





Vanilla Wafer Cake

Cream 2 sticks margarine; add 2 cups sugar and cream together until light and fluffy. Add 6 eggs, one at a time to creamed mixture, beat well after each addition.

Crush one 14 oz. package vanilla wafers to fine crumbs; Add alternately with ½ cup sweet milk. Stir in 1 cup chopped pecans and one 7 oz. package angel flake cocoanut.

Blend until well mixed, pour into well greased, floured tube pan. Bake 11/2 hours at 325 degrees. Cool in pan. Delicious!

Connally was dean of his legal fraternity, was elected to Friars in his junior year, and appeared in Who's Who in American Colleges.

RELIGION: Methodist.

MILITARY SERVICE: Volunteered for active duty in the Navy months before Pearl Harbor. Served in Atlantic and Pacific combat theatres. Was awarded numerous combat decorations, including the Legion of Merit and the Bronze Star for heroic performance under pressure of battle. Rose through ranks to lieutenant commander by time of his discharge at war's end.
