700 Persons Take Sabin Oral Vaccine

Approximately 700 persons received the first Sabin polio vaccine inoculation last Thursday. The vaccination program, set up at Bronte school, was under the direction of Dr. John R. Harris, and was administered under the supervision of Mrs. A. R. Bagwell R. N., of the Harris Clinic.

Dr. Harris said he was well pleased with the large turnout which received the protection

against Type I polio, but he was very emphatic in his remarks encouraging everyone who failed to take the vaccine to do so this weekend.

The vaccine will be available at the local clinic Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The local doctor and city health officer said that 100 per cent participation in the program is the only sure way of stamping out polio. "Even though you may never take polio," he said, "you may be a carrier of the disease and give it to someone else. The Sabin vaccine is the surest thing we have ever had to completely do away with polio."

Plans are being made to offer Type II Sabin vaccine in about six weeks. Announcement of the program will be made in The Enterprise as soon as plans are complete.

Longhorns Win Over Trent 6-0

The Bronte Longhorns found what they have been looking for all season last Friday night — a gridiron victory. Breaking into the win column for the first time this season, the Longhorns downed the Trent Gorillas 6-0.

The lone tally of the game was made by Malcom Johnson early in the second quarter after Barry Curlee made 29 yards on a pass from Jimmy Wells. The Wells-Curlee combination was a beauty and set the ball up on the 3. Trent was penalized half the distance to the goal and Johnson carried over through the line.

First Quarter

Bronte won the toss and Jessie Acuna kicked to the Longhorns defending the west goal. The kick was stopped on the 25 and after 3 tries the Longhorns lacked yards having a 1st down. Manuel Reyes kicked the ball 35 yards and the Gorillas took over on their 40. Claborn, Keegans and Griffith teamed up on the ball carrying chores and carried for a 1st on

the Bronte 45. Keegans, Griffith then went 11 yards in 2 carries for another 1st on the 34. A yard penalty for offsidess made it 1st and 15. During the next few plays Trent was penalized 5 for illegal procedure and 15 for holding. In spite of good gains, the Gorillas were faced with a 4th and 9, and the final effort on the drive was an incomplete pass into the end zone.

Bronte took over on their own 31. Sims made 6, Curlee added 2, and Wells on a keeper went for 10 and a 1st on the 49. Johnson then made 6, and Sims added a short gain, but the play came back and the Longhorns were penalized 5 for offsidess. Sims, Wells and Johnson all made gains, but the local lads had a 4th down on the Trent 35 and 4 yards to go when the 1st quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Sims picked up a long 4 yards to start the new quarter and the Longhorns got a new lease on life with a 1st on the Trent 30. After

a couple of losses, Wells tossed the all-important short pass to Curlee who almost broke into the open. Curlee was stopped on the 3, however, and after a short penalty against Trent, Johnson went over for the vital 6 points. Rudy Phillips tried for the extra point but his kick missed the space between goal posts.

Tony Olivas got off a short kick to the Gorilla 44 and the Trent team set out on what looked like a march for pay dirt. Keegans and Claborn carried for a 1st on the Bronte 45, then Griffith gave Keegans assistance on the next series for another 1st on the 33. On the next play Trent was penalized 15 yards on a personal foul. In spite of the set back the Gorillas went on for a 1st down on the 22, and later made another on the Bronte 10. Again the Gorillas got caught and were penalized 15 yards for another personal foul. Then Bronte was penalized 5 for offsidess and Trent followed with

