good for new, renewal or extension subscriptions. The rate in Coke and adjoining counties regularly is \$3.00, and is reduced to \$2.50. Subscriptions elsewhere are reduced to \$3.00 from the regular price of \$3.50.

Word was received this week that readers will no longer have to pay state sales tax on subscriptions. A re-interpretation of the law ruled a subscription sale to be 52 separate sales in the case of a weekly newspaper, and therefore, is not subject to the tax because each copy does not cost as much as 25 cents, the minimum transaction for collecting the tax.

Funeral services for William H. McKown, long time area stock farmer, were held Monday at 4 p.m. in Norton Methodist Church. Burial followed in Wingate Cemetery, under direction of Newby-Davis Funeral Home of Ballinger. Mr. McKown was 81 years of age, and had been ill for several months. He died in Ballinger Memorial Hospital.

Mr. McKown was born June 20, 1882, in Milam County. He came to Rannels County in 1889, with the family settling in Oak Creek community. He was married at Norton in June 1907 to Miss Viola Drake. A large crowd of holiday observers are expected at Oak Creek Lake and at the county park in Bronte. Facilities in both places will be ready for use of visitors.

Some business firms will remain open to serve pleasure seekers on the holiday. Included in the business firms which will remain open are Henry's Food Store, Lammers Station and Grocery and Spencer's Station and Grocery, all service stations in town and City and Pat's Cafes. 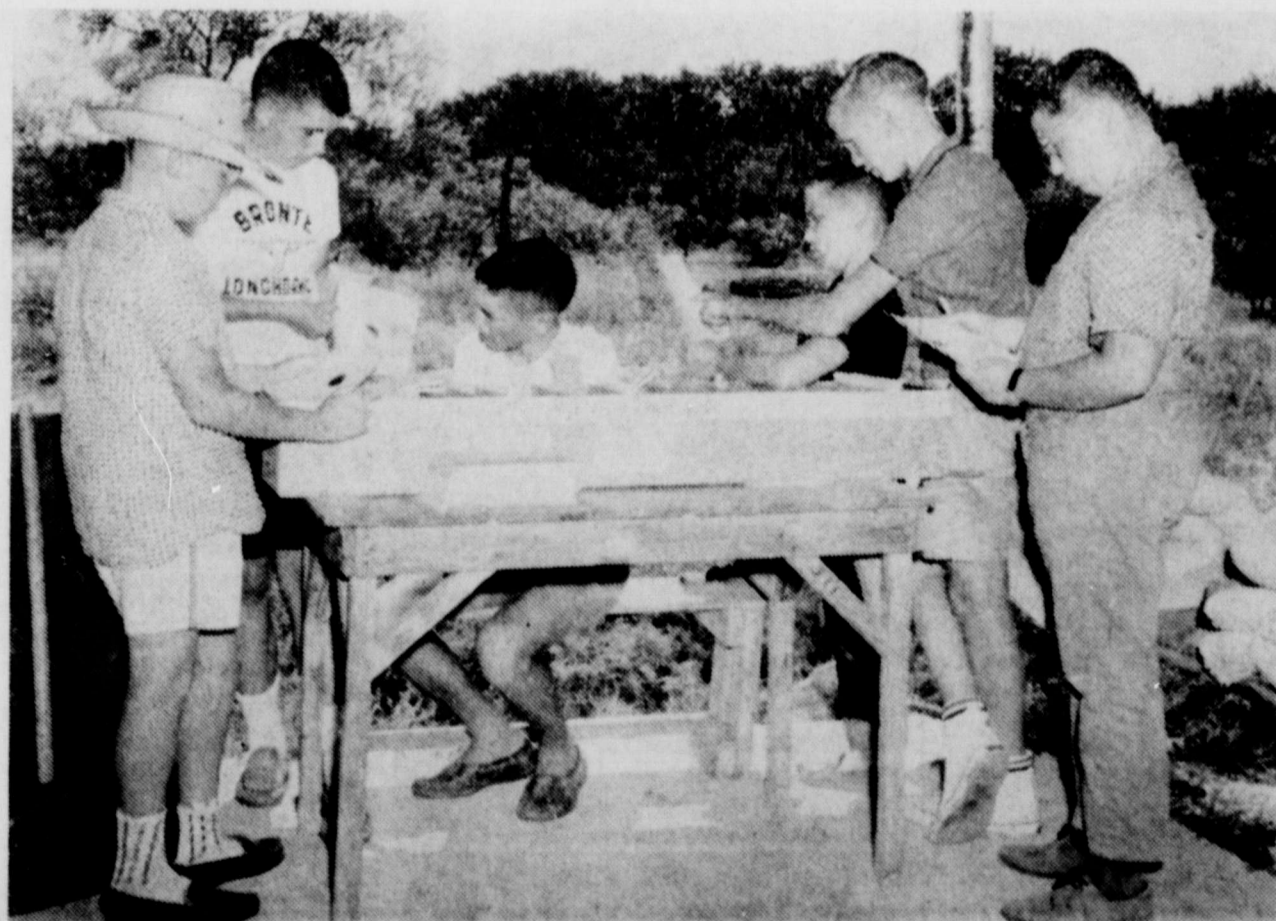
A membership costs \$2.50 per month and other members of the family may join for \$1.50. Clint Low is president of the association.

