## Gulf Service Sta. Changing Hands

One of the oldest business firms in Bronte will change hands effective Nov. 1, when Bill Wrinkle and Charles Sims turn over operation of their Gulf Service Station to Elroy Butler, formerly of Sterling City.

Wrinkle started operating a Gulf Service Station here 29 years ago. Sims worked for him until early in World War II, when he was away from Bronte for several years serving in the U. S. Navy. The two men formed a partnership in 1946 and have continued to operate the business since that time.

The station was formerly at the intersection of Main Street and Highway 277, where Ditmore's station is now located. In 1959 the present building was constructed and the business moved.

Mr. and Mrs. Wrinkle have their home in Bronte, located west of the station. They have two children, Bob Wrinkle, who lives here, and Mrs. David Gulley of Eunice, N. M. Bob plans to continue working at the station for Butler.

Wrinkle said he was going to rest awhile before he makes any plans for the future. He has some farm land near Bronte which will occupy part of his time. Sims also has farm and ranch land which he will operate.

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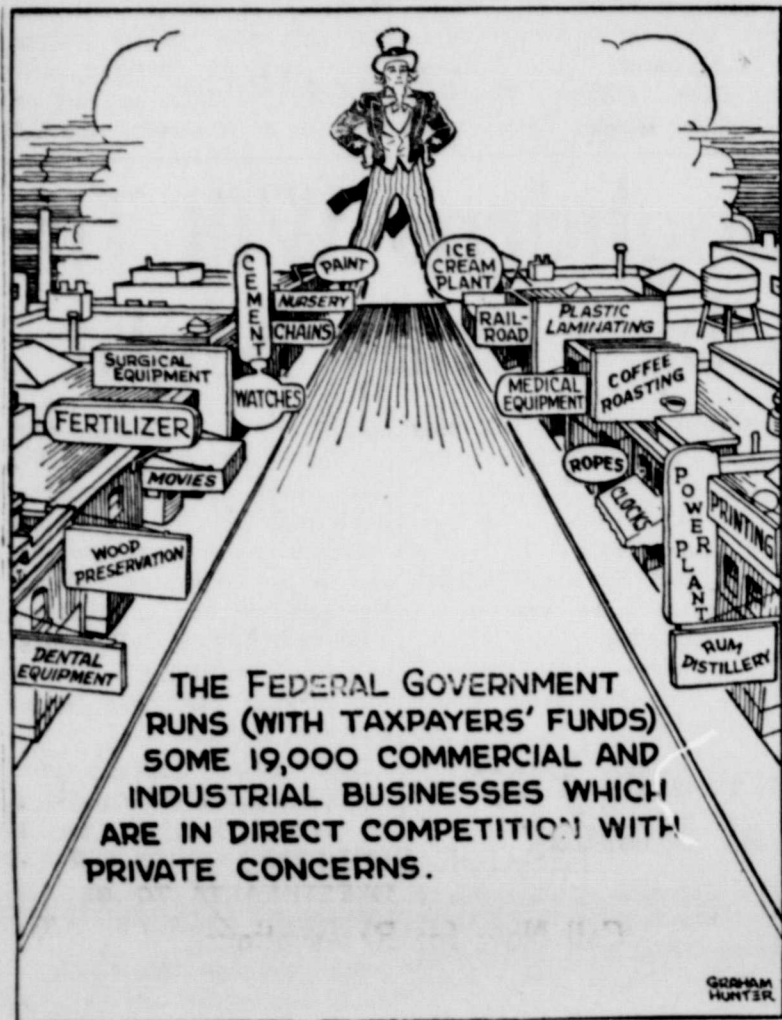
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**Too Many Sidelines**

Did you know that Uncle Sam has a lot of sidelines?

Well, he has. He runs coffee-roasting plants, rum distilleries, printing and power plants. He manufactures scores of different products including surgical, medical and dental equipment, rope, chain, watches, clocks, paints and fertilizers.

There's more. Uncle Sam is also in the plastic-laminating business and in cement, railroad and wood-preservation enterprises. He even operates movie theaters and ice cream plants.

All in all, according to Senator J. Glenn Beall (R-Md.), Uncle Sam as the front for the federal government, runs some 19,000 commercial and industrial businesses WHICH ARE IN DIRECT COMPETITION WITH PRIVATE CONCERNS.

