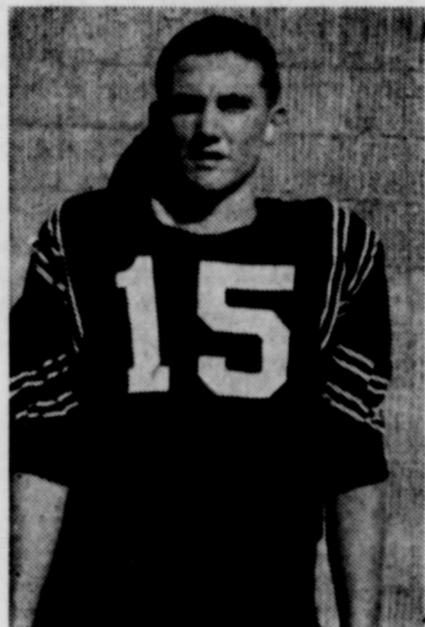

The Murphys lived and farmed in the Robert Lee and Tennyson areas for many years but had moved into Bronte upon retirement.

Health Hints

CHIROPRACTIC FOR NEURITIS.

Neuritis is the name given to an abnormality wherein the nerve trunks and the nerve fibers are inflamed. One nerve trunk may be included or there may be a general condition involving many nerves scattered over the entire body. This condition can effect sensory nerves or motor nerves.

