

Spartanburg, S. C. (AHTNC) -Army PFC Clifford D. Hageman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford E. Hageman of Bronte, is participating in Exercise SWIFT STRIKE III, a U. S. Strike Command exercise in Georgia and North and South Carolina, involving more than 75,000 armed forces personnel.

SWIFT STRIKE III pits two task forces against each other in a four-week mock war ending Aug. 16, and includes airborne maneuvers, long-distance airlifts. air-ground support missons and counterguerrilla operations.

Hageman, a mechanic in the 670th Transportation Company at Fort Hood, Tex., entered the Army in October 1961 and completed basic training at Fort Carson, Colo.



We anticipate the authorities conducting a drive to push the screwworm as far south as possible this winter. 





al subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the pay-ment of the principal of and interest ment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of bene-fits for said Fund shall not be elig-ible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, con-tributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Consti-tational Amendment shall be sub-mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have print-ed thereon the following words:

# Washington Newsletter

The people who live in our 21st District are solidly opposed to civil rights legislation proposed by the Kennedy brothers.

According to the tabulation of results of our questionnaire, just completed, 85 per cent of our people are against the civil rights proposals, while only 6 per cent favor them.

This tabulation reflects, accurately, a cross section of public opinion in our area. The response to the questionnaires was tremendous.

President Kennedy's record on foreign affairs is rated 16.9 per cent "good," 71.3 per cent "poor.' In domestic affairs, eight out of every 10 people in the 21st District rate the President's record as "poor" while only 10 per cent give Kennedy a "good" rating. with 9.6 per cent having no opinion

Nearly 80 per cent of our people want a balanced budget before there is a tax cut; 91 per cent call for a reduction in foreign aid; and 74 per cent are opposed to Kennedy's medicare proposal.

On the Cuban issue, eight out of every 10 approve my proposal that ships which trade in Cuban ports be thereafter barred from entering U. S. ports.



## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a require-ment for voting and so as to author-ize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disquali-fications who shall have attained the

age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or com-panent branches thereof, or in the ponent branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, y vote only in the county in which or she resided at the time of enhe or she resided at the time of en-tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces: and provided further, that before offering to vote at an elec-tion a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legis-lature may authorize absentee vot-ing. This Amendment shall take ef-fect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret bal-lot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the reg-istration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipa-tory character." Section 2. The foregoing Consti-tutional Amendment shall be sub-mitted to a vote of the qualified elec-tors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment of the Con-

Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940. Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955, and who upon the date of filing his or her applica-tion to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or draft-ing was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas. The foregoing not-withstanding, any lands in the Vet-erans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms. and at such purchases, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of in-terest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may here-after be provided by law. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Con-stitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dol-lars (3550,000,000.00); providing for the issuance of said bonds or oblig-ations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an Land Fund: and providing for an election and the issuance of a pro-clamation therefor.

election and the issuance of a pro-clamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b. Art-icle III of the Constitution of Texas. be amended so the same will here-after read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a govern-mental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Vet-erans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified fn all of the prior Consti-tutional Amendments except as modi-fied herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in fi-nances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advise and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the ad-ministrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

School Funds. "Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limit-ed to the proceeds from the issu-ance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or re-sale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys at-tributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or re-sale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys at-tributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to com-ply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from invest-ments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund in therest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes. <text><text><text><text><text>




