Coke Park Board Has Meeting, Summer Employees Named

N. M. Curlee, Bronte Longhorn coach, has been hired as life guard and instructor for the local swimming pool and park for the coming summer. He holds certificates in swimming, diving, water safety and small crafts.

John Hartsell, English instructor in Bronte schools, was also hired for summer work in the park and to assist Curlee.

The employees were named at a precinct 2 and 4 park board meeting Monday night in the Aubrey Denman home. The group also voted to fill the channel, which runs through the park, with oversized rock and soil to make flower beds; to put new seal coat and speed traps on streets; to construct more tables and to erect a new bleacher at the ball field.

All members of the board were present including E. F. Glenn, Joe Rawlings, L. J. Sonnenberg, Bud

Maxwell, Royce Fancher, Norman Kiker, J. T. Henry, Douglas Snead and commissioners Jack Corley and Howard Brock.

Sonnenberg is a new member of the board, recently appointed to take Jack Corley's place. Corley automatically became a member when he took office as commissioner of precinct 4. Kiker is also a new member, by virtue of his election as mayor of Bronte last Saturday.

Aubrey Denman, park caretaker, said tentative opening date for the swimming pool this year is May 24.

Now retired, the Russells were in the stock farming business at Eula.

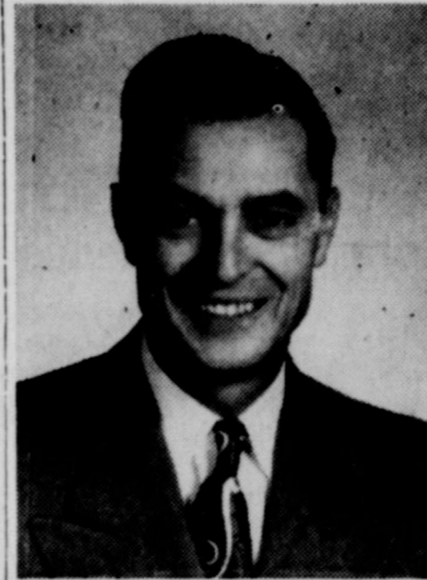
Mrs. J. B. Morrow has returned home after spending several days in Clinic Hospital, San Angelo, for medical treatment and observation.

Kiker Is Sworn in As Bronte's New Mayor

Norman R. (Wink) Kiker was sworn in Tuesday morning as mayor of Bronte. Kiker won the office in a special election held Saturday. Kiker fills a vacancy created by the death last fall of Mayor J. A. Stephenson.

Kiker was the only candidate who filed for the mayor's position, but in spite of the lack of competition 69 persons turned out to vote. The new mayor received 63 of the votes while write-ins gave H. O. Whitt 4, and Mrs. Kiker received 2.

Kiker said that he felt it a high honor to be mayor of Bronte, and said "I will try my best to carry on the duties of the office the way the people want the job done." He thanked all the voters who cast their ballot for him.

The city council met Tuesday morning to canvass the ballots, after which the new mayor took the oath of office.

B. D. Mackey, city fire marshal, warned against putting clothes with any inflammable substance in washers. He said "people are better off just to burn dirty, grease-soaked clothes than to wash them in gasoline and then put them in a washing machine. It would be far less expensive besides of the danger involved."

Sharon and Rebecca Walker, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Walker, Jr., of Robert Lee exhibited the Champion and Reserve Champion Breeding swine of the County Show. They also took home the swine breeders trophy as they were the breeders of Joe David Key's second place heavy weight market hog, the top placing market animal produced in the county.

Sharon and Rebecca exhibited the Champion and Reserve Champion breeding swine last year also. They have compiled a pretty good record for two years in show competition.

We would like to recognize also, Hollis "Y" Cafe and T. E. Pitcock for their contributions. Their names were accidentally omitted from the list of buyers.

Eleven club members participated in the Abilene Fat Stock Show last week, meeting some stiff competition. I believe we held our own, but the competition was keen.

Among the calf entries, and all of these were exhibited in classes containing 35 or 36 animals, Sheri Pitcock made the most noteworthy contribution. Her light weight steer placed fifth. Brother Gaylon placed 14th in the

same class and a third member of the family, Darrel was 8th with his light heavy weight steer. Darrel's other steer, a heavy weight, placed 19th.

Also in the steer showings, were James Bird Pentecost and Jo Alice Evans. James Bird's light hereford steer placed 22nd and Jo Alice's heavy weight steer in a very good class of steers placed 30th.

Exhibiting lambs at Abilene were Nicky Arrott, Wesley Ash, Ronnie and Donnie Devoll and James and Tooter Fields. Here the going was rough also. Wesley was tops among the sheep entries from our group with his heavy weight crossbred lamb that placed 6th in a class of 80 lambs. 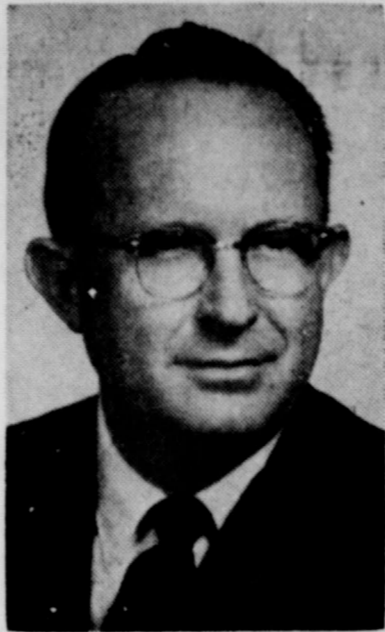
