Mr. Clifton was born Aug. 30, 1877, in Hays County, and came to Coke County as a youth, in 1892. He married Annie Taylor of Robert Lee Aug. 14, 1905. He had farmed all of his adult life until his retirement. A few years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Clifton purchased a new house on West Railroad Street and made their home there.

Mr. Clifton is survived by his wife; one son, W. H. Clifton of Christoval; four daughters, Mrs. Alice Webb of San Angelo, Mrs. Margaret Brunson of Bronte, Mrs. Itha Mae Williams of Alamogordo, N. M., and Mrs. Geneva Minnick of Strawn; two sisters, Mrs. Omo Dye of Dennison and Mrs. Ada Easley of Oklahoma City; 15 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

## City Hall Vote Set for July 14

An election has been called by Bronte city council on the proposition of issuing bonds to build a new city hall and fire station here. The vote will be held Saturday, July 14. Absentee voting is already underway and any qualified voter who will be away from the polls on election day or who is physically unable to go to the polls may vote absentee.

The bonds are not to exceed \$18,000, as an estimate of the cost of the new structure runs approximately \$17,000.

The proposed new structure will be 80 by 27 feet and will contain nearly 2200 square feet of floor space. The center part of the building will be used to house two fire trucks, with offices and other parts of the building laid out on either side of the fire truck area.

One side of the building will contain a meeting room, offices for law enforcement officers, two holdover jail cells and a small kitchen. The other side will have a foyer for customers, office for

## WTU Downs Team From Robert Lee, Close 8-7 Score

The West Texas Utilities Oak Creek Power Plant softball team downed a group from Robert Lee Monday night by the close tally of 8-7. The game was played at the Bronte ball park.

The Monday night victory was the third of a three game winning streak for the WTUers. The local team didn't have the game wrapped up until the bottom half of the seventh inning when the winning run came in.

the city secretary, office for the justice of the peace, and rest rooms. Large folding doors will be installed between the meeting room and the fire station, so the entire area can be used for large meetings.

Coke County has agreed to pay the city not more than \$100 per month rental for offices for the justice of the peace and the deputy sheriff, and for the jail cells. This rental will pay a large part of the bond payments, city officials say, and with the rent money which the city pays for the present city hall building, will take care of the bonds. City councilmen say that no additional levy of taxes will be necessary to retire the bonds.

Jack Brown, San Angelo investment counselor, told city officials recently that they could raise money to pay for the new building by issuing time warrants or by getting the voters to pass the bond election. He recommended the bond route as time warrants currently are being sold for six per cent, while the bonds can be sold for 4½ per cent, he said. No election is necessary to issue time warrants, but the councilmen felt that a vote of the people would be desirable on this project, as well as saving the city a sizeable sum in interest, if the bonds are approved.

## Tax Cut Probable

Brown also told the city fathers that he would recommend a small cut in city taxes in the near future, as the 40 cents which was levied to pay for the sewer tax bonds is more than taking care of payments. City councilmen questioned on this matter told The Enterprise that they look favorably on an early reduction, probably to 35 cents. This would leave the city tax rate at \$1.35 instead of \$1.40.

## New Beauty Shop To Open Here Soon

Work is now underway toward getting the building and equipment ready for the opening of a new beauty shop in Bronte. The shop will be operated by Mrs. John Boyles, and she expects to have it open for business by Sept. 1. It will be located in the building which formerly housed West Texas Utilities Co., on Main Street.

She and her husband, who is a teacher and coach in the Bronte school have been busy the past several weeks redecorating the building and are now working on the fixtures. All fixtures and equipment in the shop will be new, Mrs. Boyles said.

