## August 30 Date For Referendum On Wheat Controls

The Secretary of Agriculture has announced that the referendum on the 1963 crop of wheat will be August 30 and that the vote will be on the basis of a national allotment of 55 million acres. He also announced that the national average support price for the 1963 wheat crop, if quotas are approved, will be \$1.82 per bushel (75% of parity) and that if quotas are disapproved the support price to cooperators will be on the basis of a national average of \$1.21 per bushel. On the basis of present provisions of law, 15 acres or less of wheat may be planted, harvested and marketed on any farm in 1963 without penalty.

As in the past two-thirds favorable vote is required before quotas will be in effect.

Any person who will be engaged as owner-operator, cash tenant, standing rent or fixed rent tenant, landlord or a share tenant, share-cropper in the production of more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1963 will be eligible to vote in the referendum. For practical purposes, any producer that has a 1963 farm wheat allotment of more than 15 acres will be eligible to vote in Texas, both husband and wife may vote if one is eligible.

Voting will take place in the AFSC office from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. today (Thursday), Aug. 30.

## New City Hall Bids to Be Opened

A new batch of bids to build a new city hall in Bronte will be opened at 3 p.m. Friday. The city received bids once before on the new building, and opened them on Aug. 9. Nine bids were received, and all were rejected because they exceeded the amount the city has to spend for the city hall. The low bid was \$22,874.

The city recently voted an \$18,000 bond for the purpose of financing the new city hall. Plans as drawn by Architect Doyle Maddux, call for the structure to contain over 2200 square feet of floor space. It will provide storage space for two fire trucks, a meeting hall, offices for law enforcement and city officers, and room for other purposes.

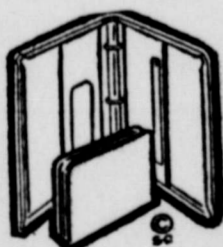
