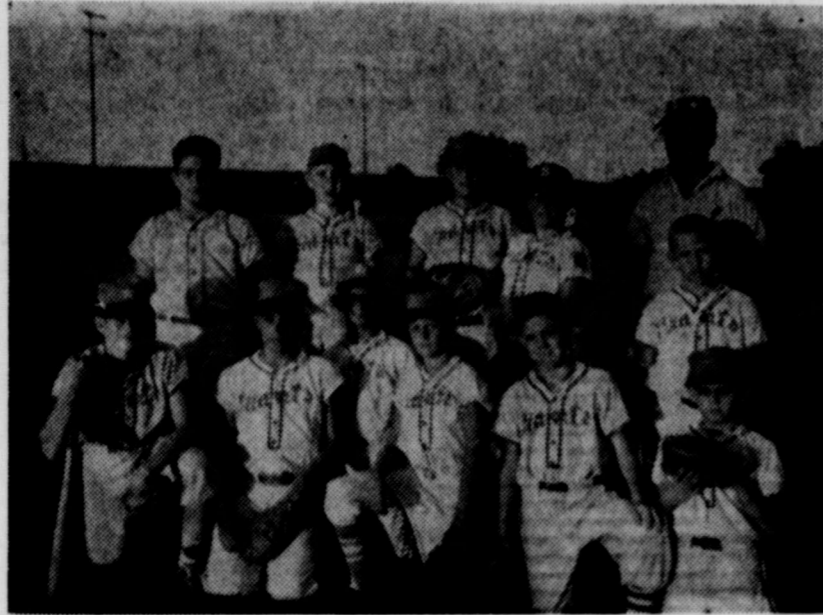

## St. James Catholic Church Opening Set for Sunday Noon

Catholics of Bronte and this area are expecting a big day Sunday when the new St. James Catholic Church in Bronte will be formally opened. His Excellency, Bishop Thomas Joseph Drury, Bishop of the San Angelo Diocese, will be present to bless the new structure at 12 noon and offer the Mass. He will also bless and erect the Stations of the Cross.

## AD-LIB-BEN

Bronte Catholics and all other citizens should be proud of the new church which has been built here. Completion of this place of worship gives Bronte five fine churches, all new — that is none of them is much over 10 years old. This fine array of church buildings makes our town attractive to outsiders who might be interested in settling here. Anybody, regardless of church affiliation, likes to live in a town that has beautiful churches.

Here's another want ad we copied: FOR SALE: The ladies of the First Presbyterian church have discarded clothing of all kinds. They may be seen in the church basement any day after 6 o'clock."

Remember back in the old days when women combed their hair into place?

The new structure was built by J. L. Traywick, San Angelo contractor, at a cost of \$23,500 plus \$2,500 for furnishings. It is located in north Bronte on Washington street. Dimensions of the building are 70 by 50 feet, with the body of the church measuring 50 by 50 feet and seating a crowd of 300 persons.

Cuckler steel, haydite tile and brick were used in the structural part of the building. Steel beams are covered with mahogany paneling, and the windows have aluminum frames. The concrete floors are covered with vinyl asbestos tile.

Eight folding doors over the Communion rail will close off the sanctuary from the main part of the church so it can be used for an activity room. Along the Epistle side of the sanctuary is a catechetical room which opens into the sanctuary with folding doors over a permanent communion rail, converting the catechetical room into a private chapel. Behind the sanctuary and off to the Gospel side of the altar are living quarters for a priest, and a Sacristy. Two outside rest rooms are built into the structure.

Furnishings for the sanctuary, altar, chairs, etc., are made of mahogany formica. Folding chairs with padded kneelers attached are pews in the new church.

The new St. James Church replaces the small St. Isidore Mission which was opened in 1951.

## Council Rejects City Hall Bids; All 9 Exceed Funds Available

All of the nine bids received last Thursday to build Bronte's new city hall were too high, according to members of the city council. The city's governing body met in special session Tuesday morning and rejected all the bids.

The bids, all from San Angelo contractors, were opened Aug. 9, with Ed Newlin submitting the lowest offer of \$22,874. This amount was almost \$5,000 in excess of the architect's estimate and the \$18,000 bond voted to

build the new structure. The bids ranged up to a high of \$26,466. Only one other bid besides Newlin's was below \$23,000.

"At the present we are negotiating with another contractor," one member of the council told The Enterprise. "We are going to have to find out where we stand on the legal end of this business," he said, "before we can go any further." The councilman said that plans are to go ahead and build the new city hall. He added that if necessary, the city can build the structure, subletting various jobs, without having an overall contractor on the job. "We definitely intend to go ahead with plans for the new city hall," he said.