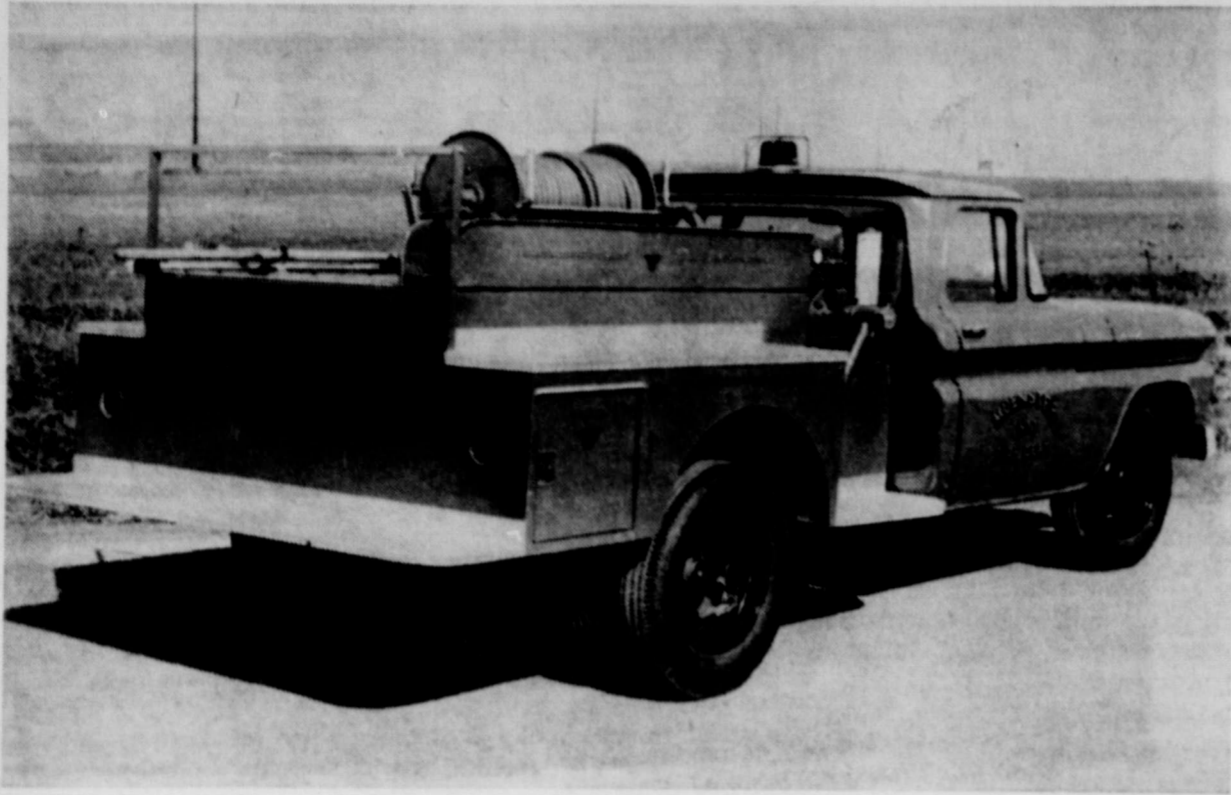
The fire department is asking for a donation of three cents per acre on all rural property and for ten cents per \$100 city tax valuation on city property.

The disastrous fire in May, which completely destroyed two businesses and badly damaged another, pointed up the dire need for more fire fighting equipment in the Bronte area. Since that time the volunteer department has been conducting an intensive drive for funds to purchase the new

truck.

Coke County Commissioners Court passed a resolution recently allowing Commissioners Howard Brock and Claude Ditmore to transfer \$1,500 of their road and bridge money to the fire truck fund. This amount plus the almost \$2,200 on hand will bring the fund up to almost \$3,700. This amount is approximately half of the cost of the new truck, so the firemen are still pushing the drive for more money.

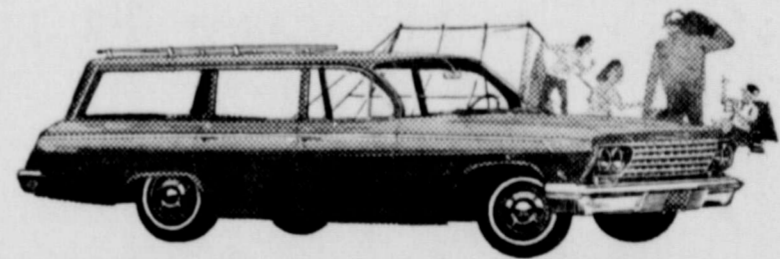

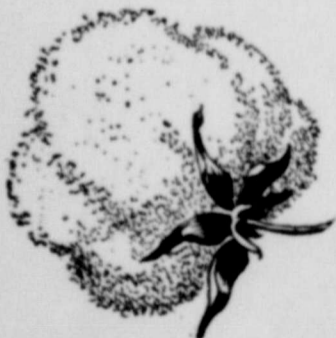

2. The said election shall be held at the City Hall within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed directors of said election, to-wit: Noah Pruitt, Presiding Judge, Mrs. Olive Keeney, Assistant Judge, Mrs. Noah Pruitt, Clerk, Mrs. O. H. Willoughby, Clerk.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty-Fourth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR THE BONDS" "AGAINST THE BONDS"

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty-Fourth Legislature, supra. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding

said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.
