## Good Rain Falls Here

A fine rain fell in this area Monday evening, measuring up to more than 4 inches in some places. The moisture covered a large area in this part of the state but did miss some sections. Measurements here in Bronte varied from 3.5 to 3.8 inches. The rainfall was lighter both to the north and south of here.

The Blackwell area reported from 1 inch to 1.6 inches, and Oak Creek Lake was said to have gained seven inches of water.

Edward Cumbie reported 2½ inches at his place a few miles to the north. Jim Mackey, to the

northeast, had 3 inches. Don Edmiaston, who lives just across the county line on the Ballinger highway, had 3½ inches, as did Raymond Lee of Maverick community. Sam Seay, in the Marie community, had 3 inches. A. N. Rawlings, who ranches southwest of town, had 1.1 inches. Claude Dittmore, out toward Tennyson, had 1.9 inches, and Austin Sandusky, northwest of Bronte, had 2 inches.

Mrs. Jack Corley said the rain missed them at their place southwest of Tennyson. Robert Lee had about 3 inches, but the moisture missed the Sanco and Silver areas.

Ranchmen and small grain farmers liked the rain, stating that it would give their pastures and young grain a good sendoff before frost.

The Bronte Longhorns have been winning football games pretty regularly for the past few years, but this year our gridiron fortunes have been on the lean side.

Our lack of attention also defeats the very reason for playing football—that is, to develop our boys into men with manly qualities. Included in these should be loyalty, honesty, and the ability to take whatever is dished out. These boys may have difficulty in finding inspiration from our example.

We believe that the 1962 Longhorns will develop into a good team with a little more time, but if they don't win a game all season, we still owe it to them and to ourselves to give them our wholehearted support and loyalty. "A house divided against itself cannot stand."

## Blanket Defeats Bronte, 20-14

The Blanket Tigers tightened up last Friday night and came from behind to defeat the Bronte Longhorns, 20-14. The Longhorns led 14-6 until midway in the last period when Wayne Shaw intercepted

a Longhorn pass and ran it back to the Bronte 8. From that point Gene Laughlin went over to score the winning TD. Bronte's two counters came on a quarterback sneak in the 3rd quarter by Jimmy Wells from the one yard line and in the fourth quarter when Tommy Glenn Sims went over from the one.

## First Quarter

Bronte kicked off to Blanket to start the ball game, with Sims' kick going to Laughlin on the 20. Marshall Freeman, Rudy Phillips and Wells racked up three tackles before the Tigers could make their 10 yards, so Tyler Damron punted and the ball went dead on the Bronte 21 where the Longhorns took over.

With two penalties going against them, the Longhorns had to make 20 yards for a 1st. They were unable to do this, and Sims punted to the Tiger 38. Blanket started a series of ground and aerial gains which led to the first touchdown of the game. After moving the ball to the 16 yard line of the Longhorns, Damron threw a pass to Wayne Shaw for the six points. An attempted kick conversion was no good, and the Tigers went out front 6-0.

Blanket kicked off to Johnson, who went from the 20 back to the 41 for a good return. The Longhorns were unable to make the necessary 10 yards, however, and Sims punted to the Tiger 21. Once again Bronte suffered penalties of 20 yards, helping the Tigers move the ball upfield. With a 1st and 5 on the 44, the Blanket lads were unable to make their 1st. Damron punted to the Bronte 29. Wells carried for 2 yards to end the quarter.

## Second Quarter

Sims ran the ball out to his 47 on the first play of the quarter. Johnson carried a couple of times for short gains, and Sims made another gain of 7. Again the Longhorns were penalized, this time for offensive holding. An incomplete pass was thrown and Sims punted to the 22. The ball was brought back, however, and Blanket was penalized 15 yards