In addition to Newlin, bids were submitted by Paul Simpson, W. C. Rutherford, Norman Courage, Leon A. Burke Jr., Edwin Wanoreck, John L. Traywick, J. D. Burke, and Ray Dunlap.

Doyle C. Maddux has been retained by the city to serve as architect on the job.

### RECOVERING FROM SURGERY

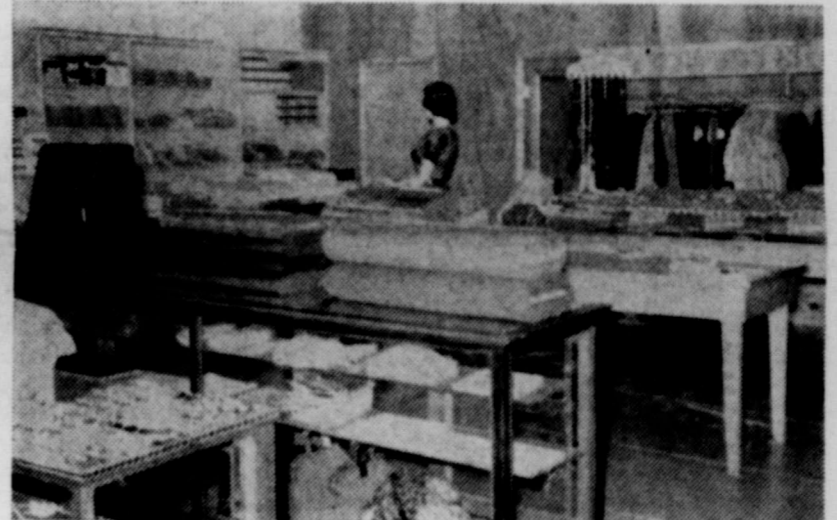

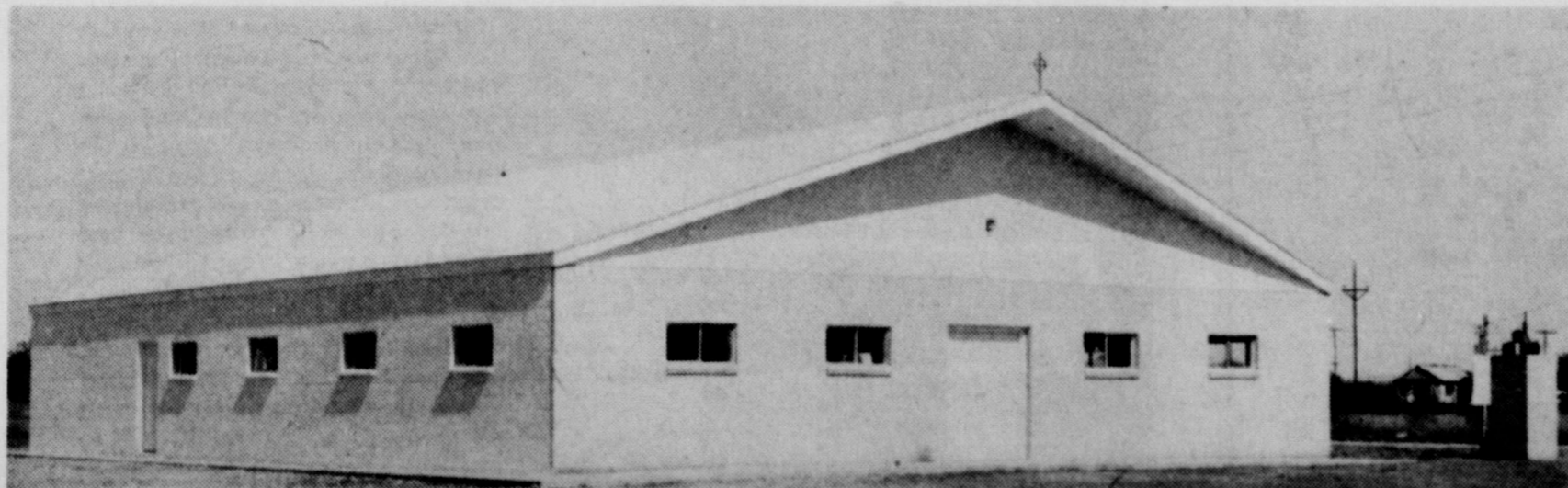

Among the items on the agenda on which action was taken were the following:

—Discussed Supreme Court ruling on prayer in public schools.

