Longhorns Look Good In Spite of Game Loss

The Bronte Longhorns lost their final ball game of the season last Friday night at Robert Lee, but the local lads looked good all the way and put up a stiff fight against the highly favored Steers. Score on the contest was 24-6.

The game was scoreless during the first quarter, but early in the second period Comie Hallmark found the double stripe for the Steers. Shortly after, Tommy Glenn Sims made Bronte's only tally of the evening on a beautiful

50 yard run. Rusty Dodson made another TD before the half and Hallmark added counters in the third and fourth quarters for the Steers. His last touchdown was a 55 yard run on a pass interception, a real beauty.

First Quarter

Jimmy Caraway kicked off to the Longhorns with Jimmy Wells taking the ball back to his own 32 yard line. The Longhorns made 6 with Malcom Johnson carrying, and Sims getting 6 more for a 1st on the 44. Bronte failed to make the needed 10 yards on the next series and Manuel Reyes punted to the Steer 35.

The Steers immediately started a march that was to take them almost to pay dirt. Hallmark, Dodson and Lynn White carried the ball down to the Longhorn 12, but after making 6 yards in 3 tries, the Steers had a 4th down and 4 yards to go. They couldn't make it and the ball went over on the 5 yard line.

The Longhorns punted from the 13 after making 8 yards in three runs. Wells' kick was good for 36 yards with no run back. The Steers gained only 5 yards in 3 tries and Dodson dropped back as if to punt but it fooled the Longhorns and he ran to the Bronte 36 before Johnson brought him down. He made another 5 before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Hallmark ran to the 18 and on his second try went across the goal for the first counter. A pitch-out to Dodson was stopped short on the conversion. Score: 6-0.

Going down into Schleicher County with a party of hunters, Youngblood said that Friday afternoon he was sitting down by some bushes and saw this big 10-pointer about 75 yards down the way. He just raised his gun and hit the animal so squarely he fell on the spot.

"I'll be 76 years old next Sunday," the Bronte banker told the *Enterprise* Saturday "and that was the first time I ever took a shot at a deer." Asked if he would go back next year, he said he didn't think so — that he'd better give up deer hunting while he was ahead.

Chances are Bronte residents will have a chance to see the proof of the kill as Youngblood said he was having the antlers mounted.

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County Agents News Column

The Screwworm Control program continues to make changes, all of which we hope will result in screwworm eradication at the earliest possible date.

We have not received a late report on the State-wide fund drive, but unofficial reports indicate progress toward the desired goal. Locally, Coke County is still moving forward. A total of 78 operators have made a contribution in the drive to reach our goal. But, we still lack about 3% of our goal.

During the past week 937 samples were confirmed at the Mission Plant as being screwworm. This is quite a reduction from the previous figures. We can attribute part of the reduction to cold weather. We hope and believe the sterile fly applications have had their effects also.

There has been some concern over sprouting pecans over the State this year. The pattern has not been the same as in past years. Fred Brison made some comments on the subject that should be of interest. He writes the following:

The pecan is a fruit containing a seed (the kernel). Seeds are of two general classes — (A) those that will germinate promptly if favorable conditions prevail, and (B) those that are normally de-

layed by some inhibiting factor or influence. The pecan belongs to the first class and will germinate promptly upon maturity or even before maturity.

Some premature sprouting of pecans in the hulls occurs every year, but the trouble is quite general this year.

Several samples have been received by the Horticulture Section. One grower said half of his Western Schley pecans were sprouted. Another mentioned that many Success and Schley are sprouting.

In the past it has been thought that sprouting is more likely to occur in pecans that have thin shells and thick heavy husks which retain moisture. It is being observed this year that much of the sprouting is occurring in nuts on which the husks are still green. In some cases the husk never separates from the nut; in other cases it does separate in a fashion but not completely. In all cases the nut is ruined for commercial use.

The specific causes of this trouble are not known. It has been observed that it seems to be more prevalent when a long dry period during summer is followed by abundant rainfall during late summer and early fall — just prior to the harvest season.

The Texas Section of American Society of Range Management will hold its annual meeting at the Townhouse Hotel in San Angelo on December 7-8. They have planned a program that should interest us in this area, it will be convenient for us. I hope we can have a delegation there. I will give further details on the program at a later date.

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WTCC Men Talk Over Problems Of Coke County

Three representatives of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce from Abilene met with a delegation of Coke County citizens Thursday night of last week in Robert Lee to discuss industrial possibilities and economic problems of the area.

Present from WTCC were the executive vice president, Fred Husbands, George Jordan and Ralph Duncan. About 20 persons from over the county were present. The meeting was called by the Coke County Building Committee, under leadership of Extension agents Sterling Lindsey and Fay C. Roe. Bill Allen, chairman of the committee, presided.

Husbands took charge of the program and presented some facts and figures from his files about this area. The conclusion of the group was that the best chance for economic improvement and development of industry lies in improvement of agricultural agricultural production and use of agricultural commodities produced in this area.

Husbands said in his opinion a project such as feedlot fattening of cattle or lambs would be a natural for this county. Noting that livestock is the main product of the county and that much feedstuff is produced here or nearby, he said these advantages plus proximity of markets for the finished product made feeding look like a good prospect for new industry here.

The WTCC manager told the group, "Nobody is going to put an industry in Bronte or Robert Lee

unless they think they can make a profit from it." He suggested that local citizens take a hard look at what they have to offer and when that question is answered, to make plans to attract businesses which need the resources available.

Lindsey stated the Extension Service has plans to make an extensive survey of the agricultural resources of the county, and business men present from Bronte and Robert Lee were of the opinion that they should make similar surveys of assets of the towns.

HD Agent's News Dept.

Family preparedness is very important in any kind of emergency—after the emergency arises it is too late to prepare.

Have you thought of what you need to have on hand in case of a tornado or a nuclear attack? Do you have food, first aid supplies, water, radio, heating equipment, lamp? Are all these supplies adequate, are they in working order? Do you know what to do to avoid being made ill or badly burned from rays and dust caused by nuclear attack? Do you know what makes a good shelter from these rays and the dust? Who will give your community the alert?

If you cannot answer yes to all these questions, I hope you will attend one of the meetings being held over the county by Mr. Lindsey and me. Our program will help you to answer all the questions I have listed and more. Family preparedness shows good sense.

Meetings scheduled to date are Monday, Nov. 19, Sanco; Thursday, Nov. 29, Olga; Monday, Dec. 3, Robert Lee auditorium. Each meeting is being held at night in order for as many people to come as possible. I hope you will attend the meeting most convenient to you. Food specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture say you should remove any stuffing left in the turkey immediately after the meal and store it in a covered container in the refrigerator. Wrap the bird loosely and refrigerate at once.

Also, quickly cool and refrigerate the gravy.

For top quality and flavor, use left-over turkey, stuffing, and gravy within one or two days.
