### Participation in School Insurance Program Asked

Supt. C. B. Barbee issued a plea this week for all patrons of the Bronte School to participate in the school insurance program. He said the school is not going to be able to continue the program unless a greater percentage of participation is obtained.

The insurance costs \$3.60 per year per student, with the school paying \$1.10 and the patron paying \$2.50. The insurance provides protection for the student at all school endorsed activities.

The insurance is carried with the Security Life and Accident Co. of Denver, Colo.

Superintendent Barbee said, "This program is good for the protection of your children, and I cannot urge too strongly your participation in it."

Bronte High School Junior Class will operate the concession stand at all Longhorn football games this year. The class uses this method to raise money for the Junior-Senior Banquet and other class activities.

The Juniors invite everyone to patronize the concession stand during all home football games.

Reports from last week's tilt say that Ozona has a good football team, well trained and with quite a bit of polish. The Longhorns realize that they are going up against a stiff eleven. Coach Curlee said, but they believe they can show up well.

Admission to the game will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students.

## Rankin Downs Bronte In '62 Opening Game

In last Friday night's football game with Rankin, the Bronte Longhorns looked like what they are, a young and inexperienced team. With only four lettermen returning this year, the Longhorns were up against a more experienced team in the Class A Red Devils, and lost the ball game 30-0.

Coach N. M. Curlee said this week he still believes he has the material for a good 1962 team, and much effort is being spent in developing the boys.

In grading the Longhorns' performance Friday night, Marshall Freeman came out on top in defense and Tommy Glenn Sims and Barry Curlee were standouts on offensive play.

The game was better than the score indicates, with Rankin outdoing the Longhorns on first downs only 15-12. The local lads picked up 187 yards rushing to Rankin's 285, but outdistanced them passing with 45 yards to

their 34. Sims turned in a good performance in the punting department with 3 for a 38 yard average.

#### First Quarter

The Longhorns received the kickoff and were going great, making yardage on every play. Sims, Curlee, Malcom Johnson and Quarterback Jimmy Wells all had a hand in carrying the ball down to the Red Devil 4 yard line, where a fumble ruined their chances.

The Rankin ball carriers had a hard time getting started, and fumbled the ball four plays later. The Longhorns couldn't move, and were forced to punt. The Red Devils got to moving on the next series of downs, and had moved the ball up to the Bronte 34 yard line when the first quarter ended.

#### Second Quarter

After an incomplete pass and a five yard gain on the ground, Jerry McDonald, Rankin's big 193 pound fullback, carried the ball over the double stripe for a counter. The running conversion was good and gave the Red Devils an 8-0 lead.

After the kickoff, all the Longhorn backs were moving the ball on every play. Johnson, Wells, Sims and Curlee all made good gains and had racked up five first downs and a good scoring position on the 15. Once again, luck was against the Bronte boys, as they had a pass intercepted.

The Red Devils took over and after one short gain halfback Sam Bean got loose and ran all the way to the Bronte 30 yard line. Rankin was penalized 5 yards for delaying the game and were unable to make the necessary 15 yards in four tries. Bronte took over just outside their own 20. Johnson and Sims carried for a first on the 35, then Wells added six more yards. On the next play Wells flipped a pass to Curlee on the Rankin 39 for another first. Time was getting short and desperation pass tries didn't work. The half ended with Rankin still in the lead 8-0.

#### Third Quarter

The Red Devils came back strong after the halftime rest period and were able to make another tally during the period. Sims kicked off to start the new half, but Rankin couldn't make 10 in four tries. Bronte took their punt back to the 30. Unable to go, the Longhorns had to return the punt. The Rankin lads started moving the ball but a fumble gave it to the Longhorns, who, in turn, two plays later fumbled and gave it back to Rankin on the Bronte 15 yard line.

### Polio Innoculation Date Is Postponed

Date for giving the Sabin oral polio vaccine has been postponed, according to an announcement this week by Dr. John R. Harris. It was announced in last week's Enterprise that the first inoculations would probably be given Sept. 20. However, Dr. Harris stated that the vaccine would not be available on that date.

