The farm organization favors, instead, legislation proposed in the Ellender bill, SB 1458. It proposes price support of 30 cents in 1964 with a decrease to 29 cents in 1965 in case production exceeds demand. It also calls for an increase in the national acreage allotment to 17,500,000 acres, and a 61/2 cent per pound export subsidy, making U. S. cotton more competitive in the world market.

"Sugar already on hand or committed to the United States for 1963 totals 500,000 tons more than last year's entire national consumption," reported Under Secretary of Agriculture Charles S. Murphy in comments made recently regarding the upswing in domestic sugar prices.

"These new commitments have been made within the past few days," he added, "and the speculative bubble in sugar is bound to burst in the face of this plentiful supply."

At the time, he warned that people who load up high priced sugar may sustain losses when the price goes down.

"Current Congressional hearing on the sugar situation," he said, "will show plentiful supplies and this will help restore stability in the sugar market."

He noted that a relatively tight situation in world sugar supplies early this year created uncertain-

gar, here are a few basic rules:

Conversion Table for Sugar For 1 cup of sugar in baking

To insure a quality product, about half the sugar should be retained in a recipe and honey substituted for the other half.

In baking, use 1/4 teaspoon soda for each cup of honey used; this is in addition to baking powder in recipes when honey is substituted for sugar.

Better results in baking are obtained to use recipes which were developed to use honey as the sweetening agent.

Molasses or Sorghum

One and one-half cup molasses or sorghum reduce liquid 1/4 cup for each cup molasses and sorghum used.

Corn Syrup

2 cups corn syrup reduce liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of corn syrup used.

Cane Syrup

One and one-half cups of cane syrup is equal in sweetness to one cup of cane sugar.

In cakes and cookies: Replace sugar with syrup, measure-formeasure and reduce liquid onethird. Cakes and cookies made with corn and cane syrups are not as sweet as when sugar is used.

Canning Fruits with Corn Syrup or Honey

Fruits will have a better flavor, texture and color when canned in syrup, but they keep as well without sugar as with it. The final product will be slightly different when using corn syrup. The liquid in the jars will be slightly stickier. Corn syrup is especially good for canning pineapples and peaches.

Syrups Made with Honey & Sugar Thin syrup use 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup honey to 21/2 cups wa-

ter. Medium syrup use 1 cup sugar and 1 cup honey to 4 cups
