D. K. Glenn House Damaged by Fire

The home of Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Glenn was damaged Tuesday afternoon when a fire broke out in the kitchen. Quick action by Bronte firemen quickly brought the blaze under control and limited the fire damage to the kitchen and to braces and sub-flooring under the second story of the structure.

The fire was discovered by the Glens' son, Gene, and Paula Jane Landers who lives next door. The children quickly notified painters who were working on the Landers house and they turned in the fire alarm. Mr. and Mrs. Glenn had left the house only a few minutes before to drive out to their farm.

Mrs. Glenn said Wednesday morning that they were not sure whether the fire started from a motor in the ventilator over the kitchen range or whether she inadvertently left one of the burners on and it caught fire to some grease.

The range is a model built into the kitchen cabinet, and damage was extensive over it. The 2 x 12 braces and subflooring between the floors of the two-story house were badly charred above the range. Smoke damage was also quite extensive on the second floor and to a lesser extent over the entire house. Mrs. Glenn said they had no idea as to the amount of the damage, as carpenters and insurance adjustors had not inspected the damage.

"We are very grateful to the Bronte firemen for the way they handled this," she said. The Glens noted that the firemen used chemicals to control the blaze and thus eliminated water damage to the house and its furnishings. "We want to hand them a big bunch of bouquets for the fine service they performed for us," Glenn said.

The mayor said that anyone who plans to tie on the sewer in the near future should contact the city secretary as soon as possible. "This deal we have at \$1.15 per foot won't last except as long as Mr. Tammen has work lined up here, so it will be to the benefit of everyone who intends to tie on to do it now," Kiker said.

County Agents News Column

The Coke County 4-H Club Soil Judging Team made a respectable showing in the State Contest last week, placing fourth. We had hoped, naturally, for higher honors, but are pleased with the results of the members' work.

C. L. Sparks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Sparks, was third high individual in the State Contest. There were 22 teams and 84 different individuals in the State Contest. The boys enjoyed the trip and vowed to "get in" next time.

Apricot Disease

Several people have brought in apricots recently that are diseased. The fruit is ruining, having dried, shrunken, blackened places on them. Also, I believe in every case, the trunk and/or limbs of the trees contained one or more breaks in the bark from which a gummy exudate secreted. I had three different samples checked by the Extension Service pathologist. He says the disease is bacterial spot.

Bacterial spot is not easily controlled as is the case with most fruit diseases. However, it is not a major problem every year. Wet periods or overwatering, sprinkling the tree particularly, seems to be favorable for its development.

Two different treatments have been used to control the disease. One is a spray program designed to protect the fruit as it develops. The other is designed to kill the bacteria when the tree first goes dormant. Because of space, we will not try to write them. If you

would like copies of a bulletin that contains the control measures, give us a ring.

The breaks in the bark can be cut out and the damaged area treated with a wound dressing. Any tools that are used should be disinfected following their use.

Must Re-Test Brucellosis

As you know, Coke County is up for brucellosis recertification. We must requalify before Jan. 12, 1964, to retain our modified brucellosis free rating.

Bill Gruben, doing brucellosis work in this area and stationed in Ballinger, was by the office a few days ago. He, or one of the veterinarians in the area can retest herds at no cost to the operator and at the operator's convenience. If you are planning to have your cattle up anytime in the near future and would want to retest for brucellosis, let me know. We will see if we can schedule one of them for you.

Coke County had its fourth reported screwworm case last week. M. C. Hendry had a case in a sheep on his place southwest of Silver.

The number of cases in the State jumped last week to 157 cases. This is a big increase percentage-wise, but is only 7.1 per cent of what we had at the same time last year.

The sterile fly plant released over 122 million sterile flies during the week.

Plans have been developed to increase the size of the plant. It is designed to produce 75 million per week and they plan to increase to a capacity of 130 million per week. If the present production figures are indicative of the future potential, the plant should be able to produce well above 130 million per week.

You might not have thought it—I did not—but the Mission, Tex., plant contains the largest source of radioactive cobalt kept by the USDA for use in sterilizing the male screwworm fly.

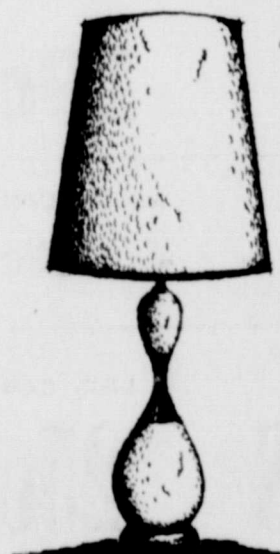
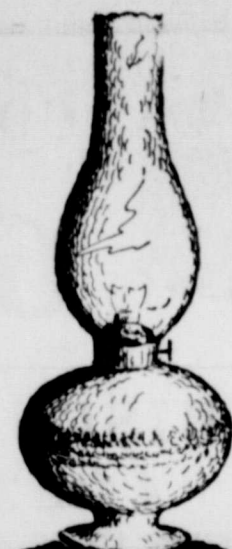

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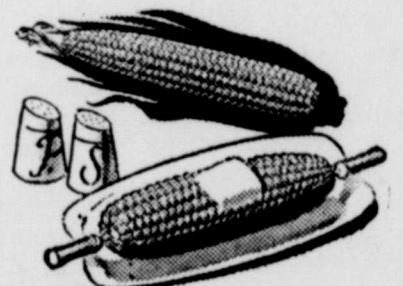
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
