

Absentee Balloting Begins in School Trustee, City Elections

Ballots in two forthcoming elections have been printed and delivered and persons who wish to vote absentee in the April city and school elections may do so.

Persons who will be unable to get to the polls on election day, either for physical reasons or because they will be away, are eligible to vote absentee.

Absentee voters in the city election should go to the city hall to cast their ballots, while those who wish to vote absentee in the school trustee election should go to the county clerk's office in Robert Lee. A written request to the offices may be used to have the ballots mailed to voters, also.

No opposition to the two incumbents will appear on the city ballot. C. E. Bruton and Royce Fancher were the only two candidates to file for the two vacancies on the city's governing board.

On the other hand, six candidates are running for three vacancies on the Bronte school board. Incumbents Bob Wilson, Conda O. Richards and Joe Raw-

lings, and new candidates James Wells, Horace Taylor and L. J. Sonnenberg have their names on the ballot.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 2, at the city hall, while the school election will be Saturday, April 6, with one voting box setup at Tennyson and another at the city hall in Bronte.

Kickapoo Watershed Tour Set For Thursday; To Inspect Dams

A two-hour tour of the Kickapoo watershed will be conducted today (Thursday) for all interested persons who would like to see the work that has been done in the interest of soil conservation and flood control. Particular attention will be given to dams which have been built under the sponsorship of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District. The tour will leave from First National Bank, Bronte, at 1 p.m.

Sponsored by Bronte Lions Club, the tour will observe structures which have been built on property of W. D. McDonald, Edward Rawlings and Mrs. Edna Butner. The cover on the Rawlings and McDonald properties will be of special interest.

The dams which are being built on the Kickapoo watershed were brought about by necessity to control disastrous floods which have swept the area and the City of Bronte twice in recent years.

Type III Vaccine To Be Available

Type III Sabin oral polio vaccine will be available to all residents of this area Friday of next week, March 29, city health officer Dr. John R. Harris, has announced. The serum will be available to everyone who will take it, Dr. Harris said.

The vaccine will be given at the local school, in the same fashion as has been used in administering Type I and II, and will be given to school children who wish to take it, as well as adults.

Dr. Harris urged everyone in the area to take the vaccine, as it will render those who have taken the series completely immune from polio and from being a polio carrier.

Mrs. Joy Bagwell, office nurse at the Harris Clinic, will be in charge of giving the medicine. She said it will be given on a sugar cube and will be completely painless to take.

KILLED IN PLANE CRASH

Mrs. O. L. Shurley has received word of the death of her nephew, Billy Jack Van Zandt, 34, in an air crash last Friday near Karak, about 40 miles west of Tehran, Iran.

Van Zandt was a pilot for Lebanese Trans-Mediterranean Airlines. Funeral services are pending at Gorman pending arrival of the body by air express. Capt. Van Zandt visited the Shurley family here last summer.

Funeral services for Mrs. Birdie Finley Mote, Blackwell post office clerk, were held Sunday at the Blackwell Methodist Church. Mrs. Mote was fatally injured at 6:25 a.m. Saturday in an automobile accident in Blackwell. She was taken to a Sweetwater hospital, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Mrs. Mote had backed her car from the Smith Cafe in Blackwell when it was in a collision with a semi-trailer truck carrying a load of cement. The truck, driven by James Arnold Johnson of Roscoe, was headed south on State Highway 70. Johnson was not injured.

The impact pushed Mrs. Mote's car into a pickup parked at the Earl Cook place, and damage to the pickup was estimated at \$400. Mrs. Mote's car was demolished. It was towed to Caperton Chevrolet's lot in Bronte later Saturday morning.

Mrs. Mote was born Nov. 29, 1909, in Coke County and had lived in the Blackwell area all of her life. She had been employed in the post office there for the last ten years. She was also well known in Bronte, having worked here at various times during the last several years.

The Rev. Jesse Dea, Blackwell pastor was in charge of the funeral rites. He was assisted by the Rev. C. F. Powell of Hereford, formerly of Blackwell. Wells Funeral Home of Roscoe was in charge of burial in Blackwell cemetery.

Survivors include three sisters, Mrs. Ida Oden and Mrs. Josie Craig, both of Blackwell, and Mrs. Virginia Sissom of Bronte; a nephew, Ray Sissom, and a niece, Diane Sissom, both of Bronte.