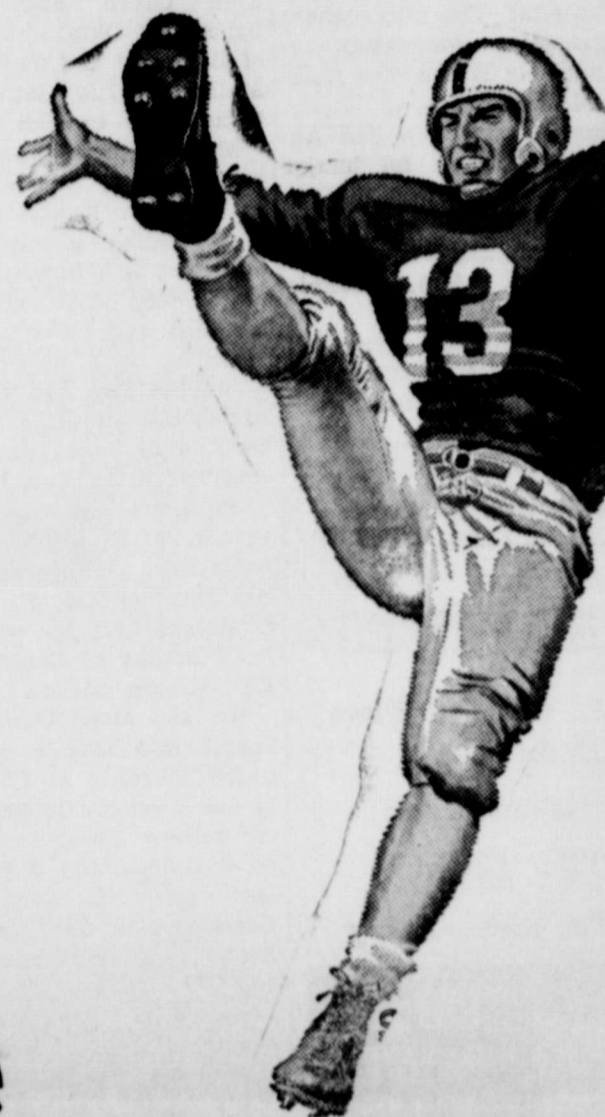

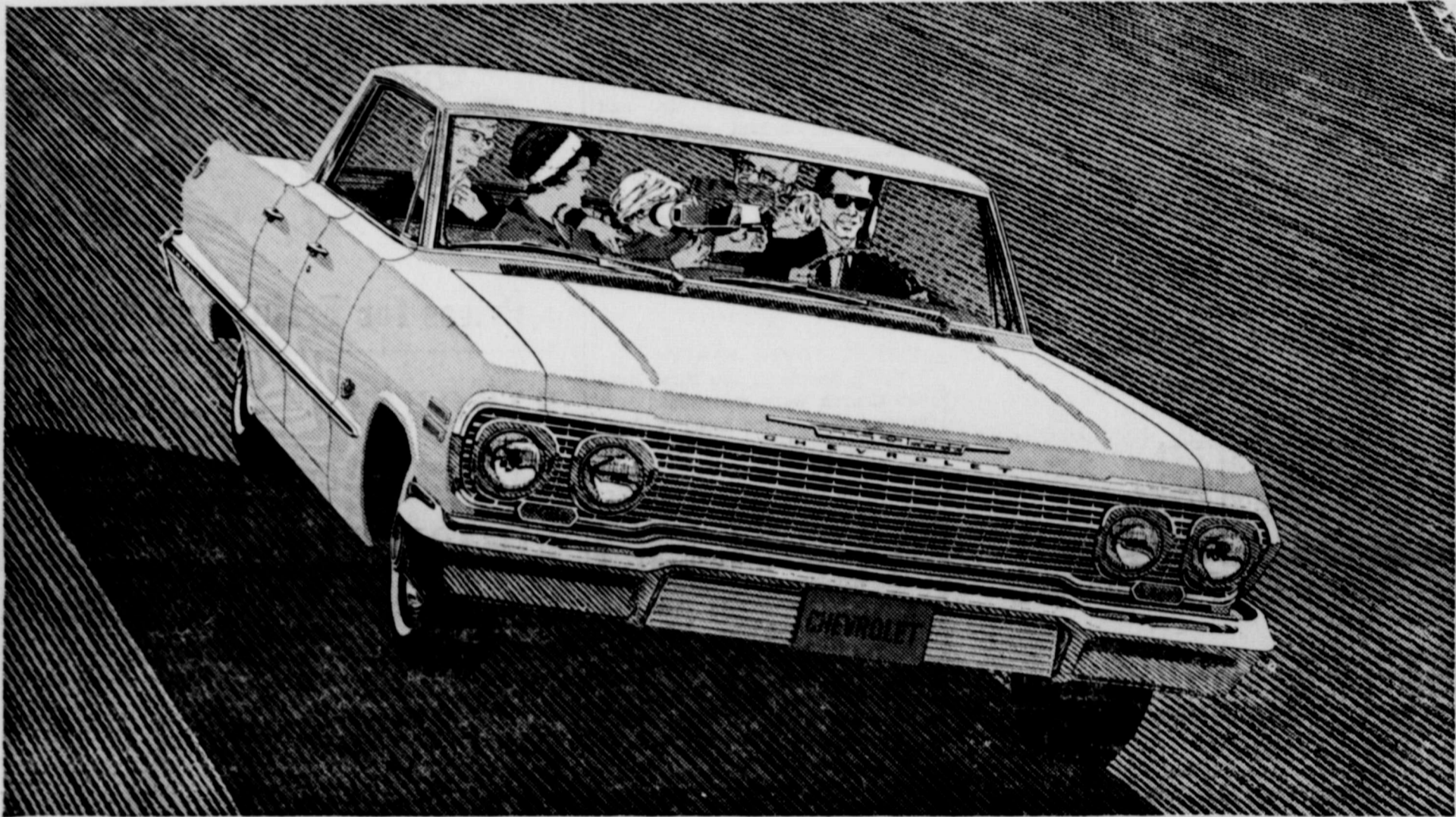

County Agents News Column

The Texas Experimental Ranch near Throckmorton will conduct a field day on Thursday, October 4, for operators in this area that would like to view some of the work they are doing. Grazing management is the study that is emphasized most in the program. Also mentioned is the suspension system of fencing that is being used on the ranch.

They will have an interesting and worthwhile program planned. If you would like more information on the program, give us a ring.

In writing about 4-H activities last week I left off Bucky Sparks. Bucky is feeding lambs with his brother, C. L., one of the Robert Lee FFA chapter members. Also, added to the list is Roy Lee Baker of Tennyson, feeding two lambs.

The San Angelo Show directors have reinstated the Range Ewe lamb class in their show. We hope to have several club members in this program. The range ewe lamb class draws a lot of interest at the show, and it gives a rancher, boy or girl, incentive to produce better, higher producing sheep. James Bird Pentecost plans to have an entry there and we hope others will as the edu-

cational values of the program are recognized.

Ben Boykin, Fred McCabe Jr. and Francis Seltz are doing some late season spraying of cotton. In addition to the normal purpose of controlling weevils they are looking to the future believing that the fewer weevils they have left in and adjacent to their cotton fields, the fewer they will have to contend with early as overwintered weevils next spring.

We are optimistic about this approach, but will wait for the outcome before making any claims. This practice, along with early stalk destruction (before the weevil has a chance to fatten and hibernates) has shown promise in the El Paso valley. We believe it will help here also. But we hope we can make a more concrete appraisal as we get into the cotton season next year.