Aubrey Denman, park caretaker, asked that all children who are interested in taking the course contact him personally or by phone and sign up in advance for the lessons.

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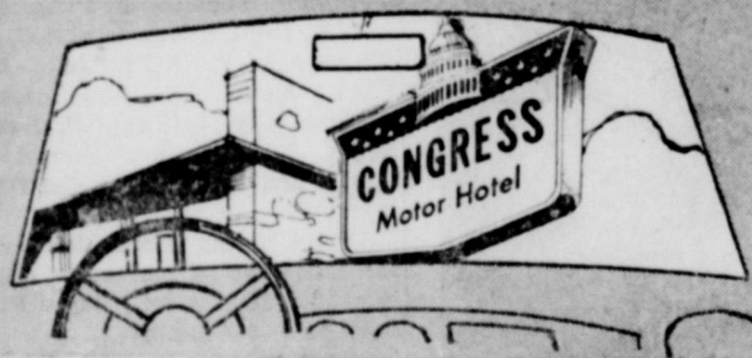

### H D Agent's News Dept.

Representatives of the Home Demonstration Clubs met Friday afternoon in my office to begin plans for the 1964 yearbook. The Committee considered suggestions made by club members and the recommendations made by the Coke County Committee for Progress as the year's programs were planned. Mrs. C. E. Wasps are a common problem this time of year. They build their nests in and around homes—beneath eaves, on porches, behind shutters, in trees and shrubbery. And sooner or later someone gets stung.

Entomologists of the U. S. De-

partment of Agriculture say it's difficult to discourage these insects once they've decided to set up housekeeping. But it can be done with the persistent application of the proper insecticide. Just follow the directions on the label.

Chlordane, dieldrin, and DDT are effective for this purpose. So are most aerosol bombs recommended for ant and roach control.

Go after the wasps at night when they are less active and most of them are in their nests. Apply the insecticide directly to the nests.

Or it may be possible to dislodge hornets' and yellowjackets' nests and dispose of them in a sack. But before you go poking around, plug the opening of the nest with absorbent cotton that has been soaked in chloroform or carbon tetrachloride. The fumes will stun the insects and you can work with less danger of being stung.

Remove the nest quickly. Burn or bury it. Or put it into a can containing a few tablespoons of chloroform or carbon tetrachloride and seal the can tightly.

You probably won't be able to get all of the wasps the first time. Any that escape will immediately begin to rebuild their nest near the original site. Often, other wasps will replace the original colony.

Removing the nests, spraying, or dusting will eventually discourage all comers, the entomologists say.
