New \$23,500 Catholic Church Under Construction in Bronte

Construction is well underway on a new Catholic Church in Bronte. Located two blocks north of Main Street on Washington, the new church will replace the small chapel further north on Washington which is now in use. The Very Rev. Bernard J. Binversie, chancellor of the Catholic Diocese of San Angelo and priest at the local mission, is in charge of the project.

Resident's Father Killed in Blast

Raymond Seaton, 42 year old West Texas Utility Company employee, died Saturday at Quanah Memorial Hospital from injuries suffered in an explosion Wednesday of last week at Quanah WTU plant. He was the father of Mrs. Charles (Sharon) Brown of Bronte. The Browns recently moved here and he is an employee of the WTU plant at Oak Creek. Funeral services for Seaton were held Sunday at Quanah.

The explosion injured five men. Another of the men, Russell Johnston, chief engineer at the plant, died Friday. He was an uncle of Mrs. E. K. Finley of Blackwell.

Local Officers Find and Arrest Kidnaping Suspect

A manhunt in which several hundred men, a Goodfellow AFB helicopter, two private airplanes and most all of the law enforcement officers of the area took part was brought to an end last Thursday afternoon when Jesse Parker and Oscar Renshaw of Bronte arrested a man and found a little girl who had been missing. The man and child were found about three miles east of Bronte on a country road a half mile north of Highway 158.

The man, Richard Edward Powell of San Angelo and Odessa, was returned to Ballinger where he was charged with kidnaping. Early this week charges of fondling were filed against Powell in Coke County.

The little girl, Sheila Allen, is a nine-year old third grader in Ballinger. She was bruised and scratched when found but apparently was in good condition, officers reported. A physician who examined her said she had not been criminally assaulted.

According to the girl's story and a statement by Powell, he was driving near the Ballinger school about the time the children were dismissed for lunch. He allegedly got out of his car, approached the child and told her he was her "Uncle Dick" and that an aunt of hers had died in Abilene. He was to pick her up and take her to the funeral.

Powell told officers he drove out the Bronte highway. Deputy Sheriff Parker and Constable Renshaw were looking for the man and child, and stopped an airman who had a young girl with him. The airman told the officers that he had seen the car down a country road. The officers followed his lead and found Powell and Sheila. Powell did not resist arrest, they said.

Yarborough of Houston are battling it out.

For Lieutenant Governor, Preston Smith of Lubbock and Jimmy Turman of Gober are on the ballot.

In the race for Attorney General, Waggoner Carr of Lubbock and Tom Reavley of Austin are in the runoff.

For Congressman-at-large, Woodrow Wilson Bean of El Paso and Joe Pool of Dallas are seeking a job in Washington.

John C. Phillips of Austin and Tom Ferguson of Burnet are in the runoff for Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 3rd Supreme Judicial District.

County Clerk J. L. Tinkler said this week that absentee balloting was not nearly so heavy as it was in the first primary when all local races were being contested.

Officials Charged After Altercation At Court House

Commissioner Howard Brock has paid a fine of \$1 plus costs, total of \$16.50, after charges of affray were filed late last week against him and County Judge W. W. Thetford. Justice of the Peace Roy P. Ross of Robert Lee, in whose court the charges were filed, said the fine had been paid by the Bronte commissioner, but that the county judge had not appeared to contest the charge or pay the fine.

Sheriff Melvin Childress filed the charges against the county officials after the two men came to blows last Thursday in the judge's office at the court house. The court was sitting as a board of equalization when the altercation occurred.

Commissioner Brock told the Enterprise Wednesday that the trouble has been brewing a long time "because we have a hard time getting our part of the county money down here." However, the immediate cause was that Judge Thetford was trying "to throw a brick in the way of the county donating \$1500 to help buy a new fire truck for Bronte."

Brock had made a motion at a previous meeting of the court to make the \$1500 donation and it carried. However Thetford questioned the legality of such a move, and it has been reported to The Enterprise that County Auditor Weldon Fikes has requested an opinion from the attorney general's office on the matter.

The Enterprise also tried this week on several occasions to contact Judge Thetford concerning the incident but was unsuccessful.

Brock said after some heated words between him and Thetford, the judge asked him outside to settle it. "When I wouldn't go outside with him, he jumped on me," the commissioner said.

FIRE SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Quick work by the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department limited damage to a haystack in a Sunday afternoon fire at the home of Joe Hester. The haystack was near some lots and a barn, but they were not burned. A strong wind was blowing at the time of the fire. The department was also called to a trash fire in the northwest part of town late Tuesday afternoon.

The church which will cost \$23,500, will be a model building for future diocesan churches," Father Binversie said. Contractor for the 50 by 70 foot building is J. L. Traywick of San Angelo.

The new church will be called St. James Catholic Church. The present mission is named St. Isidore Mission.

The building will include under one roof a sanctuary with a seating capacity of 300, a private chapel, and four-room living quarters for a priest. It will be of steel and concrete block construction with a brick front. Steel arches will be enclosed in mahogany in the church interior.

The priest's living quarters will include a living room, bedroom, kitchen and office.

Father Binversie told The Enterprise Tuesday that he is hopeful the construction will be completed by the end of August.

The church is being partially financed by a \$10,000 grant from the Catholic Church Extension Society of Chicago, which was requested and received by Father Binversie in April. The grant was the first to the new Catholic Diocese of San Angelo and St. James Church is the first to be begun in the diocese since Bishop Thomas J. Drury was consecrated as its bishop.

The preent mission which is a converted barracks building about 15 years old, may later be converted into a community center, Father Binversie said. Bronte Catholics purchased the 6-lot tract on which the new church is located some time ago.