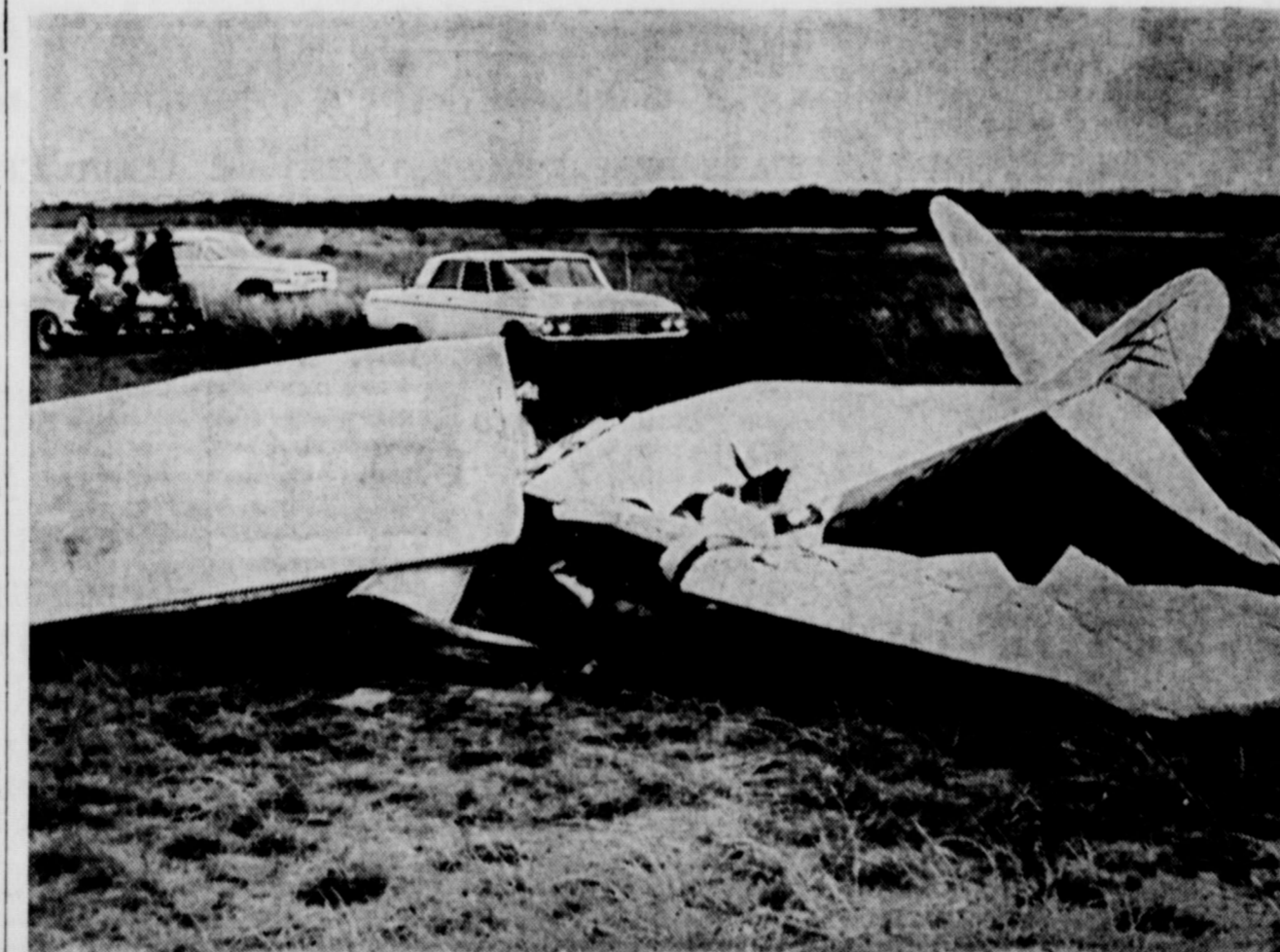
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## HOMECOMING CALLED OFF

