Two new county officials were sworn in Jan. 1. They are Mrs. Inez Burns and Jack Corley. Mrs. Burns is the new county treasurer and Corley is the new commissioner for precinct 4.

Sworn in as County Treasurer by J. L. Tinkler, county clerk, on January 1, Mrs. Burns succeeded Mrs. Gertrude Gray, who has moved to San Angelo to begin work with the welfare department.

Mrs. Burns and children three weeks ago moved into their new home, about a block north of Highway 208 in Robert Lee.

"I have enjoyed the few days in the office and think I will like the work," Mrs. Burns said this week. She is a graduate of Robert Lee High School, Class of '47, was cheer leader and played on the volley ball team.

Corley succeeds Claude Ditmore who is retiring from public life to look after his farm and ranch interests. Ditmore has been precinct 4 commissioner for 14 years, and before his retirement was the senior member on Coke County's governing body. He did not run for re-election.

Other members of the commissioners court presented Ditmore with a new Elgin watch upon his retirement.

J. L. Tinkler, re-elected county clerk, was the only other voted upon in the 1962 election. He was appointed to the office in 1955 by the commissioners court to fill out the unexpired term of Weldon Fikes, who resigned at that time to take over the newly established office of Coke County Auditor. Mr. Tinkler is serving his second elective four year term.

Mrs. Gray served ten years in the office of treasurer, elected in 1952 for a two year term, then serving two four year terms after the amendment was passed lengthening the terms of county officials.

Livestock Show Will Be Held Monday in R. L.

The 1963 Coke County Livestock Show will be held at the show barn in Robert Lee next Monday, January 14, with approximately 60 4-H and FFA boys and girls vying for the honors, prize money and places in the sale. Twenty-six classes of sheep, cattle and swine will be shown with 200 ribbons, banners and trophies and \$600 in prize money going to the winners. Another \$3,000 is expected to be grossed in the sale that will follow completion of the exhibitions.

Approximately 220 head of selected livestock will be exhibited. If the weather man cooperates, a full house is expected to be on hand to view the exhibitions and pull for their favorite entries.

Stock will be placed in the show barn at Robert Lee park Sunday afternoon between 1 and 4 p.m. Louis Bridges, V.A. teacher at Eden, and former rancher and sheep breeder of Bronte, will be present to sift and classify entries.

Absolutely painless, the vaccine will be given orally on a sugar cube. The vaccine will be given to all school children who took Type I vaccine several weeks ago without signing another permission certificate.

Dr. Harris urged that everyone take the vaccine, as it not only prevents polio, but keeps its recipients from being carriers of the dread disease. Participation in this program by everyone, Dr. Harris stated, is the best method we can see for elimination of polio.

No charge is made for the vaccine but those able to do so are asked to contribute 25c to cover the cost of the program.

"Through the contributions of the American people over the past quarter century, research developed the Salk and Sabin vaccines and polio has virtually been eliminated as a threat to the lives and well-being of children, even though millions of dollars are still needed to aid those stricken in former years.

"Now we are striving to help the thousands of infants and children disabled by birth defects and arthritis." The chairman said there are fully 11 million Americans, including thousands of children, afflicted with some form of arthritis or rheumatic disease.

Bronte folks are urged to contribute liberally, as they have in the past, when contacted by the volunteer workers.

D&B Listing in Coke County Up 13 Per Cent

Mr. A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced Friday statement requests were mailed to 54 businesses in Coke County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1963, totaled 54 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in this area as compared with 48 in January, 1962, an increase of 13 per cent for the period.

According to Mr. Hemphill, each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns — to the corner grocery worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total businesses in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added 43 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book Listings of Coke County businesses, including 12 names added, 11 names deleted, and 20 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. Changes occurring in Coke County are higher with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

Using the Dun & Bradstreet Reference listings as a guide, it is interesting to review what has happened in the principal Coke County communities during the past year:
