Neely to Corpus; New Pastor Now Serving at Rankin

Announcement was made this week that the Rev. Auburn S. Neely, Bronte Methodist pastor, has been re-assigned and accepted the pastorate of Wesley Methodist Church in Corpus Christi.

At the same time it was announced by the district superintendent, the Rev. Lawrence K. Brown of San Angelo, that Mr. Neely will be replaced by the Rev. Austin Masterson, now serving the Methodist Church at Rankin. The change will become effective Aug. 1.

Mr. Neely started his third year at the local church about two months ago after being reassigned here following annual conference. He said "Both Mrs. Neely and I have enjoyed the time we have spent in Bronte and we leave regretfully."

Complete information on Mr. Masterson was not available for this week's Enterprise, but it was learned that he is married and has three sons, all of whom will be students in Bronte schools. He is a graduate of Perkins School of Theology, a part of Southern Methodist University at Dallas.

Farm Safety Week Proclaimed

Farm Safety Week, a nationwide observance proclaimed by both President Kennedy and Governor Connally, is officially proclaimed in Coke County by W. W. Thetford, County Judge Thursday of last week.

Calling attention to the fact that farm accidents result in over 150 deaths and thousands of disabling injuries in Texas each year, the county judge said, "Throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Coke County Farm Bureau."

Coke County Farm Bureau President Ben Boykin said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday—reverence for life; Monday—safety begins at home; Tuesday—agricultural chemicals; Wednesday—prevent falls; Thursday—rural highway safety; Friday—farm machinery; Saturday—recreation safety.

Increased emphasis is being placed on fire prevention and protection by Farm Bureaus across the state. Farm Bureaus are sponsoring members of local fire departments as students attending the annual Firemen's Training School at Texas A & M to be held

during FARM SAFETY WEEK, July 21-26.

Pete Davis is the Robert Lee Fireman selected as a candidate for this school, and if he is one of the 110 selected from over the state, the Farm Bureau will pay \$45 of the \$50 registration fee, also lodging and meals.

If not one of the group this year, he is eligible for next year's selection.

Sales tax does not now have to be paid on subscriptions to The Enterprise, as the sale is considered as 52 separate transactions, each of which is less than the 25 cents minimum necessary to collect the sales tax. Funeral Services Held Sunday for Frank Eaton, 63

Graveside services were conducted at Fairview Cemetery here Sunday at 4:30 p.m. for Frank Randall Eaton, 63, by Foy L. Moore, Bronte Church of Christ minister.

Mr. Eaton died at 7:30 a.m. July 12, in a Galveston hospital, after a long illness. He had been hospitalized in Bronte Hospital for several weeks before being taken to Galveston.

Mr. Eaton was born in Bronte Aug. 12, 1899, and was the son of the late Frank R. and Harriet O'Field Eaton. He attended Bronte Schools and lived many years in California before returning to Bronte a few years ago. He was employed in California as a stationary engineer, taking care of machinery and equipment used in the operation of large hotels on the West Coast. Since he returned to Bronte he was employed mostly as a plumber and carpenter.

Survivors include a brother, Jack Eaton of San Angelo; two sisters, Mrs. Mae Pendergrast of Abilene and Mrs. Odessa E. Kightlinger of Denver, Colo., and a number of nephews and nieces.

Eye specialists say that you should not look directly at the sun even through smoked glass, colored glasses or photographic negatives. They say that infrared rays can cause irreparable eye damage and that only indirect viewing should be done.

A 520-mile chase across Canada's Northwest Territories in a Delta jet aircraft will record as much as possible of the eclipse from a vantage point which will do away with much of the haze of the earth's atmosphere. Scientists say they can keep the plane within the total eclipse area for 144 seconds.

I have received calls in regard to pickles, relishes, jams, preserves and jellies the past week. I am very happy to have people call for recipes and directions and am so happy that there is food to be preserved. If any of you need a pamphlet for freezing, canning, making pickles and relishes, and jellies, jams, preserves, butters and marmalades, let me hear from you. Good directions and recipes can assure you of good things to eat next winter!