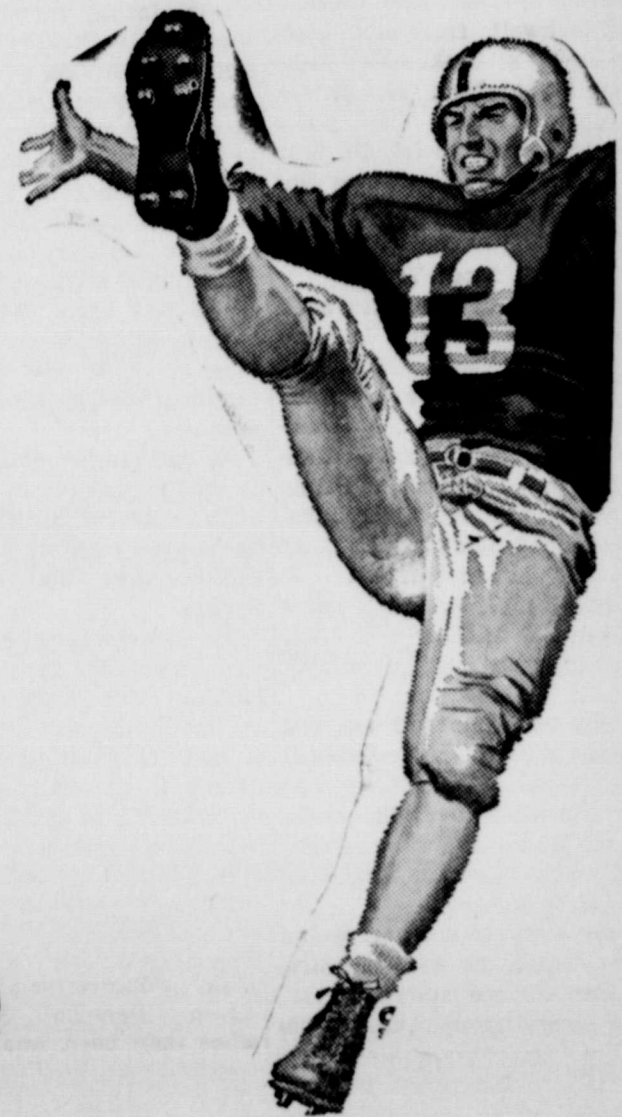

Bronte Ag. Dept. To Have School on Farm Electricity

A farm electrification short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 10-13, sponsored by the Bronte High School vocational agriculture department, according to Supt. C. B. Barbee and J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher.

Bob Jaska, farm electrification specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A & M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at A&M.

Jaska has a master's degree in agricultural engineering. Since 1947 he has been prominent in research work in farm electrification at A & M, in addition to teaching the subject in his department.

He has taught many short courses on this subject in various parts of the state which have been very successful, according to Hulan Harris, area supervisor of Big Spring.

The course here will begin at 7 p.m., Dec. 10, in the agriculture building. The other four meetings in the series will be on Dec. 11, 12 and 13. During the dates the course is in progress, Jaska will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction.

Farmers interested in attending should call or contact Supt. Barbee or Henry. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Certificates will be presented to farmers attending all the training sessions.

Subjects which will be covered include safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install circuits, how to fuse and ground electrical equipment, electric motors, reversing and changing motors, calculating cost of electrical equipment.

The first meeting will cover "Safety in the Home" and enrollees are encouraged to bring their families. Visitors will also be welcome.

County Agents News Column

The move to control screwworms continues to move forward. The last report I received a sizeable drop in number of screwworm cases was reported (week before last) in the state. Here in the county some operators are still having frequent cases, particularly around Bronte and the northeast portion of the county.

The Mission plant is now producing an excess of 75 million male sterile flies a week. They probably will reach 80 million some time in the future. The drop zone has been enlarged to include a section west of the previous zone and up the Rio Grande. The new area is bounded by Eldorado and Ozona, roughly, on the north.

In the way of funds, the voluntary contributions, unofficially, have climbed above the \$2 million mark. On the local front interest continues as 69 operators have donated \$2364.30 in the new drive. We are still \$789.70 short of our goal. We will make our goal if the present trend continues.

Army worms continue to bother small grains and in some cases in areas east and southeast of us. Green bugs and various kinds of lice have been found in some fields, also I do not believe, as dry as we are, and as cool as it is getting that either will be a major problem here. If they are not here now, their chances of building up this late in the season are pretty slim. Never the less, I would be watching for their tell-tale signs. Once established, either can severely damage and even destroy a small grain stand.

Mrs. Roe and I will be meeting with a number of groups and/or communities to give information on preparing for an atomic disaster or natural disaster and possibly to assist with community plans. But I would begin now to develop a family plan, setting forth what each member is to do at a given hour should an emergency arise. If you know where the rest of your family is and what they intend to do, you will be more at ease. The more family action plans we have developed, the less likely we are of having a state of confusion.

"There is always more of this sort of a thing at this time of the year," the sheriff said.

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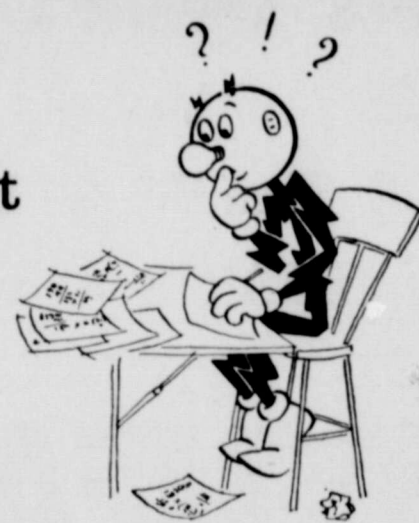

another offside, but Bronte refused the penalty to leave the Gorillas with a 3rd down and 18 yards to go. Keegans tried a ground play, but the Longhorns held him for no gain. The next play was crucial and Griffith took a pitchout and then threw a pass to the end zone intended for End Ronnie Lawlis. Defense of the vital play was accomplished by Jimmy Wells who out jumped the intended receiver and knocked the ball to the ground. The ball went over on the 18 yard line.

