Freezing is one of the simplest and fastest methods of preserving foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and ood values of most fruits, vegetables and meats better than any ther method of food preservation. who is trying to freeze food should now. These points of success ar 1. Good quality - careful selection of good food should be made.
2. Careful preparation - speed in preparation and careful hand ling to retain quality
3. Proper packaging - should be wrapped or packaged to keep it from drying out to preserve food value, flavor, color and texture. 4. Storage - foods should be stored at right temperature and should not be stored too long? To prevent discoloration of tain fruits use powdered or cry-
stalline ascorbic acid dissolved syrup just before pouring fruit. Use $1 / 2$ teaspoon per quart I have a free booklet which contains recipes and directions
