

Hospital District Election Called in County Saturday

Election will be conducted in County on Saturday, January 12 in order to determine whether or not a hospital district shall be established and created in the county.

The constitutional amendment No. 3 was voted on in the last election and which carried statewide and by a vote of 7 to 1 in Castro County, gives the county a right to form a County Hospital District by vote of the majority of the taxpayers.

Commenting on the Hospital District election County Judge Ray Wilson declared, "This is a bond election for they have been voted, issued, and this election does not involve the Hill-Burton Funds for funds have already been applied for and are available."

The election is to determine the method of providing funds to be bonded already voted and efficient operating expenses of the hospital. Total estimated amount is approximately \$32, says Judge Wilson.

According to the County Judge, there are two ways to raise the funds through taxation, valuation and using the rate which the county now keeps the present county on and levying a tax strict the hospital district. Judge continues, "If voters create a hospital district, all funds would go to the hospital without taking a part of the tax." "This Hospital District would be a saving of approximately \$451, or a 16 year period."

The County Chamber of Commerce at its January 4 meeting endorsed the Hospital District according to Ed R. Kennedy, the C of C manager. "This Hospital District will save in excess of \$500, the taxpayer of Castro County the 16 year retirement."

Members are urged to turn out to vote, Saturday.

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Major General Monteith Will Be Banquet Speaker

Major General D. O. Monteith will be the guest speaker at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet which will be Monday night, January 14 at 7:30 p.m. in the South Grade School Cafeteria.

Dwight O. Monteith was born in Foley, Alabama, February 6, 1913. He attended elementary and high school in Centerville, Iowa and Centerville Junior College. He received a Congressional appointment to the U. S. Military Academy in 1932 and graduated in 1936; he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers but was assigned as a student officer at the Army flying school at Randolph Field, Texas. He earned his pilot wings at Kelly Field in October 1937 and was transferred to the Air Corps.

The general's career has taken him from pre-war duty as a pursuit pilot through many operational command jobs both in combat and in peacetime; he has held important staff and planning assignments. He has held advisory and liaison jobs with NATO, SHAPE, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

He graduated from the National War College in 1957. He was appointed temporary brigadier general in August 1957, a month after his assignment as commander, 3535th Navigator Training Wing, Mather Air Force Base, California where he commanded the U. S. Air Force's advanced school for radar navigation bombardment crew members.

General Monteith assumed duty as Chief of Staff, Air Training Command on July 27, 1959. Promotion to permanent rank of brigadier general came in March, 1961.

In September, 1961, General Monteith took command of the Amarillo Technical Training Center. He was promoted to the rank of temporary major general on January 30, 1962.

Presbyterians Conduct Services In New Church

Presbyterians have been in their new church since December 23, 1962 announces Burr Morris, pastor. The church has been open for two services.

The church incorporates 2800 sq. feet. Auditorium space includes 1400 square feet. Laminated beams of yellow pine and a ceiling of stained white spruce enhance the interior of the sanctuary. A single brick wall was used in constructing the sides of the church. Brick on the inside is smooth textured while outside brick is composed of a bark-texture.

A rostrum is located at the front of the church. This includes the choir, communion table, pulpit, organ, and lectern. A beige carpet covers the rostrum area and front of church. Middle aisle is also covered with matching carpet. All five classrooms of the church have large windows which open into the auditorium. Two classes located downstairs may be utilized as an overflow auditorium in emergency cases. These downstairs classes are enclosed with mahogany folding doors. One room serves a dual purpose as kitchen and classroom.

In the upstairs of the building, there are two classrooms and the church office.

The front doors opening into the church are of white spruce which have been stained brown. Hardware on the door is of black wrought-iron. The bell tower at the front of the church houses an antique bell. The cross at the top of the church is made from copper. Woodrow Killingsworth Construction Co. was in charge of building the \$33,786 edifice. The blond furniture in the church was purchased from Ward Church Furniture Co. in Greenville. The church is air-conditioned.

Presbyterians were organized in Dimmitt, October 11, 1959.

The ninth annual Castro County Junior Fat Stock and Project Show will be conducted January 31, February 1 and 2. Castro County Chamber of Commerce is sponsor of the show. County-wide 4-H clubs, Nazareth FFA, Hart FFA, and Dimmitt FFA will participate in the show.

Officials working on the show Joe Smith and Joe Nelson; sheep division superintendents are Joe Hart and John Bridges; and swine division superintendents are Milton Sharp, Leo Witkowski, and David Behrends.

Auctioneers for the show are Jack Howell, Dean Sanders, and Joe Newman. L. E. Hargroves will be judging the livestock. Clerk of sales will be Mrs. Ollene Williams. Sale committee is composed of Edd McLeroy, Doug Adams, Norlan Dudley, and Jerry Wilhelm.

