## Girls Bi-District Game At 7:30 P.M. Tuesday

Bronte High School's district championship basketball girls will meet Forsan Tuesday night at Colorado City. The Bronte girls are title winners in District 84-B, while the Forsan girls won District 83-B. Winner of the game will advance to the regional playoffs to be held in Odessa.

Bronte girls have a 7-1 record in district play, having been defeated only by Miles in the last game of the season. The Forsan lassies have a perfect district record.

Thirteen girls make up the traveling squad for Bronte. They are Peggy Corley, Manuela Reyes, Marla Rees, Jan Wilkins, Georgia Owens and Joy Kay Moore, forwards; Johnnie Sims, LaJan Kiker, Jessie Renshaw,

Mary Corley, Tricia Andrews, Jeanna Kay Denman and Judy Lee, guards.

High school principal Joe Simpson is coach of the district champions.

### Beat Talpa in Thriller

The girls outdistanced Talpa four points in a thriller Tuesday night. Score was 62-58 in favor of the locals. High scoring honors went to Jan Wilkins who had 26. Marla Rees had 23 and Peggy Corley 13.

Coach Simpson said the girls were really hitting their stride in the game, making 62 per cent of their free shots and 60 per cent of their field goal tries. Talpa girls are champions of District 82-B.

### Will Practice Friday

The girls will go to Colorado City Friday afternoon to practice at the site of the bi-district contest. They will leave here in time to begin their session at 4:15 p.m., and it will end at 6:30.

Marla Rees is the outstanding scorer for the Bronte girls this season with 493 points. Peggy Corley came in with the second best record with 316. Other season records are: Jan Wilkins, 252; Joy Kay Moore, 87; Georgia Owen, 60 and Manuela Reyes, 31.

Supt. C. B. Barbee announced this week that a school bus for students will be run to Colorado City, if enough wish to go. Students who wish to ride the bus must see their principals and pay the 25 cents admission fee before they will be permitted to go on the bus. Grades four through 12 will be permitted to ride the bus. Barbee said that a limited number can be accommodated on the bus and that those who turn in their names and 25c first will be the ones allowed to go.

Admission prices to the bi-district game will be 25 cents for students and 50 cents for adults.

## Bronte Home for Aged Discussed at Meeting

A Lions Club committee charged with working toward securing new industries and other enterprises which would be an asset to the community met Monday afternoon with a representative of Homes for the Aged, Inc., of Fort Worth.

Troy Duncan of Lometa was present to discuss his firm's proposition and answer any questions asked by committee members.

After some discussion, the committee voted unanimously to contact Golden Heritage, Inc., of Dallas to see if the firm would be interested in acquiring and operating a home in Bronte.

Matthew Caperton, committee chairman, said Wednesday that he has written a letter to the Dallas firm inquiring into the necessary steps to make a deal.

The proposed home would provide living facilities for 30 elderly persons, and would cost about \$40,000. It would contain 6225 square feet of floor space. Duncan said the payroll and other local expenditures would pour approximately \$40,000 a year into the local economy. He said that Licensed Vocational nurses would be employed to care for the occupants of the home.

If arrangements can be made

with Golden Heritage to take over the home, the only local expense would be the cost of acquiring a site. An alternate plan calls for local residents to furnish a site and \$7,000 which would be repaid in two years. Caperton said that either of the two plans would be considered by the committee.

Two sites were discussed and committee members brought out that both have sewer and utilities services available.

Committee members present at the meeting were Caperton, L. T. Youngblood, Ben Oglesby, Mayor Norman R. Kiker, Rev. A. S. Neely and D. K. Glenn.
