at Big Spring. Read is in the cotton buying business.

Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo, presently serving on the 21st congressional district's representative on the state board of education, is opposed by Mrs. David Kothmann of Mason.

Unusually active campaigns have been waged this election year. A great deal of electioneering and passing out of cards is evident most every day in Robert Lee and Bronte. Not only are county and precinct candidates active here, but those seeking district and state offices as well.

**5 Demos Run for Lieut. Governor**

Five Democrats are on the ticket for lieutenant governor of Texas. A spirited race finds one West Texan going up against four candidates from the eastern part of the state.

The candidates appear on the Coke County ballot as follows:

Crawford Martin is a 45 year old lawyer and businessman of Hillsboro. He also is a state senator.

Jarrard Secreat of Temple is a 45 year old attorney. He is also a state senator.

James A. Turman, age 34, of Gober is the only candidate in the race with a doctor's degree. He is a farmer and educator and served last term as speaker of the Texas House of Representatives.

Robert Baker, also a state senator, is 40 years old. He is a lawyer from Houston.

Preston Smith of Lubbock is the only West Texan in the race. He is also a former state senator and state representative. Smith is 49 years old, and a businessman.

**No Competition For Several Offices**

Several high offices of the State of Texas are being easily taken this year as only one candidate is seeking each of them.

Among them is Railroad commissioner, with William J. Murray of Austin as the only candidate.

However, the other railroad commissioner spot is being sought by Ben Ramsey, recently appointed to the position and long-time lieutenant governor, and Keith Wheatley, Stamford oil man.

Robert S. Calvert has no opposition in his bid for re-election as comptroller of public accounts.

State Treasurer Jesse James is unopposed for re-election to his office.

Jerry Sadler is the only candidate listed on the ballot for Commissioner of General Land Office. He is seeking a second term.

Congressman O. C. Fisher has no opposition for congressman from the 21st district.

## County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

I would like to recognize the 4-H Club members that have in recent weeks put forth time and effort preparing for their district contests that will be held in San Angelo Saturday.

I am particularly proud of the group practicing for the Junior Livestock Judging team. Seven boys have been competing for the four places on the team. It is regrettable that only four of them will be able to compete on the district level.

Robert Wink, Ronnie and Donnie Devoll, Gaylon and Darrell Pitcock, Jimmy and Ronnie Varnadore, all of the Robert Lee 4-H Club have participated in the livestock practice session. The senior livestock judging team members that will compete Saturday are James Bird Pentecost of Sanco and Mike McKown and Marshall and Ellis Freeman of Bronte.

A brother duo will represent Coke County in the Junior electric team demonstration contest — Freddy and Danny Smith of Ro-

bert Lee. A pair of Jerry's — Jerry Parker of Bronte and Jerry Burson of Robert Lee will enter the Junior and Senior public speaking contests respectively. "Water" is the subject of their speeches.

Another group of club members have been preparing for the senior and junior Soil Judging contests. Eddie Glenn of Bronte, William Ray Hood, Doyle Robertson and Lynsey White of Robert Lee will carry our colors in the senior division. Leroy Casey, Jimmy Blair and Edward White have been preparing for the junior soils evaluation contest.

Most of the above club members will be participating in the contest for the first time. Their lack of experience probably will influence some of the scores, but I am sure all of them will do a fine job.

I have received additional information from the Southwest screwworm control program officials pointing out the importance and urgency of livestock owners keeping the Foundation posted on screwworm occurrences and build-ups. Over 200 cases of screwworms were reported last week in the State. This is a sizeable increase over the previous week and still more cases seem probably as we get deeper into the worm season.

Since their facilities at Kerrville for producing sterile flies are limited it is extremely important that maximum benefit be derived from the flies that are produced there. By sending them samples of all worm cases for analysis, we can help prevent any build-ups above their buffer zone. This is particularly important now in the early stages of the program while their capacity is limited. When the large plant in the Valley gets into production, this information will still be requested, but will not have as much bearing on the success of the program. When the Mission plant opens, they will be able to seed a much larger area with a heavier concentration of flies.

Coke County's contribution of funds to the program now totals approximately \$8,200. This came from 190 producers in the county — approximately 55% of our operators.
