Whatever is done under the guise of philanthropy or social morality which in any way lessens initiative is the greatest crime that can be committed against the toilers.

"Let so-called busybedies and professional 'public morals experts,' in their fads, reflect upon the perils they rashly invite under the pretense of social welfare."

It may surprise you to learn that those words, quoted above, were spoken by the late Samuel Gompers, generally regarded as having been the father of the organized labor movement in this country.

We do not know of a more statesmanlike Labor Day message.