—Developed schedule for counting football gate receipts.

—Approved transportation of cheerleaders to SMU cheerleading school.

—Adopted 1961-62 amended budget.

—Approved 1962-63 budget and set date for public hearing.

—Adopted handbook of school board policies and by-laws.

—Set date for board-faculty barbecue for Thursday, Aug. 30 at 6:30 p.m.

Supt. C. B. Barbee announced several weeks ago that the 1962-63 school term will start Tuesday, Sept. 4. Teacher in-service training will be conducted Aug. 30 and 31.

Barbee also announced earlier that first graders entering school for the first time will need a doctor's certificate stating that the child has had the following immunizations: tetanus, diphtheria, smallpox and polio. In addition, a birth certificate will be required.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption by the district of any included city, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows: "Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establish-ment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, con-struction, acquisition, repair or re-novation of buildings and improve-ments and equipping same, for hos-pital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, im-provements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county; providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hos-pital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less

than all the territory thereof is in-cluded within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political sub-division shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obliga-tions for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness as-sumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified prop-erty taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the dis-trict's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obliga-tion of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

"Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxpaying voters in the district concerned."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amend-ment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and pre-scribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Leg-islature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article III a new Section to be known as Section 49-d authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and to dispose of such storage facilities and water upon such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe; providing for the use of funds received from the dis-position of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; pre-scribing the form of ballot and pro-viding for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49-d, as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum develop-ment of the limited number of feasible sites available for hospi-tal construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legis-lature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purposes of acquir-ing and developing storage facilities, for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following: governments or govern-mental agencies; by the United States of America or any agency, depart-ment or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality there-of; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term con-tracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Govern-ment. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as State bonds issued under the author-ity of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to the payment of principal and interest on

State bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the State's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized by said Section 49-c, plus the principal of the obliga-tions incurred under any contracts authorized hereunder, shall not ex-ceed the Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds authorized by this Constitution.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the State that might be stored in such facilities. As a pre-requisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant there-for shall have secured a valid permit from the Board of Water Engineers or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, trans-fer or lease of storage facilities shall be used to pay principal and interest on State bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further moneys received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the opera-tion and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt in-curred.

"Should the Legislature enact en-abling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on November 6, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49-d, provid-ing for a State program of acquir-ing conservation storage facilities in reservoirs; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49-d, provid-ing for a State program of acquir-ing conservation storage facilities in reservoirs."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political sub-division, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legis-lature may enact appropriate regula-tory laws to provide for and admin-ister a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is autho-rized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensa-tion paid to each such person by the county and State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-ment authorizing retirement, dis-ability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retire-ment, disability, and death bene-fits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Section 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Section 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, re-numbering said Section, and provid-ing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently dis-abled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and per-manently physically or mentally dis-abled be amended and renumbered so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for as-sistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who are residing in the state for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years im-mediate preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive as-sistance under this program for a permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is re-

ceiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing per-manently in any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds to any individual may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of federal funds; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance pay-ments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Govern-ment of the United States such finan-cial aid for individuals who are per-manently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsis-tent with the restrictions herein pro-vided."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-ment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thou-sand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for as-sistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently dis-abled."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 11, providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county, authorizing the levying and rates of taxes; providing for the acquisition of land and properties for hospital uses, as well as the maintenance and operation of the same; and authorizing the issuance of tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements; and further providing that any en-abling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory charac-ter.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Con-stitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coextensive with the limits of such county.

"If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the partici-pating resident qualified property-tax-paying voters who have duly ren-dered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cent (75c) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"Should the Legislature enact en-abling laws in anticipation of the adoption of the amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution permitting the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each dis-trict to be coextensive with the limits of such county."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution permitting the creation of hos-pital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be co-extensive with the limits of such county."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said elec-tion and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Con-stitution and laws of this state."

### Potato Preference Makes The Difference

What is your potato preference? How you answer this may depend on whether you consider your time or your money to be more important.

When a homemaker uses fresh potatoes, she saves money but needs more time for preparation, which most women these days do not have.

From the standpoint of both time and cost, frozen french fries are the most economical of the processed potato products. A serving costs 5.6 cents, or only a third of a cent more than the price of French fries made from fresh potatoes. Use of the frozen product saves about 5 minutes per serving.

Mashed potatoes made from fresh potatoes cost 2.3 cents a

serving, compared with 3.4 cents a serving for dehydrated potatoes. The potatoes out of a box save 2½ minutes per serving, however.