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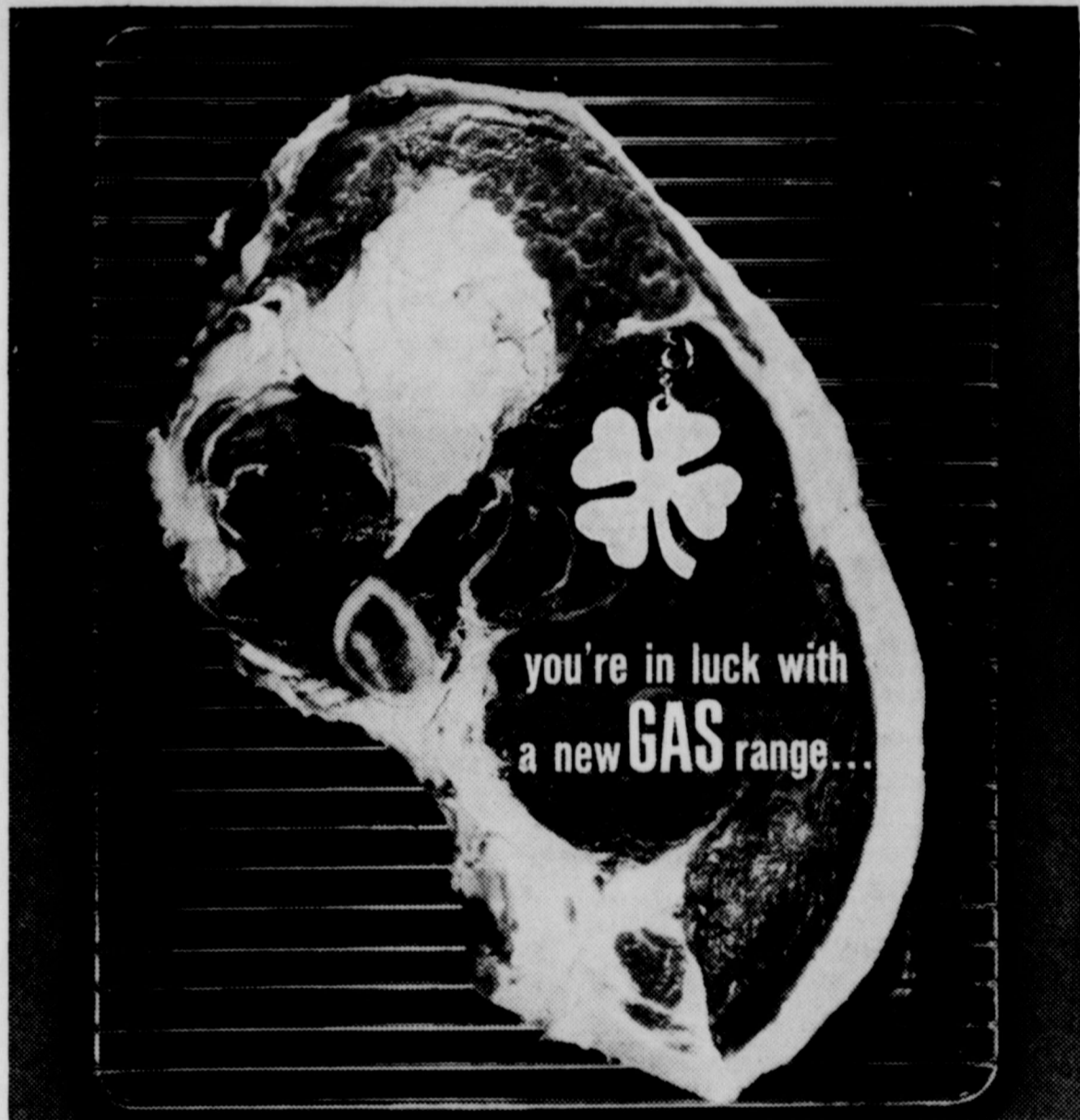

# County Agents News Column

By **STERLING LINDSEY**

I know everyone has heard one or more success stories that make you stop and try to visualize how the superlative reached was reached. Henry Varnadore had one to tell last week. But he went one step farther and showed his masterpiece. Mr. Varnadore had a volunteer watermelon plant to come up at the end of his house. The vine produced one watermelon that tipped the scales at 70 pounds.

I have seen watermelons that were heavier, but none of the others had the history behind them that this one had.

I saw an interesting report the other day in which shearing sheep once a year was compared to shearing them twice a year. The report listed eight advantages in support of twice a year shearing. They looked impressive, but on the other side of the fence, eight likewise good reasons were given for not removing the wool twice annually. The report pointed out that a net gain of \$1.04 per ewe can be derived by shearing twice a year if an assumed 5% increase in lambs can be weaned with a 5 pound weight advantage over those from ewes shorn annually. But, in conclusion the statement was made that "individual circumstances and preferences govern this decision in most cases."

The Southwest Animal Health Commission is redoubling, renewing its efforts in support of the screwworm eradication program

now in progress in the southwest. They have informed local committees that the program will collapse if the remaining \$1.3 million in contributions is not obtained. They have appealed to our county animal health committee to secure the remaining 28% of our goal. We are \$3233.80 short of our goal of \$11,783. A total of \$8549.20 has been contributed by 197 Coke County operators. These figures were arrived at by assessing each cow or horse \$.50 and each head

of sheep, goats and swine at the rate of \$.10 each.

