## Murphys Have Narrow Escape

The G. W. Murphy family had a narrow escape last week when three of the four members of the family living at home were overcome by carbon monoxide poisoning, caused by a faulty heater.

A daughter, Frances, was ill last Wednesday and stayed home from school. About 1 p.m. she became dizzy and became unconscious. Upon losing consciousness, she fell on a heater and burned herself in several places. The burns were not serious, however. Her father rushed her to the hospital at Goodfellow Air Force Base but she had regained consciousness before arriving at the hospital.

It was not immediately learned what caused her illness.

The next day, Thursday, about 7:30 a.m., Mrs. Murphy was washing dishes and her son, Stanley, was getting ready to go to school. Mrs. Murphy told Stanley to call Elementary Principal James Golsen and tell him she would not be able to teach that day, as she had a severe headache. Ill himself, Stanley called the school but was unable to get through, so he called Cliff Ambulance Service in Robert Lee. Gary Sam Williams, son of the owner, Sam Williams, was the only person present, so he answered the phone and was told by Stanley "My mother has passed out and needs an ambulance." After that Gary Sam heard the phone fall.

He called the operator and asked her to give him the calling number. When he learned the number he called his father who was at the funeral home in Bronte. Williams looked up the number and left immediately upon locating it in the phone book.

He gave artificial respiration to Stanley and took the pair to Bronte Hospital, where they were treated for the poisoning.

Quick thinking and quick action by Gary Sam and his father were credited with saving the lives of Mrs. Murphy and Stanley. Leslie Lammers and Mrs. Noah Pruitt, Jr. were at the funeral home and went along to help Williams with the emergency.

Mrs. Murphy and Stanley were released Friday from Bronte Hospital and Frances came home Saturday from Goodfellow Hospital.

Mrs. Murphy told The Enterprise, "We are very grateful to everyone who had any part in our rescue."

On Extremist Forces of Hate

(Editor's note: At this particular time of this particular year, when our country has just experienced a crisis brought on by a crime of which most of us are ashamed and saddened, perhaps it would be a good time for us to re-examine one of the factors which could have a tremendous effect on "Peace on earth, good will toward men." The following article was written by Marguerite Johnson, a columnist for the Houston Post. We think it is the best we have read about the two extremist elements in our country, and the danger they have created.)

Forces of hate killed the President of the United States.

They will not kill the Presidency unless we let them—as free, self-governing Germans let them kill the presidency of the Weimar Republic.

It was John Fitzgerald Kennedy who took the assassin's bullet.

But the drums of hatred have beaten against every President—Republican or Democrat—who has held the executive chair since the waning days of the Depression.

The voices came from the extreme left in the early days. In recent years they have come more loudly and more effectively from the extreme right.

But extremists on either side of any issue strengthen and expand the forces of extremism on the opposite side.

Extreme segregationist strengthen the case of the Black Muslims who preach a religion of hatred of the white man. The Black Muslims strengthen the case of the arch white supremacist.

Extremists of the political left are NOT liberals, as they claim because by definition, a liberal is a man who is tolerant of and interested in other men's ideas and opinions, as Jefferson was tolerant and interested.

Extremists of the political right are NOT conservative, as they insist, because under the cry of Americanism and constitutional government, they would radically change the Constitution's Bill of Rights.

Each drives sheep into the opposite fold—diminishing the ranks of civilized, reasonable citizens in the center.

And simple political malice, which uses cheap gossip as a partisan election weapon, made it all easier for the extremists to flourish.

In the last years of the Democratic administration under President Truman, hatred was spewed at President, secretaries of state, chiefs of staff.

And when at last the Republican administration came in, honest Americans of good will assumed—briefly—that the nation could now harmoniously let President Eisenhower exert a change of leadership.

But the drums of hatred never missed a beat. The same voices which hinted darkly at the personal and political ethics of Democratic leaders hinted just as darkly at the personal and political ethics of Republican leaders.

It was possible throughout these past few years for extremists within America to speak of the President of the United States in words no American would have brooked from a foreign nation.

It was possible these past few years for persons to live in households which never spoke in respectful terms of the President of the United States — or of the presidency.

It was possible for children to grow up to believe that our national government—shaped by a majority vote in election after election among self-governing Americans—was a fearful thing, an evil, a growing dictatorship.

It was possible to make the Big Lie work its perversion of language until a man could be called un-American if he had been employed by the American federal government.

In this atmosphere, any number of madmen could have convinced themselves that to shoot and kill the President would be a righteous act. A heroic saving of the nation. President Kennedy's death was the logical extreme of this line of reasoning.

The ruling majority must at all times protect the rights of any minority, even a misguided one, including the right of free speech.

But whenever one man—as an assassin—has the arrogance to take the law violently into his own hands, or whenever a political minority has the arrogance to take over the government from the majority's hands, democracy has that day ended. One or a few have snatched self-government from the many.