Use of dehydrated potatoes for scalloped potato servings costs 7 cents for each person, but you save 2.6 minutes time. Fresh potatoes cost 3.6 cents when served this way.

Boiled whole potatoes cost 4.6 cents a serving in a can, and if you do the work yourself, they are half that much. It requires 1.2 minutes more to prepare each serving if you peel them yourself.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justices of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the condi-

tions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be prosecuted in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effected except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trial de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trial de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 3-b, providing that school taxes theretofore voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is within Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unissued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and any voted, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3-b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3-b providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

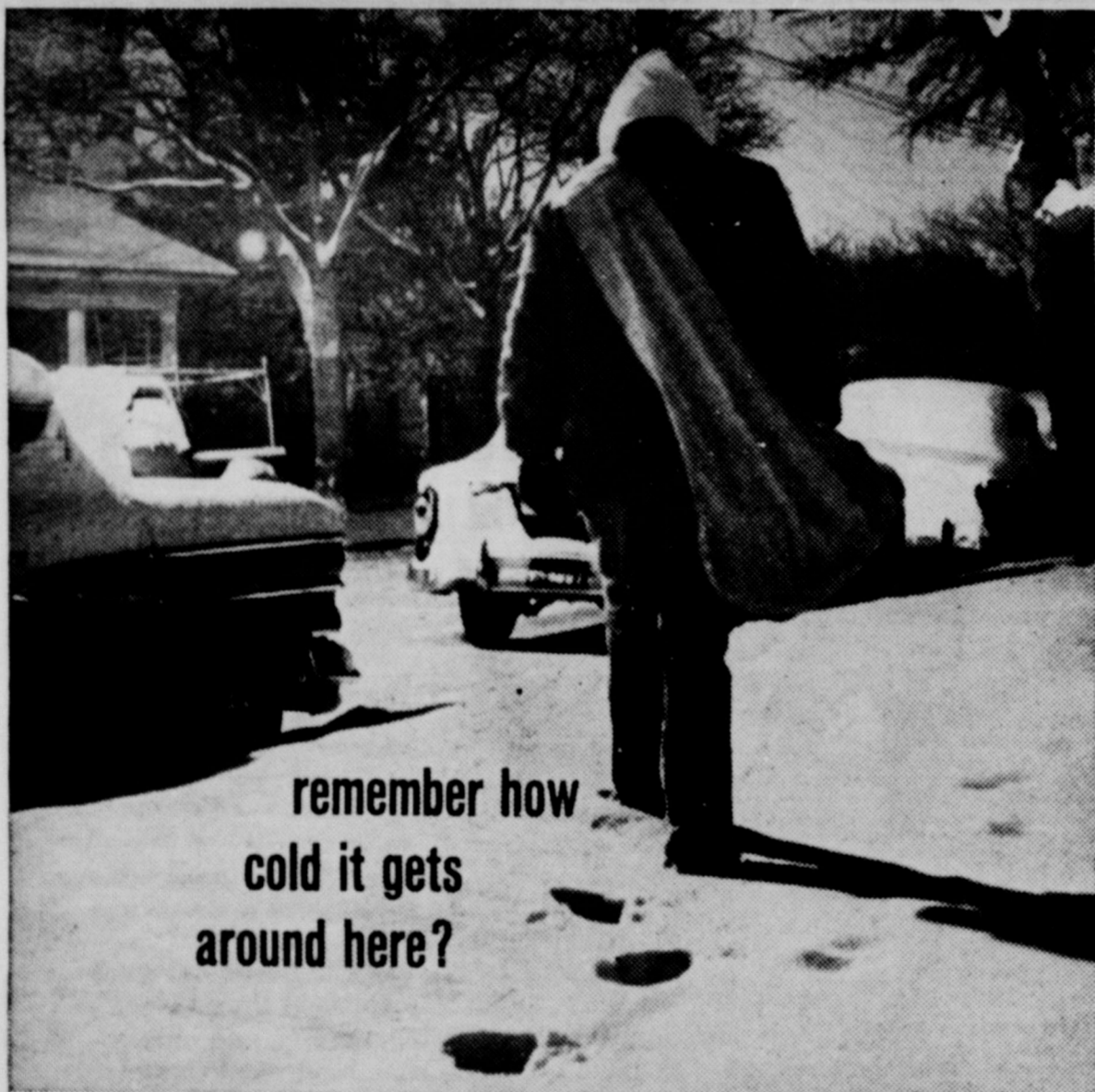