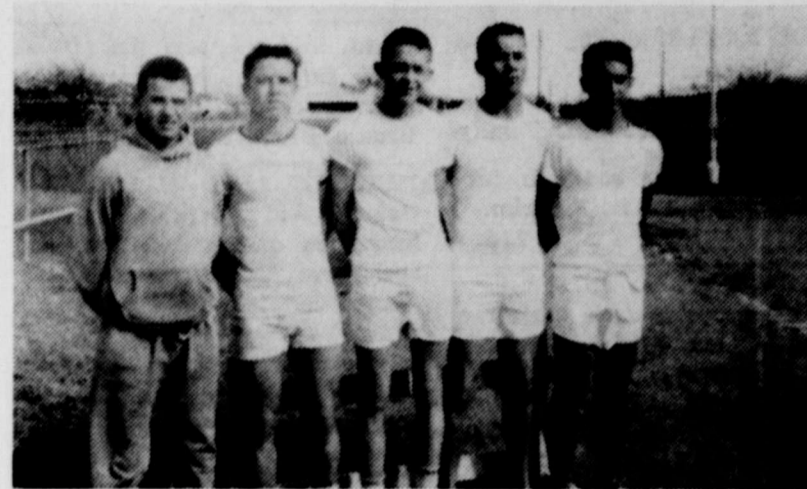

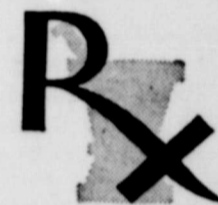

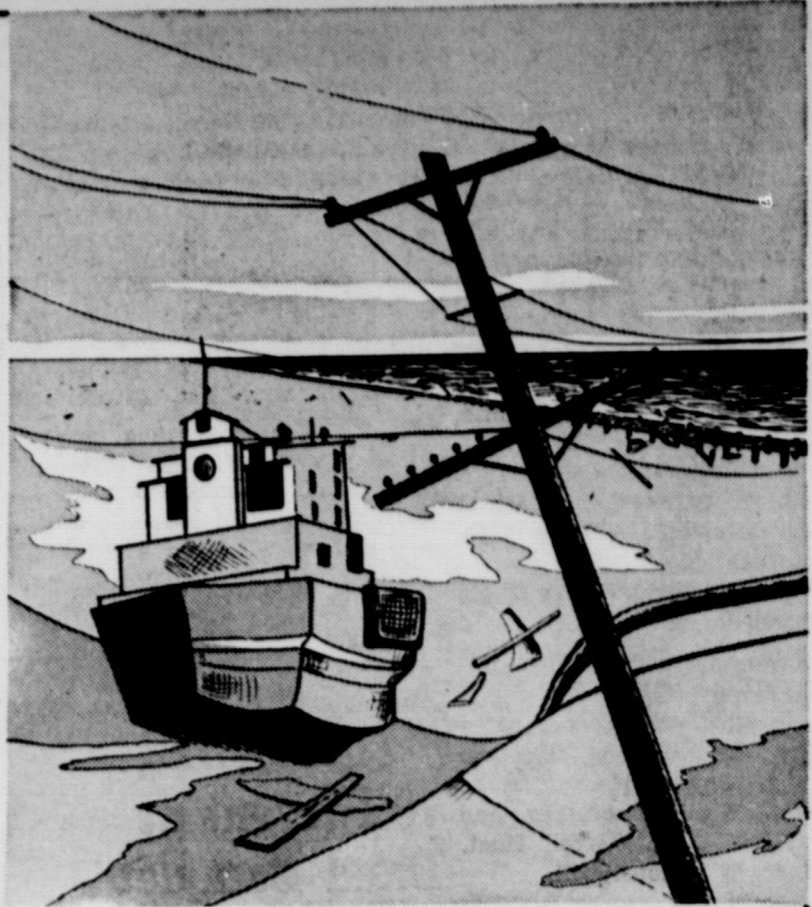

County Agents News Column

The past two weeks spent in Houston and San Angelo helping 4-H members with their show animals seemed like two months. It is good to be home again.

Some of our entries fared better than expected, others disappointed us. But this is normal in the show business. Among the calf entries at Houston, Jo Alice and Maxie Evans placed 6th with their Angus and shorthorn steers, respectively. James Bird Pentecost was awarded 10th place on his heavy hereford steers. Roy and Linda Blair came in 11th and 12th with their hereford and shorthorn steers. Robert Wink placed 4th with his heavy weight shorthorn steer.

One of the five lambs entered made the ribbon class. John and Kathy Service lamb placed 4th, in a big class of lambs. Bobby Blaylock and Benny Boykin, carrying the colors of the Robert Lee FFA chapter, each placed one lamb in the sale. a while, but the new show year has already started. Several club members have already started calves for the 1964 show year. We hope it will be a banner year for them.

The Coke County Sheep sub-committee is making plans to attend the Sonora Experiment Station Field Day to be held Saturday, March 23. We hope to have several attend the annual event. If you would like to go with the group, give us a ring. We will meet at the Courthouse (south side) at 7:30 a.m. Saturday morning and leave from there.

The Coke County 4-H Clubs have made arrangements with Dr. Turner to vaccinate for rabies in Robert Lee, Bronte and Tennyson on Friday, March 29. A vaccination day was held in Silver last Saturday. We will give more information, detailed plans next week. This is about two months earlier than last year, but inquiries have been numerous lately. We, because of demand, set the date earlier this year.

The latest report from the screwworm control authorities shows that during the week of March 3-9, 101,227,450 sterile flies were released. Also, ten cases of screwworms were confirmed that week, all from counties in the valley.