All entries must be in to the County Agent's office by January 25, 1963. Entry fee is \$3 for calves and \$2 for lambs and barrows. All livestock must be in place by 5:30 p.m., Thursday, January 31.

To win overall showmanship trophy, the individual must exhibit in two divisions. A division showmanship trophy will be awarded for Beef, Swine, and Sheep. Farm Bureau will give \$100 as premium money. Dimmitt Wheat Growers have provided five showmanship trophies. Community Grain Co. has given three championship trophies.

All calves entered in this show must weigh between 700 and 1150 pounds. No calf will be allowed which is more than 18 months of age. The calf showed must have been owned by the exhibitor and fed 180 days prior to the show.

Barrows cannot weigh less than 180 pound or more than 240 pounds to be eligible for the show. Each individual will be allowed only two pigs in the show and sale.

Four classes of lambs will be shown. Classes are as follows: Southdown Crosses, Other Mutton Breeds and Crosses, and fine wool type lambs. Lambs must weigh between 80 and 125 pounds.

Awards will include five first place ribbons in each division, a grand champion banner and a reserve champion banner for each division.

Objective of this meeting, Kennedy, "is to discuss size, and cost so we can be better along these roads."

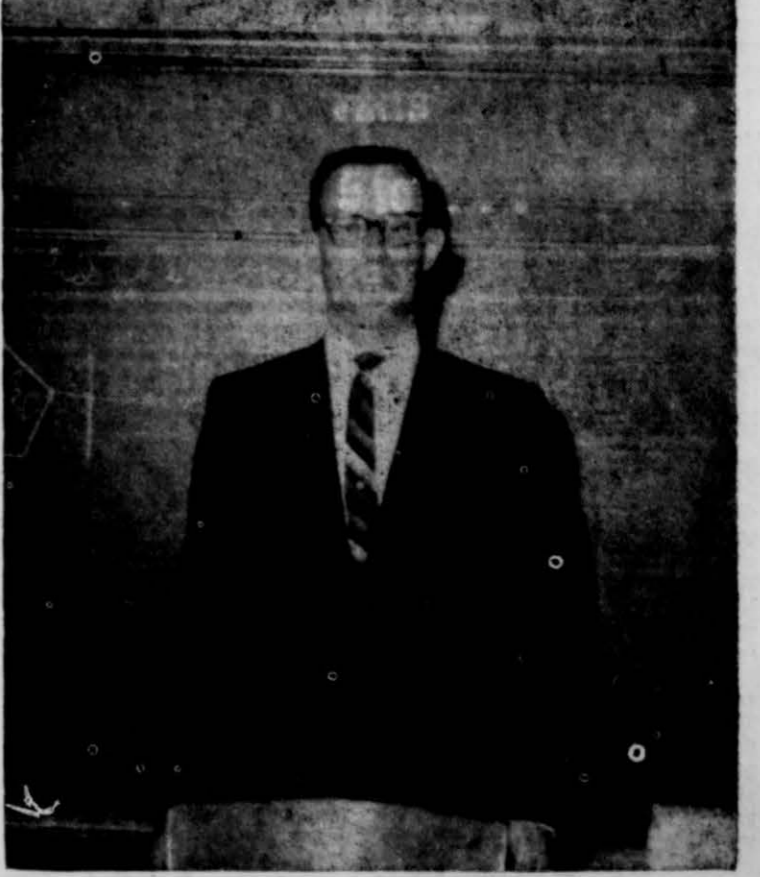

Travel arrangements will be provided by a special Santa Fe Train. Pullmans will originate in Fort Worth, Amarillo, and Lubbock. Passengers may board at intermediate points along the Santa Fe route between the cities shown below. All persons making reservations will receive detailed schedules and instructions.

The train will leave Lubbock, February 17 at 7:40 a.m. It will leave Amarillo, February 17 at 10:05 a.m. It may also be boarded at Clovis, N.M., February 7 at 11:50 a.m.

Hill Farm Feed Lot Being Constructed North of Hart

On a hillside about one mile north of Hart, a feedlot is being constructed by Bob Hill. It will be called Hill Farm Feedlot.

This feedlot when finished will hold about 4,000 head. Cattle will be completely finished and ready for market when they are shipped from the Hill Farm feedlot. Cattle will stay an average of 160 days says Hill.

Facilities at the lot include an office, weighing scale, loading and unloading chute, and 6-inch well on a pressure tank. A feed mill is being built on the southwest side of the office site.

At the present, there will be 18 pens which are 200 ft. x 300 ft. Each pen will hold 250 head of cattle. Fences enclosing the pens are composed of two-inch iron pipe set in concrete. These pens covers approximately 30 acres. Pens for sick cattle are located at the east end of the feed lot. A wind-break fence is located on the north side of the lot.

"We hope to have the feedlot going by first of May," declares Bob Hill. He says future plans include feeding and finishing 8,000 head of cattle at once.