The unfairness of this deplorable situation is further compounded, Sen. Beall points out, by the fact that businessmen and industrialists, who operate the same kinds of establishments as the government, must pay taxes to their competitor and that these taxes are poured back into the government-operated businesses which are damaging to the interests of the privately operated enterprises.

Not only is this situation unfair, it is unsound business, and in direct opposition to the free enterprise system which has made us the most productive country in the world, and which, incidentally foots the bill for the operation of all the government's worthwhile programs as well as unnecessary ones like this. It seems to us to be just another case of the stupid farmer who killed his goose which laid golden eggs.

Uncle Sam has no business in business and the Congress should make it its business to see that he retires—without social security.

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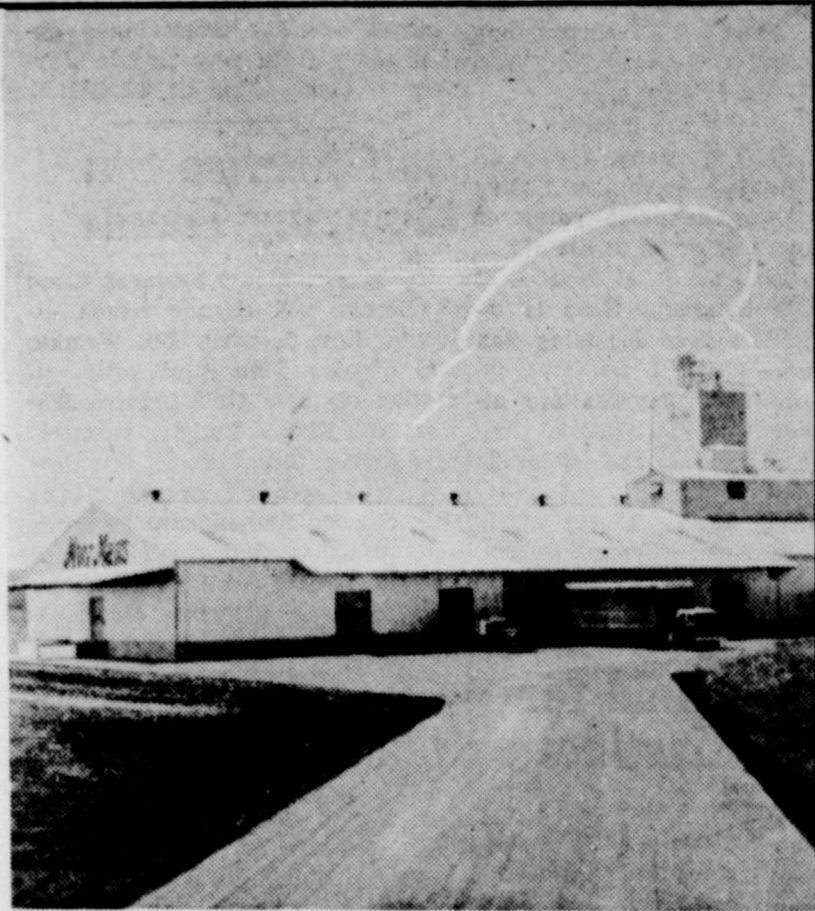