We reported earlier that time is of great essence as we go into the warm season. It has become so important that the authorities have asked that we call them collect when a worm case is found. Their instructions are as follows:

When a screwworm case is found, officials would like producers to do two things: (1) collect about 10 worms from the wound, place them in water or alcohol and hold them for further instructions and (2) report the infestation to eradication officials by calling collect to Justice 5-1646 (Mission). No telephone call should be made unless a sample is available.

The following information should be available at the time the call is made:

1. Name.
2. Address and telephone number where producer can be contacted.
3. Date when sample was collected.
4. Location of farm or ranch where case was found.
5. Location of wound on animal.

Producers are urged to call day or night, whenever the infestation is found. At night or on weekends, the information will be relayed to eradication officials, who will contact the producer for fur-

ther information and instruct him either to mail the sample or hold it to be picked up by a livestock inspector.

We have received word from Dr. Upchurch, veterinarian in charge of the Brucellosis control program, that Coke County will be due for recertification on January 12, 1964. This is not far away. Their records show that 39 cattle from 8 herds have been tested in the market cattle or Back-Tag Testing Program. Also, his letter stated that "the attached list of suspect and reactions herds should be retested. There are 16 suspect herds and 14 reactor herds in this county. In addition to the herds listed, at least twenty per cent of the cattle in each of 68 other representative herds should be tested. In herds of less than 50 animals, the entire herd will be tested.

We still have some copies of the 1963 "Farmers Income Tax Guide." If you would like a copy, give us a ring.

The late winter period is normally a period when livestock are weakest and most deficient in minerals. We are short on green grass, have been for awhile and may be for a while yet. And too, normal deficiencies can occur even though good grazing is abundant. With our situation the way it is, feeding a good mineral mix, or steamed bone meal or mineral salt or some combination of the three may be good insurance. If your animals are strong and in good condition, they will respond more rapidly if and when the grazing situation improves.

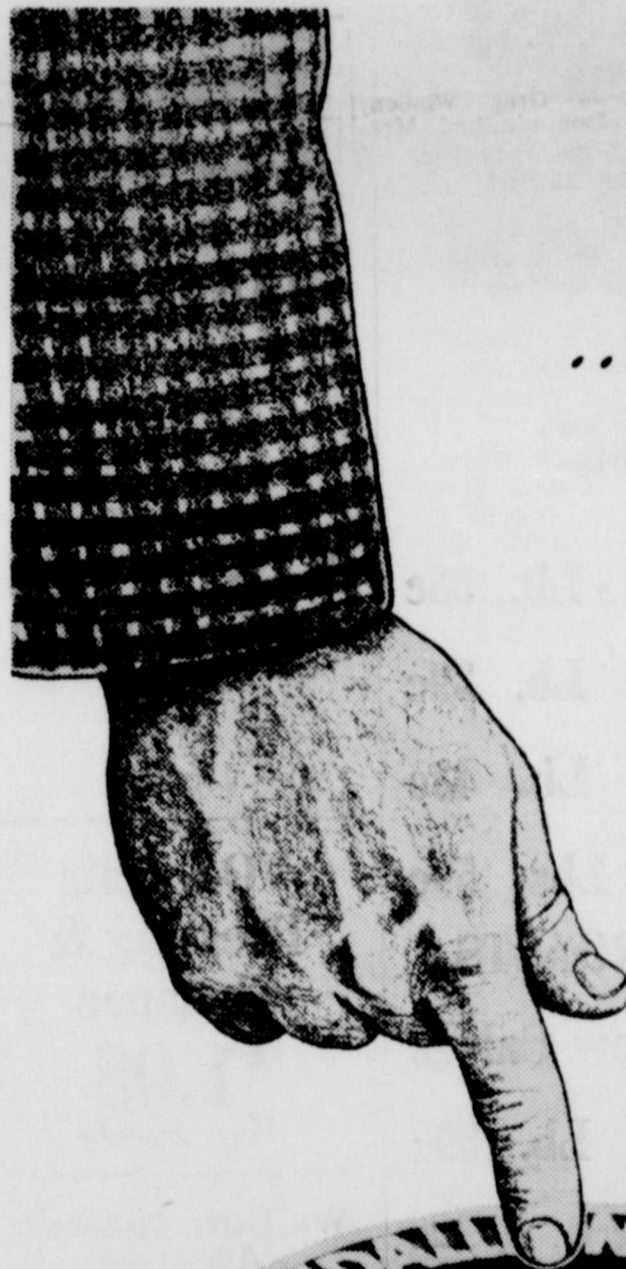

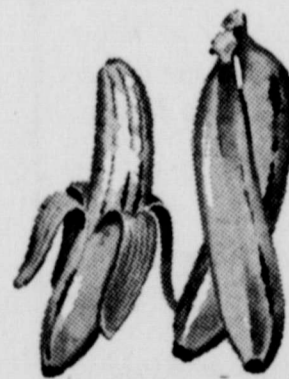
