## Bids Invited on Fifth Flood Control Dam on Kickapoos

A legal notice in this week's Enterprise invites bids for constructing the fifth of the six dams scheduled for the Kickapoo Creeks in the Bronte area. The dams are being built under direction of the Soil Conservation Service section of the Department of Agriculture, supervised by the board of directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District.

Bids on the fifth dam will be opened on Nov. 6.

Louis Lyles of Lyles and Davis, Childress construction firm which was successful bidder on the first four dams, said Tuesday that approximately 15 per cent of the work at Sites 3 and 6 was completed at the end of the first

month's work.

The draw-down pipe is in place at Site 3 and concrete has been poured. The core-cut and back fill work has been finished at Site 6 and the contractor is ready to start concrete work. These two structures are located on property of Edward Rawlings and Mrs. Edna Butner.

Lyles also said that fencing will be completed this week on the first two dams which were built. They are located on property of W. D. McDonald and B. W. Waldrop.

The fifth dam, on which bids are currently being invited, will be the largest of the six to be built. It will impound something under 200 acre feet of water. The structure itself will be located on land of Edward Rawlings and the lake will back up on property of N. J. Taylor, Mrs. Ruth A. Spencer, Sidney Eubanks, Royce Fancher and A. H. Edwards.

## AD-LIB-BEN

The mess in Mississippi is something of which all of us in the United States, whether or not we live in that state, should be ashamed. The disgraceful activities in Mississippi must be giving old man Khrushchev a good belly laugh, and will surely be used for months to propagandize against our country.

We are not entirely in sympathy with the way this situation was handled by the President and his little brother. Neither are we entirely in sympathy with the Governor of Mississippi and other state officials who have been flaunting authority. We feel that a little sincere compromising by both sides could have worked out this problem. They might not have been able to work it out in the fall of 1962, but the problems have been a long time in forming and certainly are not yet resolved.

Well, Walker is being detained for psychiatric examination. Really, this examination should have been made when he was relieved of his army command for indulging in politics, against army regulations.

A good lesson can be drawn from Walker's behavior. It clearly illustrates that extreme rightists can be harmful, as well as extreme leftists.

Coach John Boyles said that when the clock was stopped after McCutchen's sensational run, the it showed ten seconds remaining on the clock. The host team was able to receive the kickoff and get off two plays in the last few seconds, but were unable to dent 12-8 score.

Supt. C. B. Barbee attended a meeting of Texas school administrators Sunday and Monday in Austin. Purpose of the meeting was to study ways of implementing school accrediting standards and standards for the certification of teachers and administrators in this state.

Included among speakers at the meeting were Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson; Dr. Willard Goslin of George Peabody College; and Maurice B. Mitchell, president of Encyclopedia Britannica Films. The meeting was sponsored by the Texas Association of School Boards and the Texas State Teachers Association.

Barbee made the trip to Austin with three other area school superintendents: Dorman Thomas of Robert Lee, J. B. Cushing of Loraine and Ted Averitt of Hermleigh. They returned Monday night.

## Longhorns Fizzle and Fall to Rochelle Hornets; Score 14-10

The Bronte Longhorns started out with a bang last Friday night but pretty well fizzled out before the game was over with the Hornets of Rochelle. The Longhorns apparently had things under control during the first part of the contest and led the Hornets, 10-0, but when the final whistle blew the score stood at 14 to 10, in favor of the host team.

Rochelle's tallies were made in the second and third quarters and the Longhorns tightened up again in the final stanza, but were unable to cross the double stripe themselves and overcome the four point lead.

## First Half

The local lads received the opening kickoff and Barry Curlee ran it back about 30 yards. Tom-Glenn Sims, Malcolm Johnson, Jimmy Wells and Curlee each took a turn at carrying the ball and penetrated into Rochelle territory when Johnson fumbled the ball and the Hornets recovered. Van Waddill, Bobby Keesee and John Banks were the big guns on Rochelle's ball carrying staff, and they managed to get back across midfield where they, too, suffer-

ed from fumbleitis. Marshall Freeman recovered for the Longhorns. Taking possession of the ball, the Longhorns started a drive that was to carry them to pay dirt. Good gains were made by each member of the backfield, and the ball was moved into scoring position in eight plays in spite of two 5-yard penalties for off-sides. Wells carried the ball across the double stripe and Rudy Phillips kicked it squarely between the goal posts to make the score 7-0.

Sims kicked off to Keesee who was stopped at his own 24. On the first play of the series Freeman caught a fumble in the air and ran with it to the 19. Sims and Johnson carried to the 8 for a 1st and goal. Curlee made 5 in two plays, but Bronte was penalized 15 yards for clipping. Sims carried two for 8 and 3 and the Longhorns had a 4th down and 7 yards to the goal line. They decided to use Phillips' kicking toe and try for a field goal instead of taking a chance on the ground route. Phillips' aim was good for three points and the Longhorns led 10-0.

Sims kicked off after the three-pointer. The Hornets couldn't make the necessary 10 yards, with Johnson getting the tackle on the fourth down try. The ball went over, and the Longhorns tried a couple of passes but they didn't connect. A short gain on third down left the Longhorns no choice but to punt. The Hornets were set for and started a steady march down field, using both ground and aerial plays. Keesee received a pass on the 9 and then carried down to the one foot line. He went over on the next play, but the conversion try was no good, and Bronte continued to enjoy a comfortable lead, 10-6. Rochelle had time to kickoff to Royce Lee who brought the ball out to the 30 when the first half ended.

## Second Half

Sims kicked off and once again the Hornets were on the march. Keesee made some outstanding runs, and more yardage was picked up by Banks and Waddill. Their combined efforts put the ball on the one yard line, from where Adams carried it across. Keesee ran the conversion and