Try kabobs on your next cook-out.

Some of the best times a family can have together are at picnics and backyard cookouts—and some of the best eating is kabobs.

Although in the Near East a shish-kabob must be made of lamb, in the United States anything goes. Kabob combinations are as limitless as your imagination.

Right now, beef, chicken and

summer vegetables appear on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's list of plentiful. So you'll want to use these for sure. But don't stop there. Try pork, fish and the traditional lamb on a stick.

Select foods that require approximately the same cooking time. Alternate meats and vegetables on the skewer, keeping each piece away from the next so the heat can reach all sides.

For extra flavor, marinate the meat for a few hours or overnight in a seasoned vinegar sauce. Spoon the sauce over the meat as it cooks. Broiling will take 10 to 16 minutes, depending on how well done you want the meat.

Here are some kabob combinations you might want to try —

Beef cubes, mushrooms and sliced onions.

Franks cut into 1-inch pieces, pineapple chunks and sliced bacon.

Chicken livers, slices of bacon and mushrooms.

Beef cubes with quartered tomatoes, carrots and small cooked onions.

Cubes of bologna, sliced onion and sliced bacon.

Ham with sweet potato and pineapple chunks.

To serve, push the cooked kabob from the skewer onto a toasted bun, a chunk of split French bread, or directly onto plate.

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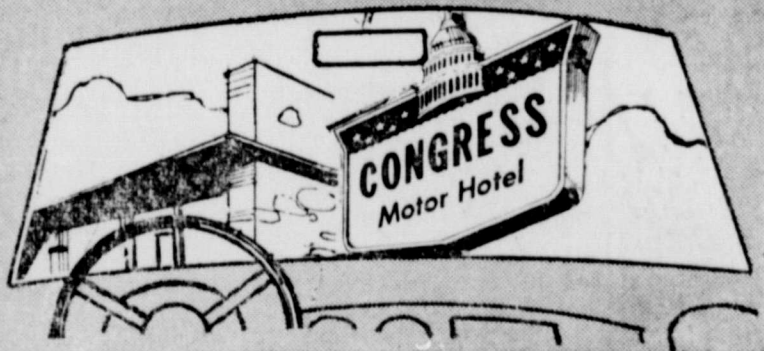

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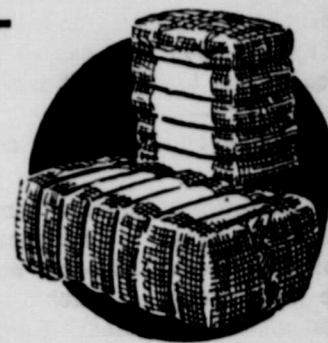

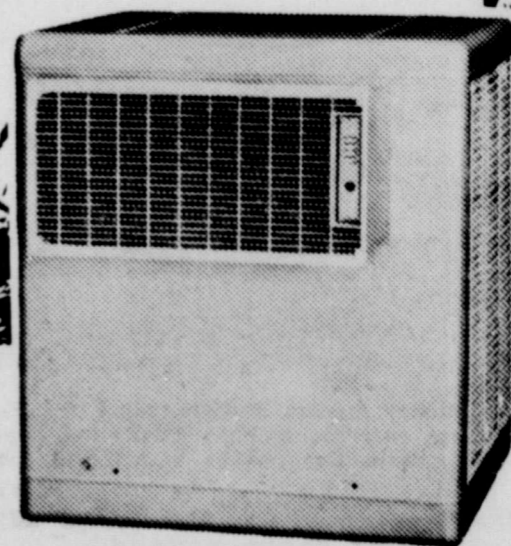
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County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

I saw a heading recently that read as follows: "Farming — High-hazard Industry." That caption may seem unwarranted, but the accident figures among agricultural enterprises are high.