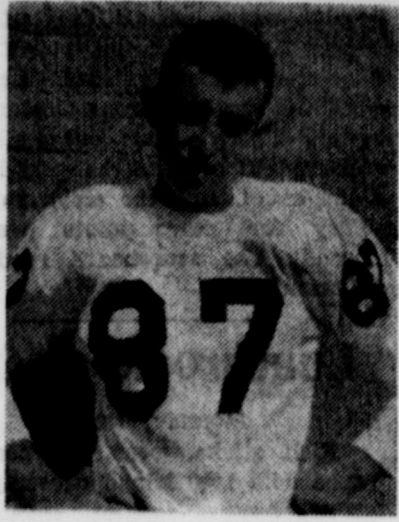

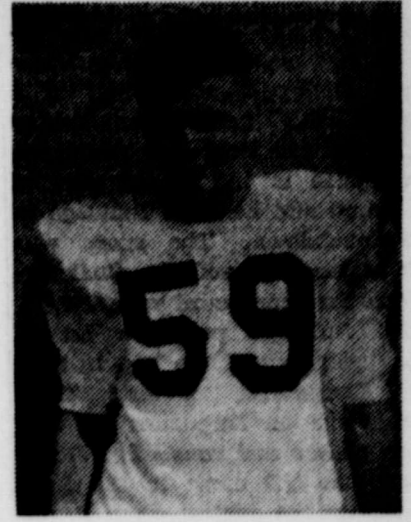

# Loraine Defeats Longhorns, 30-6

The Loraine Bulldogs ran unmercifully over the Bronte Longhorns during the first half of a District 8-B game last Friday night, but the local lads recovered some push in the second part of the game and held the Bulldogs to one touchdown. The score was 22-0 at the half and the final figure on the scoreboard was 30-6.

The Bulldogs pulled a lot of good tricks out of the bag to beat the Longhorns, making their touchdowns on long runs as well as on passes and runs. The Longhorns lone TD came in the final seconds of the contest when Royce Lee ran around his left end to cross the double stripe.

#### First Half

Larry Bates kicked off for the Bulldogs, with the ball going to Lee. The Longhorns had to punt after trying to make a 1st. Joe Garcia took the punt and was stopped on the 40. On the first play from scrimmage, there was a Bulldog fumble and Charles Coppock recovered for Bronte on the Loraine 35.

Glenn Sims, Manuel Reyes and Lee carried the ball three times for a 1st down on the 2, but on the next series, the Longhorns bogged down and the ball went over.

After a couple of gains by the

host team, Larry Rankin slipped through the Longhorn line, carried the ball 59 yards and made 6 points for his team. A pass play gave 2 more, and the score was a jolting 8-0, with most of the game yet to come.

After taking the kickoff, the Longhorns ran three plays and then punted. Loraine started a march down field which netted them one 1st down. On the second series, the Longhorns held and took over the ball on their own 25. Jimmy Wells made a nice run up to the 46 for a Longhorn 1st down. The local lads ran two more plays netting them 5 yards before the 1st quarter ended. The ball rested at midfield.

Reyes started the 2nd period with a gain of 5 for a 1st down. Two carries by Wells netted 9 yards; but Lee was held on a keeper, trying to make the 1st. The ball went to the host team. Garcia and Rankin each carried the ball for a 1st on their 45. The Bulldogs were off again under the superb quarterbacking of Stanley Moore, with Rankin and Garcia each picking up a 1st. Moore then ran 23 yards to the Bronte 5. From there he handed off to Garcia who went over. The SP try failed. Score: 14-0.

Reyes took the kickoff and was

stopped on his 30 yard line. Bronte had to punt after three tries, then Loraine had to punt back, and once again the Longhorns were forced to kick before any large gains were made by either side.

The Bulldogs took over on their 35, and on the first play of the series, Moore tossed a pass to Garcia and he streaked up the sideline for 65 yards and another TD. The extra points try was good and the score stood at 22-0. Loraine had time to kickoff and the Longhorns ran one play before the half.

#### Second Half

Jim Morrow had his first and only opportunity of the evening to kick off. His kick sent the ball to Moore who was stopped by Wells on the 33. The Bulldogs started another march up the field which was to end their scoring for the night. Gains both on the ground and in the air, along with a 15 yard penalty against the Longhorns moved the ball to the Bronte 10, from which Garcia carried over the goal line. Moore threw a pass to Bates for the extra points and the score was 30-0.

Bates kicked to the 34 where the Longhorns took possession. The ball was exchanged six times before the end of the third period. When the teams exchanged

ends of the field, Wells had just made a 1st down on the 46. It looked as though the Longhorns had come alive when Lee started throwing passes to Wells and Reyes. Two nice aeriels were completed and then Reyes got loose and ran the ball down to the 7 yard line. The Bulldogs tightened and the Longhorns were held. The ball went over on the Loraine 6 yard line.

The mighty Pups from Loraine began a march down field and carried the ball down to the Longhorn 31. A Loraine fumble was recovered by Bob Strickland on the 30 and gave the locals a new lease on life.

Once again Lee limbered up his passing arm and tossed a 17 yarder to Wells for a 1st down. Working from his 47 Lee threw another one to Ron Johns which covered 15 yards and gave the Longhorns another 1st on the Bulldog 38. Another Lee to Wells toss covered 27 yards and put the ball on the 11. Lee failed to find a receiver on the next two tries and lost yardage. On the 3rd toss Garcia was snagged the ball away from the Longhorns and ran to the Bronte 44 before he was pulled down.