The Longhorns couldn't make the needed 10 yards, so Reyes punted, getting off a nice kick that was stopped on the Trent 49. The Gorillas were held to a gain of 7 yards on three tries, and a fourth down pass went incomplete. The ball went over with three seconds left in the half.

Third Quarter

Phillips kicked off to McElmurry to start the second half of the ball game. Line of scrimmage was set up on the Trent 44. The Gorillas were set back 15 on a holding penalty, making it 1st and 25. Keegans tried to pass, but was caught way back for a loss of 15 yards. With 40 yards to go for a 1st down, the Gorillas quick-kicked. It went for good yardage and was finally stopped on the Bronte 38. In spite of a 5 yard assist given by an offside penalty against the Gorillas, the Longhorns couldn't make a 1st down, so Reyes punted to the Trent 26. Three tries later the Gorillas were all set to return the punt when a Longhorn jumped offside giving

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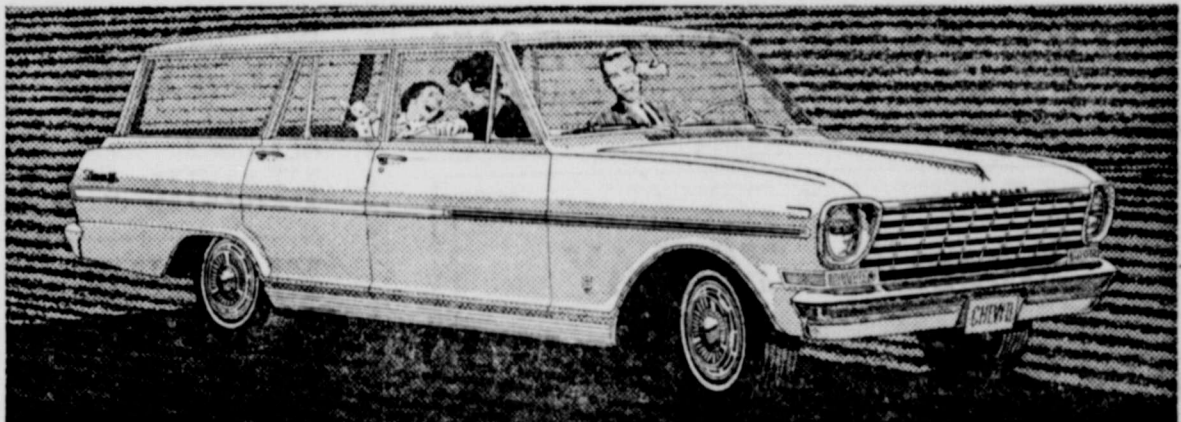


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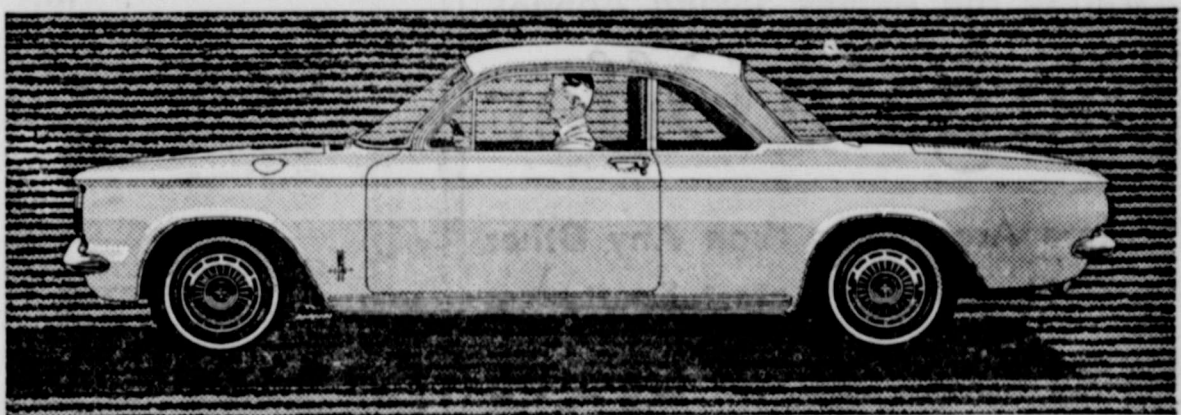