He said it was thought it would be shipped from Dallas, but it will have to come from Philadelphia. The doctor said a new date will be set and announcement made just as soon as he learns when the medicine will be here.

Sorghum midge is a problem not too far north of us and could invade this area.

Midge is a small gnat like insect that sucks the juice from milo heads and causes them to blast. Extermely heavy concentrations of them have been found in and around Lubbock County

lately. Midge damage occurs the first four days after the head emerges from the boot. The damage is seen later, but control measures must be employed at or near head exertion time to control midge. Midge is increasing in the State and it would be well for us to watch for it as feed and milo crops begin to head out.

## HD Agent's News Dept.

I want to give you my favorite Ice Box Cookie Recipe. It is one that has been in my family some 25 years and as yet I've never found one I like any better. It makes a quantity of dough which makes it even better since it is a timesaver!

### ICE BOX COOKIES

Melt 1 pound butter or margarine, mix with 1½ cups brown sugar, 1½ cups white sugar, 3 well beaten eggs, 2 cups pecans, 2 tsp. cinnamon, and juice of ½ lemon. Sift together 1 tsp. soda and 6 cups flour. Add to mixture. Mix and shape into rolls, wrap in waxed paper or foil, place on cookie sheet in rolls, refrigerate 12 to 24 hours. Slice very thin, bake at 375 degrees. Note — Cookie dough may be wrapped in foil, frozen and kept up to 3 months. Remove from freezer, slice and bake as above.

Here is a little fashion news for fall and winter clothing.

The shape of fashion for fall is still predominantly spare, lean lines, stripped of ornamentation. Many designers have dropped sleeve lengths on coats and suits to the wrist bone, while whittling backs of the garment to less fullness.

Texture, color and shape in 62 terms are artfully combined in a spare shaped coat of wide wale corduroy colored an elusive green gold, with the wales arranged to run diagonally from shoulder to hem and hem to shoulder.

Other dominant themes include grainy textures, such as homespun, that give a handwoven effect; double knit cottons which simulate a pique weave; woven fabrics that look like knits; and the warmth-without-weight laminate and other tailored cottons. Brown — ranging from pale beige to deep dark — is the leader in the color field. Camel and grey combinations also will be seen. Muted colors will be brightened with vibrant reds, blues and greens.

Hunters who enjoy hunting but dislike the gamey flavor of their catch will find good news in a new publication, "Wild Game — Care-Cooking," put out by the Extension Service, Texas A&M College.

The quality of game meat de-

pends to a large extent on how the game is handled from the time of kill until served, according to the bulletin written jointly by specialists in wildlife conservation and foods and nutrition.

The new publication describes with detail and illustrations the proper care of small game, big game, and game birds while in the field, in camp and at home.

Methods of cooking big game are given along with tricks for tenderizing mature and tough small game cookery and care is also explained. The flavorful cooking of many kinds of Texas game birds is discussed and tips on the freezing and storage of all types of game are given.

The bulletin comes to a delicious conclusion with a list of many wild game menus calculated to convince the hunter that Texas wild game is good for more than tracking and hunting.

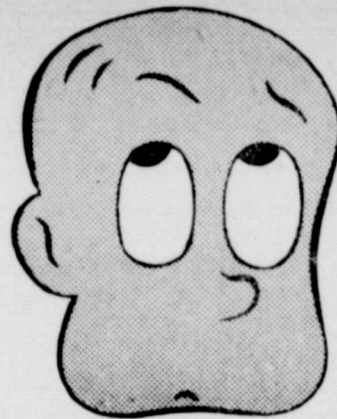

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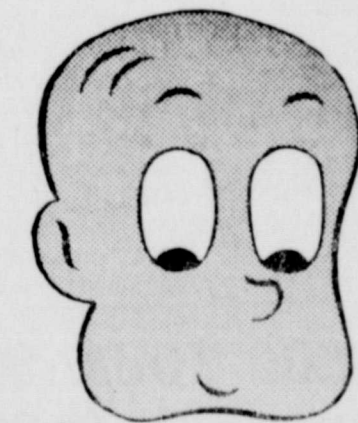