Again a Bulldog fumble set the Longhorns up in business. Kenny Mayben covered the ball on his own 48. Lee then ran for a 9

yard gainer. Wells caught a long pass which moved the ball deep into Loraine territory. With five seconds left on the clock, Lee called for the ball from Center Kenneth Wilkins, ran over his pursuers and crossed the goal line at the exact time the clock ran out. Try for extra points was no good. The scoreboard read 30-6, Loraine.

Editor's Note: — We received a letter this week from Miss Lottie Anne Ivey, former well known resident of Bronte. We reprint her letter, in part, describing life in the Golden Age Home at Lockhart, where she has gone to make her home.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Oglesby, Have wanted for some time to tell you about our Golden Age Home. I have been here about 2½ months and I do like it here very much.

I am the youngest of about 75 people here. I think the oldest is about 96 years old and is as spry as she can be.

My room mate Anna Howlowitz will be 87 her next birthday. She is a native born Austrian but has been in the U.S.A. so long she does not remember about it. She gets around like a teenager. Her name is Anna and my is Ann and neither of us has been married.

We have good food and plenty of it. Mrs. Pfefferkorn, wife of our superintendent, is in charge of the kitchen and dining room.

Some of the local ministers come every Sunday at 8:15 a.m. to preach to us. As I am still on my crutches I seldom ever go into town for I would have to stay through Sunday School and church and I get too tired. We have mid-week prayer services at 3:30 p.m., usually conducted by one of us. I had it three weeks ago. On Thursday at 10 a.m. the Episcopal minister comes for open communion. So you see we are not neglected.

We have several couples, men and their wives, here. One couple, a Mr. and Mrs. Holman from California, donated our lovely piano.

Our building is air conditioned all the way and is brick inside and out, very pretty. Our grounds or yard is very pretty. We have so many pretty flowers and shrubs. One of our 84 year old ladies does much of the work with a long bladed butcher knife. I do not know what all of the posies are, but I do know they are pretty and we are at liberty if we want them to cut us a bouquet.

We can go into the lounge and watch T.V. when we like. We

have two doctors and can pick our choice, also two registered nurses on duty.

This place is so much like a real home, I am very happy to be here. We have washing machines and dryers when we want to do our laundry.

People from the church in town come after any of us who want to go to W.S.C.S. or guild and are nice and good to all of us.

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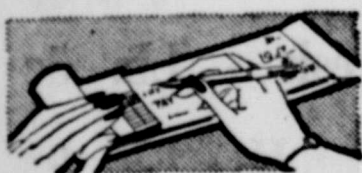

**County Agents News Column**

By **STERLING LINDSEY**

The fall screwworm buildup has passed its peak, we hope, but this does not mean we will have no more cases this year. The latest report received stated that one case was found in Tom Green County. The week before, one case was reported from Coleman County.

The major portion of the fall buildup, however, has been south of a line from Eagle Pass to Uvalde to San Antonio, back south to the coast.

The latest report shows 377 cases confirmed in the state in the seven day reporting period. The previous week had 511 cases reported. New Mexico also had fewer cases than in the previous week.

We still need a few herds tested before we can requalify as a modified brucellosis free area or county. These we hope can be tested at the convenience of the operator during the remaining months of this year. Our certification period ends on Jan. 12.

The Coke County Stock Show directors will meet Thursday night in the conference room of the courthouse. The show date was set for Jan. 13 at an earlier meeting. Indications are that the show will be a big one as a large number of animals are being fed by 4-H and FFA members.

Rats and mice could be troublesome this winter. Cover is short, their food supplies also are short so we can expect them to move to places affording protection and food as cool weather sets in. There are several ways in which rats and mice can be combated. Removing trash piles, cleaning up around barns, then plugging, where possible, their places of entry will certainly help the situation. Also, a number of commercial products are on the market now that will control rats and mice when administered as directed.

These two rodents destroy millions of feed annually. With our feed situation as it is, we need to take precautions to prevent any further losses.

By 1975 farmers and farms will be fewer but they will be called on to produce more food for more people. This will mean that the farmer, who is now producing enough food for 26 people, will have to increase production about 50 percent to produce food for 42 people by that year.