Neely Returned To Local Church

Rev. Auburn S. Neely was returned as pastor of First Methodist Church here when appointments were read at the close of annual conference last week in San Antonio. This will be Neely's second year with the local church. He came here a year ago from Alice.

Other appointments of interest here include former pastors: A. Lin Loeffler returned to Ganado; James Campbell, sent from Grace Methodist in San Antonio to Eagle Pass; Bob Grimes, returned to Schertz; and W. C. Craig, who retired this year.

Dempsey Salter was also returned to Robert Lee Methodist Church.

White Auto Store Remodeled

White Auto Store in Bronte, owned by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Bruton, has been remodeled and re-decorated following smoke damage caused by the fire on May 1 which destroyed three business firms here.

The Bruton's store was not damaged by the fire itself, but the interior did receive considerable damage from smoke. Bruton said while he was cleaning up from the smoke, he decided to do a good job of it and really fix up his store.

First job to be completed was lowering of the ceiling of the building. The job was completed on May 5 and gives the store a much more spacious appearance. Walls and fixtures of the store have been re-painted and the front

of the building also received a new paint job.

Smith Working, Too

C. R. Smith has been busy since his store and sportswear factory were destroyed by the fire. He has moved into the Price building formerly occupied by Pruitt's Store and had the factory in operation on Monday, May 7, following the fire on the previous Tuesday night. Smith said this week that most of the work he has done on the building, which has been vacant for several years, is "the kind that doesn't show." He has put a new roof on the building and has been busy the past couple of weeks re-wiring the building and getting air conditioners in shape. The Smiths' son, Johnny, arriv-

ed in Bronte Wednesday and they plan to start to work at once remodeling the building. Smith said new fixtures will be built for the dry good store, floors will be re-finished and painted, and the walls and ceiling will be repainted. Work will also be done on the front of the building. Smith said he is hopeful that they will be able to open up the dry goods business sometime in July. "We're already buying merchandise and will carry a line fully as good or better than we carried in our other store," he said. A mahogany panelling partition will divide the building some 25 feet from the front, leaving the front for the dry goods store. The sportswear factory will be located in the rear.

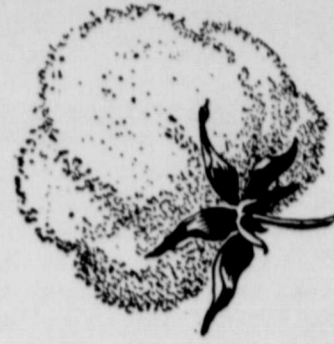

Crush one 14 oz. package vanilla wafers to fine crumbs; Add alternately with 1/2 cup sweet milk. Stir in 1 cup chopped pecans and one 7 oz. package angel flake coconut.

Blend until well mixed, pour into well greased, floured tube pan. Bake 1 1/2 hours at 325 degrees. Cool in pan. Delicious!

JOHN CONNALLY

BACKGROUND: Native Texan. Born on farm in Wilson County, near Floresville. One of 7 children of J. B. and Lela Connally. Family Bible shows birth date as Feb. 27, 1917. Connally family in Texas dates back more than 5 generations. Connally family still lives in region settled by forebears in 1849.

Was elected president of the University Student Body in 1938. Received his law degree the same year. Was also president of his law class, assemblyman from the School of Law, chairman of the Students' Assembly in 1938-39, and chairman of Student Publication Board. Connally was dean of his legal fraternity, was elected to Friars in his junior year, and appeared in Who's Who in American Colleges.

RELIGION: Methodist.

MILITARY SERVICE: Volunteered for active duty in the Navy months before Pearl Harbor. Served in Atlantic and Pacific combat theatres. Was awarded numerous combat decorations, including the Legion of Merit and the Bronze Star for heroic performance under pressure of battle. Rose through ranks to lieutenant commander by time of his discharge at war's end.

GOVERNMENTAL AND PUBLIC SERVICE: Served as Secretary of the Navy in the Kennedy administration, for which he received public and official acclaim for outstanding leadership.

Following graduation from Law School, Connally became congressional secretary to then Congressman Lyndon Johnson. Also served as administrative assistant to Senator Johnson for 8 months in 1949.

1962 governor's race is his initial effort to seek public office. Led the first Democratic primary, May 5, by 114,000 votes.

BUSINESS BACKGROUND: From 1949-1952 he was a partner in the law firm of Powell, Wirtz and Rauhaut in Austin. Formed radio station with veterans. From 1952 until appointed Navy Secretary by President Kennedy, Connally served as attorney for Richardson and Bass, independent oil operators in Fort Worth. An executor of the Richardson estate. Has participated in management of companies and corporations engaged in salt water control, carbon and carbon black, radio and TV, insurance and investments, and oil and gas. As Navy Secretary was responsible for an annual budget of 15.5 billion dollars. His personal and business life was checked and cleared by the FBI, Naval Intelligence, Central Intelligence Agency, and the Senate Armed Services Committee. Appointment was unanimously confirmed.

CIVIC AFFILIATIONS: Director, Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show; honorary chairman, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation; director, Boys, Inc., a charitable organization devoted to elimination of juvenile delinquency; member, executive committee, and councilman-at-large, Ex-Students Association, University of Texas.

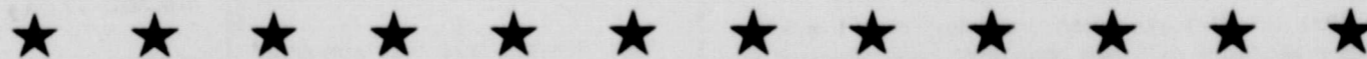