The extremists have chiseled away at the middle road from the right and from the left. If they can chip away at democracy from both sides, then either Communists or Fascists can take over—as they did in Hitler's Germany.

If the death of John Fitzgerald Kennedy is to have any meaning in the eternal logic of man's destiny, then we of the liberal middle road and we of the conservative middle road must join hands to make secure and strong that great broad highway.

We must unite to reaffirm to extremists on both sides of us that we are not only a nation under God—but a nation under a President elected by the majority and served throughout his term of office by both a successful American majority and a loyal American opposition.

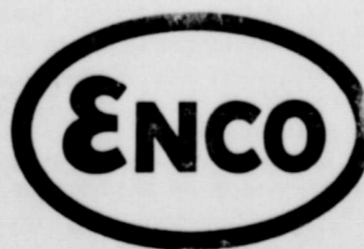

### County Agents News Column

The 1964 Coke County Fat Stock Show is just 25 days away. This edition should be one of the finest ever and also the largest. Approximately 225 head of sheep, cattle and swine will be on exhibit and competing for honors in this year's attraction. Between 60 and 65 girls and boys from the FFA Chapters and 4-H clubs will be entering animals they have spent many hours preparing for this show and the others coming later. We hope the weather will cooperate and a larger crowd will be on hand to witness the action, come January 13.

The show directors are in the final stages with their preparation. They are to be commended along with numerous others for their support of and contributions to this and other youth activities.

We should wind up the brucellosis testing soon. Mr. Parks has all but one or two herds that are required for Coke County to be re-certified. Our present certificate expires on January 12.

Here's a new wrinkle — birds in hay lofts (and I suppose other buildings) can be driven away with the use of a flashing light. A revolving cylinder with two amber and two clear lenses placed over a 75 watt bulb will annoy the birds and drive them away, the report states. Don't burn the light at night — from a distance

the flashing amber and white lights make the barn appear to be on fire.

The directors and officers of the Coke County Livestock protective Association have met twice since the general discussion and organizational meeting was held early in December. They have the organization ground work layed and going. They are pleased with the members joining the Association to date and are hopeful that the tide will continue. A large membership will make the organization more effective and helpful to the county.

December and January are good months for having your soil analyzed. The soil testing laboratories generally are not as rushed at this time of the year and can return your analysis within a week.

If you would like information on how to take a soil sample or need the forms that must go in with a soil sample, give us a ring. More and more Coke County operators are considering the use of fertilizers each year. A soil analysis could give you the information you need regarding the plant food available in a certain field.

Agriculture, the nation's biggest industry, is composed of 3.7 million independent producers.

Only 14 cases of screwworms were found during the last reporting week. All of these came from counties below San Antonio. The authorities are concentrating the sterile fly drops in the buffer zone in Mexico. They hope to push the screwworm back and be abreast of the situation when the northward begins again, probably in February.

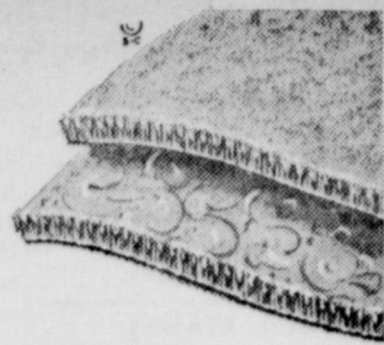

This 3rd day of December 1963, came to be considered by the Directors of Coke County Kickapoo Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, the matter of calling an election for the purpose of electing two (2) directors for said district to serve a term of two (2) years from the second Tuesday in January, 1964; and it appearing to said directors of said district that it would be advisable to hold said election of directors on the 14th day of January, 1964, the same being the second Tuesday in January, 1964, and that the directors of said district issue an order therefore and cause public notice to be given as required by law: NOW THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in the Directors of Coke County Kickapoo Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, said Directors do hereby order that on the 14th day of January, 1964, at the City Hall in the City of Bronte, County of Coke, State of Texas, an election shall be held for the purpose of electing two Directors of said District.

That the polls shall be open for such election at the City Hall in the City of Bronte, Texas, located in said district from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. on the day of the election; and the following officer to hold said election hereby is appointed, to-wit, Noah Pruitt, Presiding Judge. Said Presiding Judge is hereby given authority to hold said election. No person shall vote at such election unless he is a resident voter of said district and also a qualified voter under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas. All votes of such election shall be by ballot and voters desiring to vote for the Directors of the District shall vote for two persons each of whom shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age, a resident of said District and an owner of taxable property in the District.

On or before the fifth day after such election, the officers holding such election shall make due returns, in triplicate, of all the votes cast for Directors of said District, and deliver one (1) return to the President of the District, and one (1) to the Secretary.

Public notice of this Order shall be given by publication thereof in The Bronte Enterprise, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Coke County, Texas, the publication of this Order being once a week for two consecutive weeks, with the first publication being at least twenty (20) days prior to the election and not more than thirty-five (35) days prior thereto.
