New Fiber A new man-made fiber, Orlon Sayelle, has made its appearance in knit wear this fall. This is a bi-component acrylic fiber made by Dupont. Bi-component means "consisting of two parts." Two separate and different types of acrylic components have been fused in a two sided structure. This structure is continuous through-