The Foundation is desirous of having the statewide drive during the week of October 14-20. The Coke County Committee plans to meet on Tuesday night, October 9 to discuss the program.

for holding. With a 4th down and 6 to go, Sims tried to make the 1st, but managed only 4 yards. The ball went over to Blanket on the 47 yard line. A ground play for no gain and two incomplete passes forced the Tigers to kick. The Longhorns were unable to make a 1st, so Sims kicked to the 45, and the ball was run back to the 41 where Wells and Morrow stopped it. A couple of plays later, Damron threw a long pass, but Sims intercepted it on the 10. Barry Curlee, Sims, Wells and Johnson moved the ball out to the 35 making two 1st downs, but suffered an offside penalty and couldn't make the third 1st down. Sims punted to the 47 and the Tigers came out 3 yards to the 50. The Tigers made short gains, but had to punt. It went out on the Bronte 12 yard line.

Sims went for a 33 yard scamper, but Bronte was penalized 15 yards for holding. A couple on the ground netted a loss of 5 yards so Wells threw a pass to Curlee for a net gain of 30 yards, and then threw one to Wesley Murphy for 12 yards to wind up the 1st half of the ball game.

#### Third Quarter

The Tigers kicked off to the Longhorns to start second half. Curlee took it on his 25 and moved it out to the 37. Sims made 8 and Wells added 4 for a 1st down on the 49. Wells, Sims and Johnson made 11 in 3 tries for another 1st on the Tiger 40. On the next series of downs the most controversial play of the game occurred. After losing 8 yards on the first three plays, Wells tossed a pass to Murphy, who lateraled it to Curlee. Curlee ran down the north sideline to cross the double stripe, but an official called the play back, ruling that Curlee stepped out of bounds on the 28 yard line.

In spite of this hard luck, the Longhorns went on to score. Moving the ball on down field the Longhorns had a 1st and goal on the 7 yard line. Johnson didn't gain on the first play. Sims made 5 and then 1, to leave the Longhorns with a 4th and a yard to go. On the next play, Wells carried it over on a keeper. Rudy Phillips kicked the ball between the uprights for the extra point and the Longhorns led, 7-6.

Sims kickoff gave the Tigers the ball on their 27. Johnson and Phillips got the tackles and an incomplete pass left the Tigers short and they had to punt. Damron kicked to the Bronte 48. Sims and Johnson carried the ball to the Tiger 40 for a 1st down as the third quarter ended.

#### Fourth Quarter

Wells started the last period with a good gainer of 16 yards and a 1st on the Tiger 24. He then made 12 yards for another 1st on the 12. Curlee made another 1st with an 11 yard gain, leaving the ball on the 1 yard line. Curlee then made a short gain, and on the next play Sims went over the goal line. Once again Phillips' kick was good and the Longhorns led 14-6.

Sims kickoff went to Damron on the 28, the runback carrying to the 39. On the next play a pass play from Damron to Laughlin netted 52 yards. Curlee finally stopped Laughlin on the Longhorn 9 yard line. Damron then tried a pass but failed. On the 2nd down he faded back to pass, but instead ran across the double stripe for a TD. Damron then ran the conversion for 2 points, to tie up the score, 14-14.

Jerry McClain kicked off to Wells, who took it on the 20 and ran it out to the 38. After one try on the ground, Wells threw a pass but it was intercepted by Shaw who got loose and ran it from the 50 to the Longhorn 8 yard line. Damron carried the ball over for a counter on the next play, making the score 20-14. Conversion pass was no good.

Bronte received the kickoff and on the first series of downs made it out to their 44, with the aid of a 15 yard holding penalty against Blanket. Royce Lee threw a pass on the next play which was intercepted by Randy Baker on the Tiger 46 yard line. The visitors made one 1st down, and then Lee intercepted on his 34 yard line. After a couple of fruitless efforts,

Wells tossed a pass to Murphy for a gain of 26 yards but the play was called back and the Longhorns were penalized 5 yards for offside. After that loss the local lads couldn't make the necessary yardage and the ball went over on the Bronte 22 yard line. The Tigers got off four plays before the ball game ended, 20-14 in their favor.

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