For many years farming has ranked as the third most hazardous occupation. Only mining and construction have higher death rates.

National Farm Safety Week, July 21-27, is an opportune time for us to begin changes, take action that can make agriculture less hazardous. Finding and removing known hazards would be a good place for us to start.

We received a release recently from the U. S. Treasury Department that they have asked us to circulate regarding the sale of farm or ranch land.

The sale of farm is taxable, says William C. Bryan, Administrative officer at the San Angelo office of Internal Revenue. Mr. Bryan points out that farmers must pay tax on any gain on the sale of their farm or other capital items, even though they may turn around and use the money to buy another farm or similar item.

In a letter to County Agricultural agents, the District Director of Internal Revenue in Dallas asked the County agent to help IRS correct the erroneous thinking. The tax man advised farmers to check the tax consequences before they sell, trade, or swap.

The farmers tax guide published each year by the Internal Revenue Service includes information on this subject.

Brucellosis testing for recertification of Coke County is progressing smoothly. We should reach our herd quota in the near future. However, we still lack a number of the suspect and reactor herds.

The quota required for Coke County to recertify as tuberculosis free has already been met. Operators from all areas of the county have responded quickly to answer our needs. Bill Grueben, tester for this area, has remarked several times that he wished every county would comply as readily as the operators have in Coke County. The County animal health committee is just as pleased as Mr. Grueben that the program has progressed so well. We congratulate those of you that have had a part in the program and the work that has been done.

The number of screwworm cases dropped last week, but we still had two cases confirmed in the central and southeastern areas of the county.

Mrs. M. A. Runnion had a case on her place in the Wildcat community and J. P. Arrott had one case east of Tennyson.

Only two cases were reported in the entire 70 county drop zone or buffer zone during the last seven day reporting period.

County-wide spray programs are being pushed in a few counties to help hold down the flies. Also, operators are being encouraged to avoid operations that will cause open wounds — marking, dehorning, etc. if possible at this time of the year. These and other measures that will prevent the screwworm from completing a cycle are encouraged by the foundation directors.

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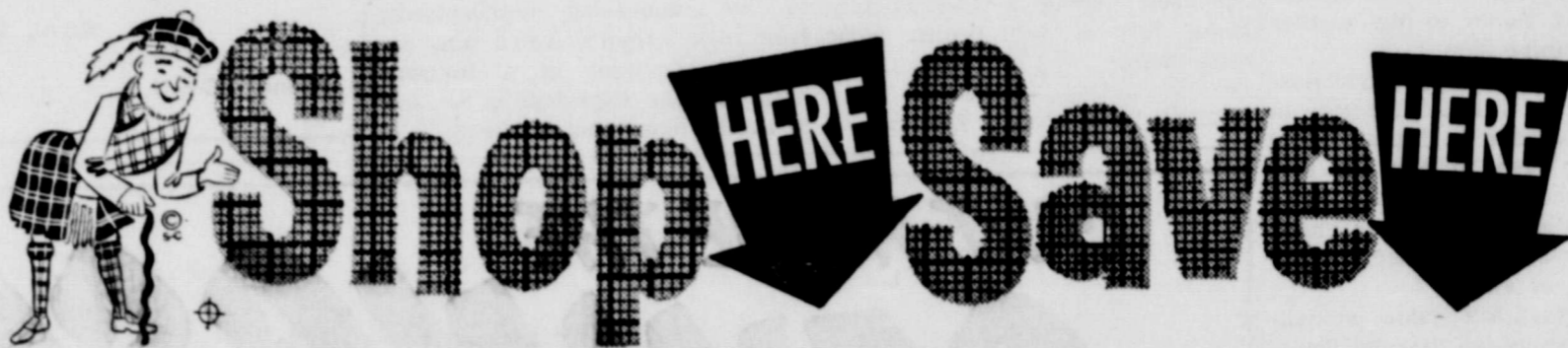
